

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



E nga tauira, e nga kaiako, e nga matua katoa o te kareti o Spotswood Te Kura Tuarua o Ngamotu.

It is with great pleasure that I present this my 9th annual report.

Our school takes great pride in the fact that we have deliberately developed a culture of total inclusion of all young people, focusing on providing appropriate education and opportunity for all. We have enrolled in our school students who encompass the full range of human abilities and disabilities - from the gifted academics to those in the need of special care, from the socially advantaged to the socially and economically disadvantaged, the leaders and the followers, those who display good citizenship and also unfortunately those who do not.

New Zealand as a nation is often prone to focus on the negatives in our society and young people in general. We do not readily accept praise nor celebrate excellence. We do not marvel at the excellence of achievement that many of our students produce. This is often at great personal and family expense and too often without the recognition they deserve. I wish to share with you some of these achievements of the students of our school.

The results of the 1994 School Certificate, Bursary and Scholarship exams proved that despite our philosophy of inclusion and despite the perceptions of a segment of this community, our students are able to compete at the highest level - not only in New Plymouth but also at a national level.

From a basic pool of over 1100 individual subject entries, our students achieved a pass rate of just under 60% in School Certificate. There were 72 Form 7 Bursary candidates who studied a full five subject programme. 22 of them were awarded A Bursaries, 32 were awarded B Bursaries giving a success rate of 75%. In addition 16 individual scholarships were awarded.

Now while I do not, by any stretch of the imagination, believe that such results are the only relevant measure of school achievement, clearly on a comparative basis with other schools there has been a measure of success.

Throughout the year, a number of exciting and outstanding achievements of our students were recorded in a wide range of sporting and cultural activities. It would be impossible for me to chronicle here all the students' achievements in drama, sport, debating, culture, the Mathematics, Science and computer competitions. The list is just an amazing testament to our students and their talents.

I was particularly proud of the efforts of our students of Japanese who undertook a wonderful three week educational tour of Japan. This was a different kind of achievement by a group working successfully together towards their goal. It was an enormous commitment of time and to fund-raising.

To all those students who are prepared to commit themselves to a goal, whatever that goal may be, I wholeheartedly applaud you. Keep setting your sights high, do the best you can, that is all that can be expected. There is another facet of achievement, excellence and commitment in our school community that needs to be acknowledged and that is the high level of support which the school receives from its parents.

These are the individual people and groups who work quietly behind the scenes, almost always anonymous but absolutely committed to providing the highest level of support to our school. These people involve themselves in the Parent Teacher Association, the Bandboosters Club and the Whanau o Whaitata.

Then there is the Board of Trustees which I thank for their unconditional support of the principal, the school, the parents and students.

Finally, there are our teachers and support staff. It is to the senior management, the heads of department, teachers, the office staff and the services staff that the real burden of education and education reforms falls. Under the day to day expectations of performance ever present, they somehow get the job done. Together with our students and student leaders, it is they who make our school an effective learning institution. I thank you all for your efforts and your support.

I would now like to look forward to 1996 and beyond and identify some key issues, as I see them, facing education in New Zealand.

Most certainly in 1996 the introduction of a four term year assumes great significance. I am personally hopeful that a more sensible distribution and length of the school year will reduce fatigue and at the same time improve the learning outcomes for our students.

I am hopeful that in 1996 we can look forward to beginning the final stages of our school's deferred maintenance and capital works programme. Our Board of Trustees has identified our priority which is the urgent upgrade of the inadequate technical, art and home economics block. Students and teachers really do deserve better than the present unsatisfactory conditions under which they are forced to work

We can also look forward to the continued implementation of new curricular as part of the New Zealand Curriculum Framework and to the expansion of the number of courses available to students accessing the New Zealand Qualifications Framework.

Unfortunately, as I look forward, I am becoming increasingly disturbed by the prospect of conflict and by the raft of education changes that are being mooted.

I am nervous that New Zealand education continues with its current process of a less than rigorous implementation of reform which appears to me to be often without community mandate and, in many cases, without appropriate research, planning and resources in place.

I am concerned that while I am not personally opposed to the bulk funding of schools, I am totally opposed to the notion of 'winners and losers' as a result of this process. I am concerned at the conflict which could arise between the teaching profession and Boards of Trustees.

I find it abhorrent as a teacher in the state system that private schools which are sometimes tremendously advantaged, are being increasingly funded out of the public purse.

