2021 REUNION 1960-1979

CELEBRATING THE MCPHAIL ERA:

Following the disappointment of cancelling the 60th Jubilee at Easter, 2020, the organising committee had numerous requests to hold an alternative event in 2021. It was agreed to host an "Easter Reunion 2021" for the ex-students and ex-staff from the first 2 decades 1960-1979.

This coincides with the period in which the founding Principal Mr. McPhail was the Principal from 1960-1977.

Covid-19 reared its ugly head again and on 14th February, N.Z went to Alert Level 2 until the 7th March, and with the government restriction on numbers able to attend all indoor and outdoor events, it was decided to postpone the event until Labour weekend.

On August 16th, New Zealand went into an Alert Level 4 lockdown due to the arrival of the Delta variant. Taranaki did not return to Level 2 until 4th October and indoor events were restricted to a maximum of 100 people.

2021 REUNION 1960-1969:

With the overseas border closed and Auckland and Waikato regions still at Level 4, it was decided in early-October that with a maximum of 100 persons being able to attend an indoor event the committee would host an event just for the first decade of ex-pupils.

A very successful reunion Dinner was held at The Plymouth Hotel on Saturday 23rd October.

Ex-pupil musicians from the 1960's era provided the band music for the dancing.

It was great to finally host the event knowing it will be sometime until the next one.

The word Alumni is used to refer to a group of people who have graduated from a school or university. Males are referred to alumnus and females as alumna.

Your alma mater is your old school, college or university. It's generally used as a positive term, implying reverence and loyalty for the nurturing qualities of the institution. Alma mater comes from two Latin words meaning "nourishing or bountiful mother."

In 2008, a group of ex-Spotswoodians formed the Spotswood College Alumni Trust in order to keep the alumni up to date with the news and successes of other alumni, and to support the College, its staff and students in the future.

The Trust is a fully registered Charitable Trust (CC24439).

MARK BOWDEN:

A big congratulations to the College's 5th Principal Mark Bowden (2010-2018) on being awarded a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit- (MNZM) in the 2021 New Year Honours for services to education.

2021 QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY HONOURS:

DENISE GUY:

A big congratulations to Dr. Denise Guy (1968-1972; and Deputy Head Girl 1972) who was appointed as an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit (ONZM) in the Queen's Birthday Honours for services to Infant Mental Health.

Denise is a Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist with clinical expertise in infancy and early childhood. She has established services focusing on infants and pre-schoolers in Sydney, Australia and New Zealand.

Denise has been the Chairperson of the New Zealand Branch of the Faculty of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, and was a founding member of the Australian Association for infant Mental health.

GARRY CARNACHAN:

A big congratulations to former student Garry Carnachan (1970-1974: Surfer, Basketball and Rugby player) and staff member (1990-1995 Mathematics Department & 1997-1999 as Associate and Deputy Principal) on his appointment as an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit (ONZM) for services to secondary school sport.

Garry has always had a passion for the teaching of mathematics and for participating in sport. He is a great believer of the positive influence that both sport and education have in young people's lives.

After leaving teaching and becoming involved in professional Rugby management, Garry took up the role as CEO of the New Zealand Secondary Schools Sports Council in 2008 and held that role until January of 2021. In recent years its name was changed to School Sport New Zealand.

BALI HAQUE:

A big congratulations to former staff member Bali Haque who was appointed as a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit (MNZM) in this year's Queen's Birthday awards.

Bali came to N.Z. from the UK and first taught Economics and Accounting at Spotswood College from 1975-1977 before returning to Europe. EX – STAFF OBITUARIES

TE KĀHUI ĀKONGA ONAMATA – HE WHAKAMĀNAWA, HE MAIMAI AROHA

We extend our deepest sympathy to the extended families of the following former staff members who have sadly passed away during 2021.

JOHN COOKSLEY (1981-1985):

John sadly passed away in New Plymouth on Wednesday 17th March aged 66.

John was a well respected teacher in the Technology department from 1981-1985.

ROD GREENSILL Cert Rem.Tchg; Dip Guid. (1964-1985):

Rod sadly passed away in New Plymouth on Wednesday 7th April.

Rod joined the College teaching staff in 1964 and in 1966 introduced the Pre-vocational Guidance course for a selected group of Fifth form (Year 11) students- thought to be a first in New Zealand. These students were given 1 day a week vocational training as part of their schooling prior to entering employment. This is currently known nationwide as the Gateway programme.

In 1970, Rod was appointed as the College's first Guidance Counsellor.

Rod also coached lower grade Rugby teams, and was secretary of the PTA (Parent Teachers Association) from 1970-1976.

Rod was a well respected Guidance Counsellor and mediator by both staff and students. His 22 years of dedicated service to the College will never be forgotten. His guidance and advice will have changed the lives of hundreds of his students who will also be saddened by his passing.

PAULINE FRENCH-WRIGHT (Support Staff: 1999-2008):

Pauline sadly passed away in Wellington on Saturday 10th April.

Pauline was a well respected Teacher-aide by

both staff and students and her 9 years of service to the College will never be forgotten.

WARREN SEASTRAND BA. (1967-1969):

Warren sadly passed away in New Plymouth on Friday 30th April.

Warren joined the English faculty in 1967 and also coached College Cricket teams.

Warren later went on to be the Principal of Glenfield College (North Harbour from 1987-2002).

STEVE "COACH" McKEAN (1990 & 1991):

Steve sadly passed away in New Plymouth on Monday 3rd May.

Steve was a part-time teacher in the P.E. faculty in 1991 and 1992 prior to his appointment as the first Regional Sports Director(RSD) for the Taranaki Secondary Schools Sports Association (TSSSA).

ERNEST PRIESTLEY B.A. Dip Tchg (1976-2010):

Ernie Priestley sadly passed away in New Plymouth on Tuesday 10th August.

Ernie joined the College staff as a Social Studies teacher in 1976 and in 1982 was appointed as a Guidance teacher. In 1985, he was appointed as the College's second Guidance Counsellor following the retirement of Rod Greensill.

Ernie was a member of the staff Football team - "The Spotswood Academics" who in 1977 won the T.F.A. knockout Jamieson Cup beating a stacked Stratford team 2-0 in the final. Following the win, Ernie declared he would "hang up his boots".

Ernie also coached and managed Girls' Cricket teams in the early-1990's.