I am insulted that students from the public system - our system - are being funded to access private schooling so that they may receive a 'better education'.

I find it irrational, and indeed a little naive, to believe that a student voucher system is being contemplated supposedly to give choices to the disadvantaged. Families who are immobile and economically depressed have little choice. In the end it is the 'favoured' schools who have choices to decide who they will enrol, or not, as they see fit. In my opinion such a voucher system does not address the root cause of under-achievement nor will it empower parents.

I am disturbed at the present trend, which could be accelerated by a voucher system, of the growth in the number of 'mega schools.' These are the so-called 'good schools' who usually grow at the expense of the community school and those schools in the lower socio-economic areas. Even worse, they grow because of ignorance, misconceptions, and white flight. There are some classic cases of this happening in New Zealand right now.

Finally and most importantly, I question the effect many of these changes will have on the outcomes for our students. Will they really improve the quality of education?

I fully realise that some of these views may indeed be vigorously dismissed as uninformed and irrelevant by the education powerbrokers in New Zealand. I would suggest, however, that these are the views genuinely expressed after 30 years in full-time education, nearly one-third of that time as principal of a large co-educational school. I suspect also they represent the concerns of an increasing number of New Zealanders and teaching professionals who have serious doubts about the process by which education reforms are developed and introduced into our schools. I would submit that many of these concerns are about ownership, or the lack of it, by teaching professionals. It is about the lack of consultation or, at best, inadequate consultation. It is also probably also about a lack of direction, a lack of common focus and, most certainly, about a lack of research and development.

Education is being driven, I believe, by a flawed ideology, by unrealistic economic expectations and, dare I say it, by political expediency.

I must stress that this school is not afraid of change. We have wholeheartedly embraced some of the more positive elements of education reform with great enthusiasm. I am, however, unashamedly, urging caution as we are propelled faster and faster into a market-driven, increasingly privatised, increasingly fragmented education system.

I urge all parents to carefully consider some of the issues raised in this report and, is your right, to challenge and expect answers from those who are setting us on this present path. I firmly believe that our society is robust enough to survive such challenges.

To you all, success and fulfilment. Kia ora koutou katoa.

Board of Trustees Report

During the year the old board completed its three year term and a new board took its place. Our grateful thanks go to them for the outstanding service they gave to the life of Spotswood College.

This year Janice Gibb, Doug Hislop, Paul Goldsmith and Terry Shannon were elected to the new board by the parents of the college. Rangi Treanor and Wikitoria Keenan were appointed by the Whanau and Dennis Ingram was re-elected by the staff as their representative. The students representative was Nicholas Gibb and along with the head students who attended the board meetings, these three young people made excellent contributions. Roxanne White was co-opted on to the board as the Parent Teacher Association representative.

The last few months have been a time of learning and sharing for the new board. But now hard work is ahead as we prepare to review the charter and the college policies.

Anyone returning to the college after an absence of five years could not help but be impressed with the changes that have occurred. They would clearly see the physical changes starting with the grounds inside the front gates. After years of putting up with less than adequate facilities, much has been achieved though there is still more to be done.

This year has been no exception. B Block has been upgraded with facilities added for the visually-impaired. The locker rooms and toilets have been renovated. The entrance to the Special Education department has been improved to provide better access for all while essential repairs have been made to the gumnasium.

A further set of computers has been purchased while another set has been sold and replaced through the generosity of the TSB Community Trust. The library has a bank of sophisticated multi-media computers which will allow students to link into the National Library and the Internet. These computers will allow students the world-wide sharing of information through the developments in computer technology.

There are more plans in the pipeline to improve the college. Some have already started with the B Block extension used by the Special Education students now being refurbished. The administration block is to be improved with a larger entrance way. With changes in the wind for the technology curriculum, it is essential that the upgrading of the technical block be reviewed as a matter of urgency.

A visitor will also find other changes apart from the structural ones. There are inter-active learning styles in place where there is intellectual co-operation rather than competition. It would be easy to overlook the part that the college plays in providing education for those who find it difficult, if not impossible, to cope in the normal classroom. This requires different and special educational opportunities to be available in central and northern Taranaki. For about ten years the Activities facility in Frankley Road has been administered by the college providing a safe place for up to 20 students.

Recently the board members spent an evening at the centre obtaining information about the educational needs of its students and the programmes that are available to them. It was an evening well-spent.

One of the issues that have grabbed the headlines more than any this year has been the bulk funding of schools, or as it is now known, direct resourcing of salaries.