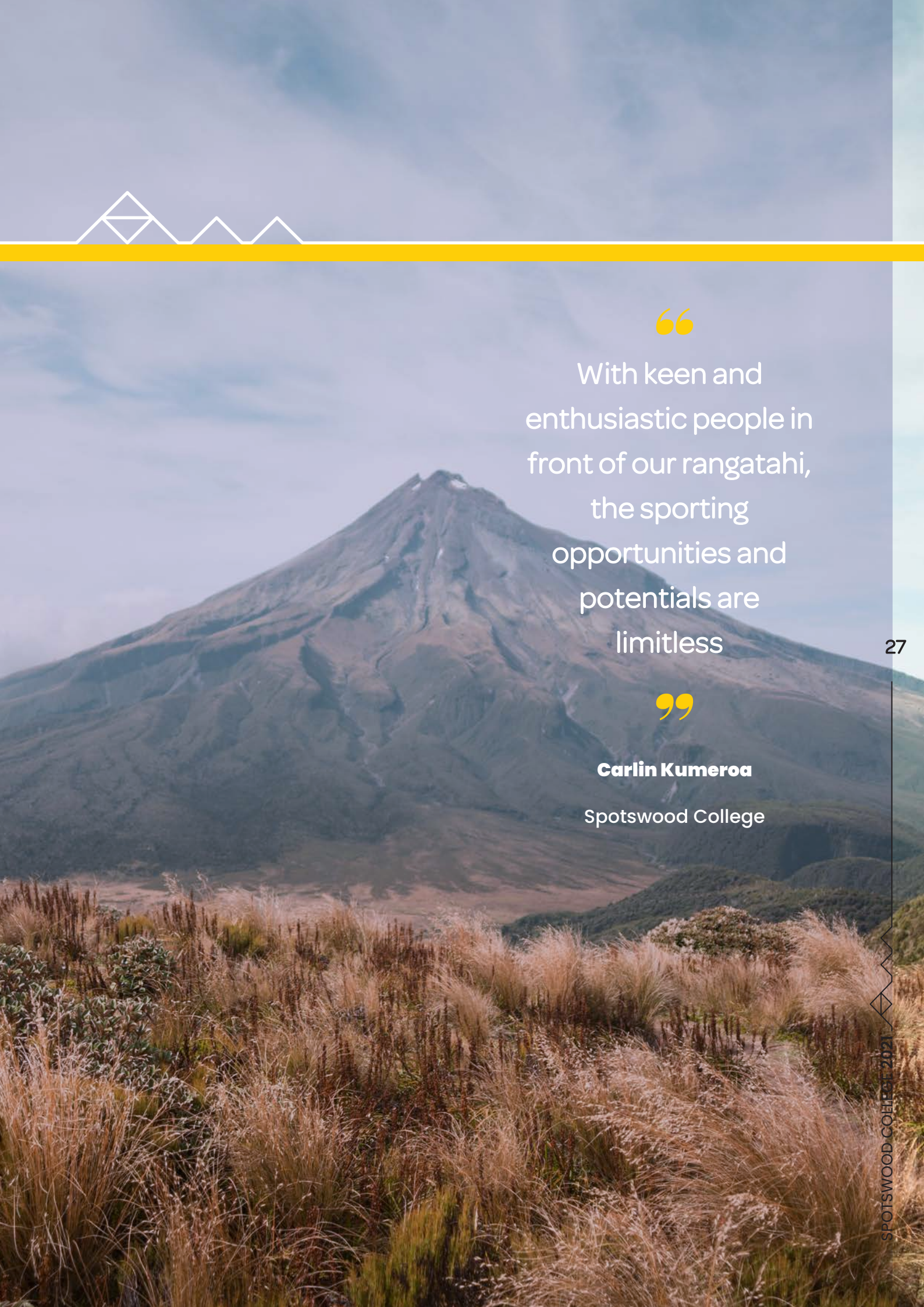

HILLARY AWARD

2021

The Hillary Award is a programme that encourages students and young people to learn new outdoor skills, get physically active, improve and assist the community and take part in the adventure of a lifetime. The Hillary Award is earned when a student completes these 4 categories:

- **Voluntary service** (e.g. picking up rubbish)
- **Physical recreation** (Any sports)
- **Skills** (For example learning a language, gardening or art)
- **Adventurous journey** (such as an overnight hike)

This year as part of Friday's Community Connect programme, 11 students have been working towards earning their Bronze Award. The Adventurous Journey task required students to complete 2 days of physical activity and an overnight stay. The group had an introduction to bush skills day alongside Taranaki Outdoor Pursuits and Education Centre in May as well as days of practice and qualifying journeys in November.

In May the group travelled from TSB TOPEC to the base of Mt Taranaki and followed the Waiwhakaiho Track. One of the bush skills practiced was river crossing, making our

way over the Waiwhakaiho River. Using a compass to navigate, we travelled through the bush off track, to join up with a DOC trap line. From here we headed down the trap line to the Rahiri campsite, just inside the boundary of the National Park. Here we set up a bivouac and learned how to safely use a Trangia to heat water. This day was a great chance to learn more about surviving in the bush and how important it was to make sure we had the right equipment for our future trips.

In early November we were challenged by a longer walk, this time higher up on the Waiwhakaiho Track. While the tramp itself was not too long, we did have full packs with us, with enough equipment of food to camp overnight. An important part of the learning for this trip was to practice staying together as a group, reading a map and making decisions.

We stayed at the Rahiri campsite overnight, cooking butter chicken for dinner on the Trangia cookers and toasting marshmallows on an open fire. We spent the night in tents, enjoying a very mild night for November.

The next morning we started the day by making breakfast and packing up for the tramp back. We started the journey crossing



the strong current in the river (after a week of rain on the mountain) and walked for about 3 hours until we got out of the bush. We then made lunch and had a rest. Once we were well rested we hopped in the van and drove back to TOPEC. We then sorted out our bags and played a game in the trees and went for a swim in our clothes.

A week later we completed our qualifier journey. On the first day we had a safety briefing to make sure we had all the gear we would need and we knew the track we were going to take. The weather forecast was for rain so the destination of the tramp was altered accordingly. We set off in the TOPEC van, heading around the coast for about an hour. Our walk started at the boundary of the Egmont National Park, onto the Kahui Track. The hike was gradually uphill and near the end of the first half of the walk the steepness increased a lot more. When we reached KahuiHut we all sat down for lunch and we had a group discussion about the route we were going to take back down. The weather forecast was for heavy rain with a high chance of thunder and lightning so we decided to go down the faster way. It was about 2 hours back down to the van on a very wet and muddy track. We spent the night at TOPEC as we were not able to stay in a public hut. To replicate an overnight

stay in the bush, we still cooked our evening meal, pasta carbonara, with the Trangia cookers.

On the second day of our tramp we woke up at 7 in the morning and some very patient members of the group cooked pancakes on the cookers. After packing and planning to journey for the day we travelled to Dawson Falls. As students, we were in charge of managing the tramp for the day, ensuring that everyone was safe and happy, as well as following the map and choosing which tracks to use. We walked up to Wilkie's Pools and then down to the Waingongoro Hut for lunch. Highlights of the day were the views from the large swingbridge on the track to East Egmont and going to see Dawson Falls.

We were all pretty tired following the two days of tramping but were really happy to have had the opportunity to practice our leadership, teamwork and bush skills. Hopefully we can continue to develop our fitness, skills and knowledge and work towards our Silver Award in the future.

The school year for 2021 was again impacted by the world wide pandemic of Covid. With this came school, business and community closures, all threats to our many exciting Vocational Pathways courses and programs. But.... once again it was full steam ahead and we had an action packed year full of exciting opportunities for our akonga.

As a department we are very proud of how we again met these challenges with innovation, adaptability and flexibility, which all helped us in providing opportunities for our students to meet their goals and aspirations within real world, engaging and contextualised work experience and skill development programs such as Gateway, Industry Training programs, STAR and Trades Academy courses.

Our Vocational Pathway students have had to be very reflective this year and grew to understand the importance of developing themselves to be life-long learners who can adapt and be flexible in their learning. The level of self management in a disrupted year has been very pleasing. The creativity and planning shown in setting their personal goals and the ways in which they worked to reach them has been impressive. The department commends all students for their positive attitudes and committed approaches. They have been fantastic am-

bassadors of the department.

Our students did not hesitate to get involved and take advantage of the many opportunities on offer throughout the year, making the most of the department's well formed relationships and connections in the wider community. Spotswood College school farm is currently running eight cows with calves at foot; twenty-seven trading lambs; six mixed trading cattle; two Boer Nanny goats and kids at foot, and we are continuously looking to expand our trading livestock for 2022.

The Food programme at Spotswood College in 2021 finished with a hiss and a roar after being severely impacted by Lockdown as a result of COVID-19. Due to the practical aspect of our subject learners had to switch to a digital platform and focus on new units of learning which did not require a food outcome to be designed and produced. This brought in a theoretical aspect of learning around the food space which required learners to work in different ways. There was more focus than normal on designing food without the outcome being realised. This saw students writing food articles, creating menus and recipes for identified food landscapes, ideating possible new food products. Examples of these landscapes were markets, stalls, food trucks, celebrations, ready to eat, artisan, to name a few.

Earlier in the year senior students were able to complete most of their Lunchbox, GreatOutdoors and CafeKai food work. This saw them complete tasks ranging from baking, hot finger food, frying, grilling and salad work through to creating a meal safely in the outdoors.

The standards delivered were a mixture of Unit and Achievement and all are future focused and tied into the culinary world. Currently the Hospitality industry is screaming out for staff so the pathway is solid and offers some really good options for those learners who want to take a culinary journey, or those who need a part time job while they study or decide what is best for them.