The idea is that by reviewing and changing funding levels, a national offer could be made for schools to elect to have a greater control over all the resources including salaries and wages paid in the school. Currently, the majority of schools are funded centrally.

Given the added responsibilities that boards face - shortly to be increased with the implementation of effectiveness reviews - any increase in authority which helps match the responsibility to provide services and have these measured, would be most welcome. But it seems that there needs to be other ways of achieving this.

The problem seems to be that often changes suggested set one part of the education system in conflict with the other.

This time it is the teachers and the boards of trustees. In the conflict in one high school and an intermediate school it was reported that the teachers involved were thought to be more concerned about national educational philosophy.

The dilemma is that when the change goes beyond just the need to resolve conflict and invites open confrontation, then those seeking out power seem to play all sorts of games. While we cannot rely on the accuracy of all that we read in the newspaper, there are suggestions of power politics, high levels of emotion, intimidation of the other party, even manipulation.

I accept that some change is essential and inevitable, for there must always be a better way of doing things no matter how good the present way is otherwise we will still be travelling by steam train, driving vintage cars on gravel roads and arguing with the horse and coach people. So, while for many of us the changes we face are threatening and remove our security, for others change can also be exciting and rewarding. However, it should not be introduced in a manner to bring unnecessary conflict or for one group to use it for power or political gain.

I am sure that those who designed the proposals did not want this to happen but that is how it is.


I believe that we become involved in the schooling of our children first and foremost to allow them to gain knowledge and skills from the education system so that they can hopefully get the most from the opportunities they choose. So that they are prepared intellectually, physically, emotionally and socially for whatever life has to offer them. It has all to do with learning to live with each other and achieve to the best of their abilities without taking away those rights and responsibilities of others. This seems to be quite the opposite of the sorts of power we see being muscled at this time and which is causing stress and uncertainty to many others.

This applies not only to industrial and professional issues but also to policies that can be so demanding and possibly so narrow that they can only be achieved in a few schools and put others in impossible situations which are stressful and energy-sapping.

Whatever approach is taken on these issues I hope that everyone in education will always recognise the hopes and aspirations of parents and caregivers for their children and always keep this in mind.

Good luck to all in 1996.



A group of 20 Spotswood College students who are studying Japanese had the great experience of travelling to Japan over the August holidays. The group was led by Mrs Domney, the college's teacher of Japanese.

The students did a lot of fund-raising for the trip, which lasted three weeks. Their fund-raising plans started in February this year and included sausage sizzles every Sunday outside the Warehouse for about five months, car washes, raffles, gardening, garage sales and pizza sales. They also had the unenviable task of getting up at dreadful hours in the morning to do newspaper inserts.

As the students had to finance the trip themselves, they had the choice of places they could visit in Japan. During the three weeks they also experienced the Japanese lifestyle through homestays in different parts of Japan.

The group left New Zealand on Sunday 20 August and arrived in Japan the next day. Their sightseeing began on the 22nd August when they visited the Kumamoto Castle and museum. The students met with their homestay families in Oita and were also entertained by them the next day.

Their visit to Shikoku was a quiet day before they travelled to Mishima, New Plymouth's sister city. During their three day stay, they met the mayor of the city, Shigeru Isii. They also went sightseeing at Kamakura where they saw the Big

Despite these minor problems, the students enjoyed their trip and it was a great opportunity to learn more about the Japanese culture, to make friends and practise their language

Library Report 1995

This year has been another important one for the library. We continued our programme of improvement with the formation in Term One of a library development committee which involved several staff members and BOT members. After looking at the strengths and weaknesses of the library, we were able to produce a development plan that will take us to 2001 and beyond.

One of the important areas of development is to continue the technical upgrade begun when we started the process of computerising the catalogue. As a result of a well-supported workday, we now have three new CD computers in the library and will soon have internet and e-mail facilities as well. It is pleasing to see how well the new equipment is being used and to know that planning is in place to make things even better in the future.

The computer catalogue is almost complete so students are now able to access the catalogue through the computers. We have yet to purge all the unwanted entries from the system and once users have been barcoded, issues, returns and overdues should be handled more efficiently.

As we move further into the information age, more and more non-fiction resources are needed. Books, journals and periodicals now take up a significant part of our book budget.CD's are more expensive, too. For example, to buy

INNZ on disc costs \$600. That money is money well-spent provided that everyone makes effective use of the resources. It is really important that students learn how to use the library well in the junior forms by completing their 'Library Licence' in the English classes. This will enable them to continue using all the resources of the library to assist them in all their subjects as they advance through the school.