The junior classes were engaged with a diverse range of themes this year. **'Social Food'** was a blend of food, travel and different cultures. **'Street Culture'** was an introduction to basic food design concepts where the learners had to create a food outcome using street culture as inspiration. **'Fire'** saw our juniors learning how to light a wood fire each week and cook a different culinary challenge while **'Farmers Market'** encouraged the students to design and create a food outcome suitable for a market space or gala day.

We have a lot to build on in the culinary space here at the College and in 2022 there will be some new directions and initiatives for our learners to engage in.

The introduction of a Barista course for seniors next year is one of our exciting initiatives along with event catering for our junior students.

21st Century education at Spotswood College means engaging in a curriculum that supports our students to be the next generation of innovators and entrepreneurs. Based on the Global Sustainability Goals Junior Impact Inquiry allows learners to drive their own projects by thinking globally and acting locally. Learners will propose and develop a learning inquiry that will investigate and build new knowledge, through questioning, thinking and applying knowledge.

By managing their own projects students are utilizing and developing 21st century skills such as problem solving, communication, creative thinking, ideation, digital technologies and collaboration. Our Impact Inquiry programme is about developing critical learning skills and is important for student learning progression in and beyond our school environment.



Impact Inquiry is facilitated by passionate teachers with a wide range of specialist skills such as Computer science and robotics, science and technology, animation and illustration, art, business and enterprise, sport science and health, event management, theatre and performance arts, music design and production, agriculture, horticulture, apiculture, and naturopathy, media arts, film and photography, and technologies such as jewellery and ceramic design, fabricating wood and metal, industrial design, fashion and food design and production.



Our inquiry programme is centered on local curriculum and the things that matter to our learners, while also building powerful partnerships with the community. Also of note we were awarded the Earthwise Action Fund grant and we currently have a group of students setting up an apiary. Along side this we are currently planting an orchard which we are hoping can supply resources

for development of projects in the future. This can be added to ongoing projects such as sustainable chicken farming, predator trapping and management, the kiwibots robotics competition, Young Enterprise and the designery.

THE DESIGNERY

All of the items sold in The Designery are produced by students in their Impact Inquiry programme. For example; from the school's market garden, chicken farm, beehives, art and technology projects. The Designery, which opened in September 2020, was brought to life by a group of Year 13 Young Enterprise students, who converted an old container into a retail space in which the public can buy everything from a dozen eggs in a reusable woven kete, microgreens and poi to laser-cut earrings, lip balm, soap, skin care products, shampoos and hand-printed wrapping paper and cards.

I've drawn all of the poster and sticker designs, plus I've come up with and created the ideas for upcycling clothing! Even the more technological things like designing the website, logos, and marketing has been super rad. Overall, it's been great to develop this project and I'm really glad I started it!

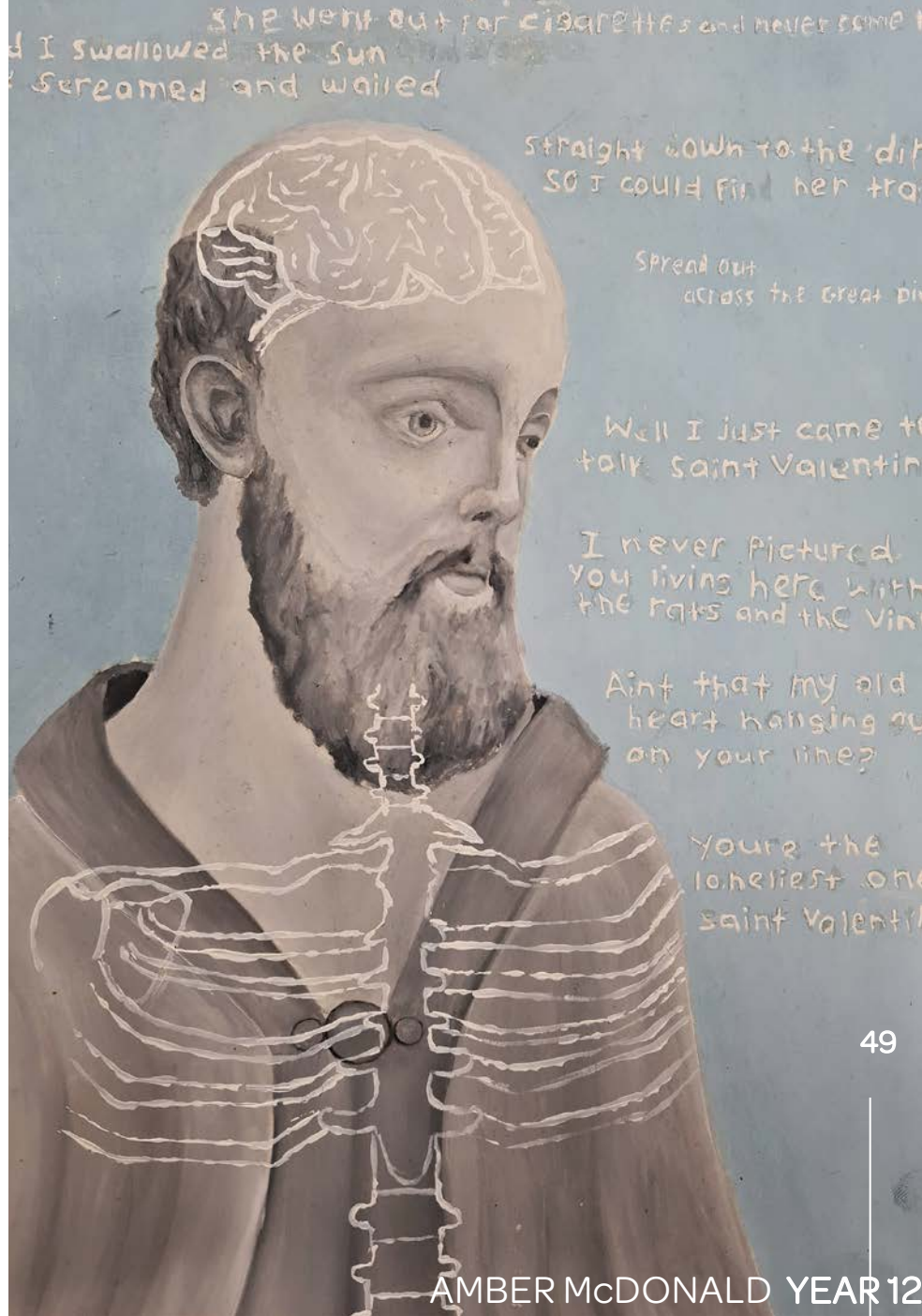

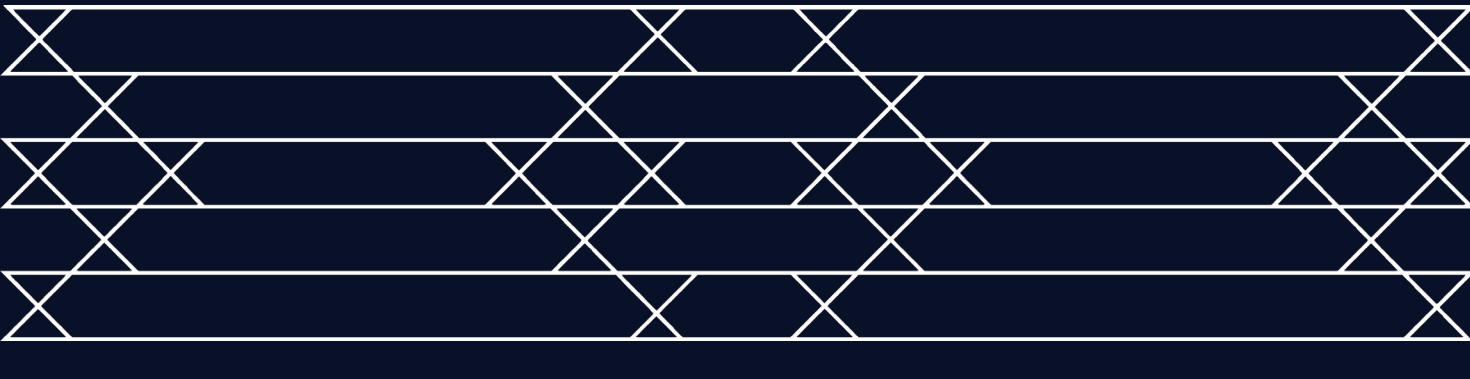

AKORANGA KARETAO ROBOTICS

This year saw the inaugural Spotswood College Robotics Teams compete in the 2021 season of the New Zealand VEX Robotics competition.