Do not forget the recreational value of the fiction section either. It is depressing for F7 English teachers to try to prepare Bursary candidates in English literature when they know students have not read a fiction book since F4 of F5. This comment is directed at those in F6 in particular who feel that they do not have time to read because they have too much assessed work to do. Reading fiction is both relaxing and developmental. Intellectual growth and language growth are both stimulated by leisure time reading.

We have had plenty of help in the library this year. Senior librarians Jaime, Tracy and Katrina have done excellent work. Junior librarians Natasha, Emma, Amanda, Sheena, Amiria, Melissa, Crystal, Robyn, Briar and Ben have been of great help as they learned the ropes this year. Well done, team.

Thanks also must go to Daniel and Nancy who have helped week by week to keep the library running smoothly. Without the help of these people, the work of Mrs Gilbert and Mrs Moetara would be made so much more difficult especially as the developments have increased their workloads substantially. We hope that many students will consider librarianship as an option next year.

We wish you all happy holidays, success in examinations and a safe return to school next year. Good luck to all those whose last year at school this is. Our best wishes go to you.

LIBRARY 2000 DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

Spotswood College library has acquired three new CD ROM computers as a result of the hard work of students coupled with the generosity of the New Plymouth community and businesses.

The computers were purchased with earnings from a work day held in Term 2 which raised about \$12,000. A considerable amount of software has been obtained through the college's participation in the Woolworths/IBM promotion. The next step will be linking the computers to the internet system.

The acquisition of the updated equipment is part of the planning undertaken by the college to establish a 5 year Library 2000 development programme. This programme is intended to convert the old library into a resource centre more suited to meeting the needs of present and future technology. An element of the development programme is the formulation of technology goals which recognise the significant changes occurring in today's information world.

Students need to be much better equipped to learn independently. Learning today requires shifting the vast quantities of information that are available and is an active process involving questioning, thinking, reviewing and processing information. The old days of simply copying information from encyclopaedia or 'doing projects' have changed.

The modern learner will have continued access to traditional book material but also to electronic library catalogues, clipping services, internet links and CD ROM technology.

Software intended for the new CD ROM system ranges from easy accessible high interest packages for younger or less able students to highly specialised biographical databases and electronic clipping services such as the Library of New Zealand INNZ (Index NZ).

EXCHANGE STUDENTS

Bonjour! Aux Copains de l' Ecole Spotswood

Being an exchange student with American Field Services (AFS) is full of excitement and is the reason I have come this far from home. In fact, more than ten thousand miles away.

On 21 July of this year I touched down at Auckland airport after a 25-hour flight from Geneva, Switzerland. I will be staying in New Plymouth until July next year. My home in Switzerland is in Le Locle, a small town about 30km from the nearest city Neuchatel. Switzerland is famous for its watches and this is the main industry of Le Locle.

There are obviously differences in schooling in Switzerland and that here. Apart from French and German that are compulsory, we study similar subjects to those in New Zealand. The Swiss school day starts at 8am and can end as late as $5.30\,\mathrm{pm}$. Swiss students do not wear uniforms and they are allowed to smoke in their common rooms. After three years of college students qualify to attend university. If students fail at the end of their college term, they have to remain at college until they successfully complete their studies.

Switzerland is situated in the middle of Europe and borders on Germany, France, Italy, Austria and Lichtenstein which allows easy travel to any of these countries. The seven million population of Switzerland do not speak 'Swiss' as there is no such language. The main language is German with about 20% of the Swiss speaking French. Other languages spoken are Italian and Romansch which is a dialect spoken only in Switzerland by 1% of the Swiss.

Although French is spoken by many Swiss, we do not like what Jacques Chirac is doing in the South Pacific. There have been many protests in Switzerland against French nuclear testing. The Swiss hate 'la bombe' as much as New Zealanders do.

As Switzerland is a land-locked country it does not have the many beautiful beaches that you have here. Because there are many lakes in Switzerland these are the beaches where we swim or in local municipal swimming baths.

 $What I find \, most \, interesting \, about \, New \, Zeal and \, is \, that \, you \,$ do not live in apartment buildings to the same extent as the Swiss. This is because houses are very expensive in Switzerland and living areas are very crowded. Here there is so much open space in the towns. This together with the open rolling countryside makes New Zealand such a beautiful country.