The season for Robotics started in August, unfortunately with COVID we were unable to attend all the events we wanted. However with the few we did attend, we learnt a lot. Our two junior teams consisted of Spotswood Team Blue – Aiden Hocking, Liam Hofmans, Sam Pattison and Daniel Marshall and the other team Spotswood Team Green – Beckam Kennedy, Jack Currie, Kani Jackson and Charley Morris. The aim for them was to complete the challenge called Pitching in. VEX IQ Challenge Pitching In is played on a 6' x 8' rectangular field. Two robots compete in the Teamwork Challenge as an alliance in 60 second long teamwork matches, working collaboratively to score points.

Teams also compete in the Robot Skills Challenge where one robot takes the field to score as many points as possible. These matches consist of Driving Skills Matches, which will be entirely driver controlled, and Programming Skills Matches, which will be autonomous with limited human interaction.

Our senior team had 5 senior students, Elliot Alford, Luke Davey, Tyler Lay, Brayden Ford and Eben Mullin. Their challenge was VEX Robotics Competition Tipping Point. This

is played on a 12' x 12' square field. Two (2) Alliances – one (1) "red" and one (1) "blue" – composed of two (2) Teams each, compete in matches consisting of a fifteen (15) second Autonomous Period, followed by a one minute and forty-five second (1:45) Driver Controlled Period. The object of the game is to attain a higher score than the opposing Alliance by Scoring Rings, moving Mobile Goals to Alliance Zones, and by Elevating on Platforms at the end of a Match. I would like to thank our STARS teams for providing funding to enable us to have a Senior team in the 2021 season. We look forward to more teams in the 2022 season of VEX Robotics.

Our students learnt a lot, not only did this challenge their design thinking and engineering skills it also challenged their team building and communication skills. Spotswood Team Blue had some success in a few scrimmages, scoring some of the top scores in New Zealand. Our senior team saw success in the autonomous periods with their great programming skills. Unfortunately in the senior area the bigger the robot the more challenging it became for members to score points as you were allowed to physically stop the other team. This meant our team's season was very much about who they were paired with in the alliance. All teams have learnt a lot and are looking forward to going into next season with more knowledge and experience.

Regionals are being held in December and we are hoping to have some success in this area and see some teams qualify for Nationals. We are hoping to have more teams next year and grow Robotics at Spotswood College

We had some of our students also entered into the Taranaki Science fair and saw Beckham Kennedy take out the senior competition with Kani Jackson and Jack Currie coming a close second. Daniel Marshall Liam Hofmans also entered the Junior section for the science fair but unfortunately their robot had technical issues and was overpowered by other teams' robots. Again we learnt so much from this and hope to have more teams enter next year.

Lastly, I would like to thank our teachers and parents who helped transport our teams to Palmerston North for the competitions.