If you want to learn more about my home country, why don't you come and visit me if you happen to be in Europe. You will be most welcome in the land of chocolate, watches and cheese!!

A Thai Viewpoint

My name is Sadudee Vongkiatlikacheon but most of my friends just call me Dee and I am from Bangkok, Thailand. This is my second visit to New Zealand but my first to New Plymouth where I will be for two months.

New Plymouth is so different from Bangkok which has a population of nine million - that's three times more than the entire population of New Zealand. This is why I love being in New Plymouth which is so tranquil and far less crowded.

New Zealand might be colder but it does not have the air pollution of Bangkok. Also, whenever I want to go anywhere in New Plymouth I don't have to worry about traffic jams.

Just travelling around Bangkok can be a nightmare. My father's office is only 15km from home but it takes him anything up to three hours to get there by car.

Travelling to school is just as hard for young people. Most students get up at five in the morning, some at half past four because schools start much earlier than they do here. As a result, some of them have their breakfast in their cars on the way to school while others use the trip to catch up on sleep. It is not unusual to find students falling asleep during lessons. Their lives become a struggle just because they happen to live in the wrong place.

During my time at Spotswood College, I noticed other differences as well. The Thai school year consists of two terms only and class sizes is another interesting matter. A typical Thai high school class would have 60 to 70 students and teachers have to use loudspeakers to teach them. This is the reason that so many students have to use the services of tutors after school because they find it difficult to keep up with lessons in class.

With such large classes teachers are not able to give students individual attention. It's much worse than New Zealand, isn't it? But Thailand does have some good points.

Golf is my favourite sport but playing it here has made me realise just how lazy a golfer I am. Unlike on Thai golf courses, you don't have caddies here and I have to carry my own golf bag. The Thai golfer has a caddie to carry his bag, another to carry his umbrella and sometimes, if he needs it, a caddie to give him a massage!

But there are good and bad sides to everything. Having no caddies in New Zealand makes Kiwis do things for themselves. Having so many caddies in Thailand might seem silly but it is one way of providing employment for those many people without jobs.

I enjoyed coming to New Zealand and I think that if I had another chance, I would visit this beautiful and tranquil country again.



event has been held since 1916.



Bikini - The Poisoned Atoll

On 1 July 1946, B29 bomber known to its crew as 'Dave's Dream' appeared over the lagoon and from its belly fell an instrument which hurtled towards one of some 83 unmanned target vessels at a speed of 300 miles an hour.

At 34 seconds after nine that morning, the device exploded at an altitude of 500 feet and for a moment, it seemed as if the sun had risen for the second time that morning.

It was then that the world came to know about this island and its atoll, a place in Western Pacific called Bikini. The testing of nuclear weapons in the Pacific had begun.

Of the 23 nuclear devices set off at Bikini, an atoll in the Marshall Islands group, was one called 'Bravo'. The combined power of all the weapons fired in the wars throughout history would fall short of that unleashed by 'Bravo' over the lagoon at Bikini.

The island was up till 1946 home to 161 Marshall Islanders. That was until the United States Navy met them after church one Sunday morning to tell them that their island was needed for a project that would benefit mankind.

The last nuclear device was detonated in $1958\,\mathrm{but}$ the US government continues to pay for the treatment of cancers and other radiation-related diseases suffered by the Marshall Islanders. Three out of four children under the age of ten developed thyroid tumours.

It is true that the nuclear tests held at Bikini were carried out above ground and the French tests at Mururoa below ground. But in other ways, there are similarities between the nuclear tests at Bikini and those at Mururoa.

Both islands are thousands of miles away from the nations which have tested or who continue to test nuclear weapons above or below them. And in both cases, the nations testing the weapons claimed that the test would not harm the environment.

Sadly, for the former residents of the Marshall Islands, the United States were proven wrong.

Today, 49 years after they had to leave their island, the Bikinians are still waiting for the day when they will be able to return to their homes. Originally they were told that they would be able to return as soon as the tests were completed. But they still cannot because the island is still heavily radioactive.

Bikini will continue to be a no-go zone for another 70 to 80 years unless a drastic clean-up process is carried out. This would require scraping the top 12 inches off Bikini's 560 acres and burying it beneath an 18 inch thick concrete slab.

The lesson learnt at Bikini of the effects of nuclear weapon testing on both the environment and the inhabitants is one that should never have to be taught again.

Surely, any risk of an accident at Mururoa, no matter how minimal, is a major risk.