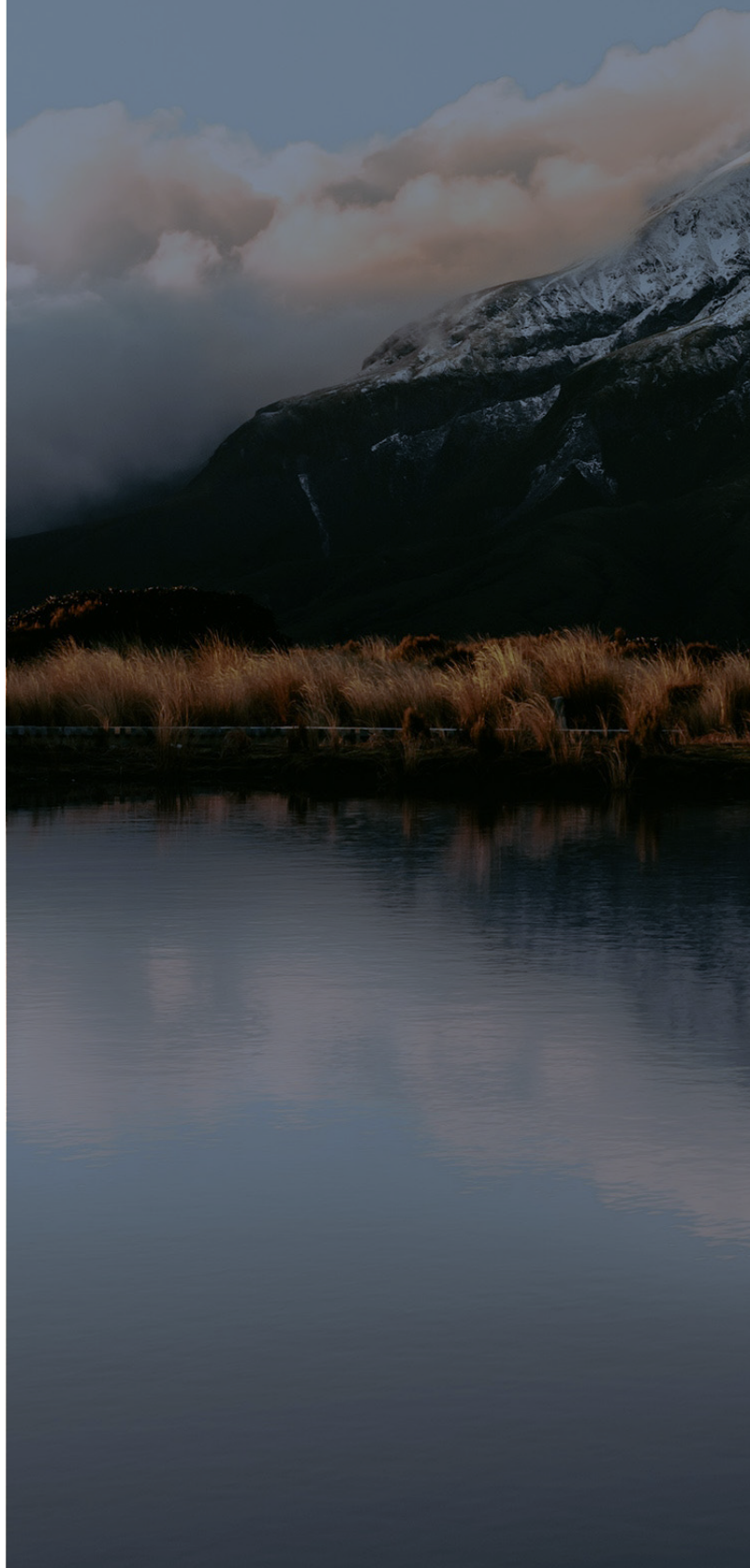

OFF ROAD RACE TEAM 2021:

This year got off to a promising start, but then Covid hit us and reduced our program. Having said that we still managed to get quite a bit of training and racing in for both the mountain biker and dirt bikers.

MOUNTAIN BIKERS: For the mountain bikers the year started really fast with the local TSSSA event. This year it included an Enduro, an event our team likes to race. This is based upon your times going down runs; the uphill section is not timed. Unfortunately the Down Hill didn't end up running this year, as this is another event the team likes to race.

We did get to the North Island Championship held at the 440 MTB Park in Orere, just below Auckland. This was a big event with only the top three riders from each school allowed to race. The team did very well and ended up at the pointy end of the competition in the Enduro and DownHill.

The junior MTBer course took place in Semester 2, which takes the junior riders up to Mangamahoe Mountain Bike Park for training and covers food and nutrition to help the riders get the most out of the sport.

DIRT BIKES: The dirtbike scene got to see much more action, with Enduros, Motocross and Off Road training.

The first event was the Korito Technical Matrix, which is a hard enduro, aimed at the advanced riders. We had two riders in there who loved the challenge of the course.

This was followed by the end of the Summer Series and the start of the Winter Series at various motocross tracks in Taranaki. We had a good turn out of riders for these events.

We entered a team in the School MX Championship in Taupō. This was a well-run event and a great trip away.
