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Principal's Message

Haere mai, haere mai, naumai ki tena kura. E ki ma, e koro ma, e rau rangitira ma. Haere mai, haere mai, naumai

Working in education can seem at times like taking a wild stallion on a walk with a short lead. Increasing expectations, diminishing resources, more tasks, less time. But the exciting thing is that the Government and indeed the community as a whole is explicitly linking success in education to the future success of our nation. Our country can no longer afford to have students not achieving or even under achieving. Jobs do not exist for unskilled workers, with the pace of change all employers expect their workers to keep up to date and to keep learning. The government has expressed this focus as a new target and as a new way of thinking for secondary schools. In days gone by School Certificate was a gate which divided the population in half. Based on the bell curve 50% of students passed, 50% failed - we cannot compete in the global economy with half our population identified as learning failures.

The new expectation is that by 2017 85% of students will gain NCEA Level 2. Such a target challenges us to be creative and find new ways of meeting the learning needs, skill level and interests of all students. The Government has positioned NCEA Level 2 as a foundational gualification which will lead students into success in further education and the world of work. Perhaps for too long schools have organised themselves to meet the needs of academic students intending to go on to University. When jobs were plentiful and young people could get good employment in manufacturing and processing jobs from 15 or 16 years of age then catering for the 10% - 15% heading to University made sense. Technology now demands that all workers have skills and the ability for life-long learning. This is a significant challenge for us and reinforces a number of the key initiatives we already have in place - IDPs - Individual goal setting through IDPs - smaller whanau groups where students can more easily be mentored and their progress monitored by the partnership between home, school and student, where pathways are co-constructed and where individual needs and interests contribute meaningfully to the design of programmes of study. It is the quality of this education/learning partnership which is crucial; sharing goals, setting targets and understanding the role each of the partners (students, teachers, parents) must play in ensuring best fit learning outcomes for individual students.

For education to be successful these partnerships must extend beyond the school gate. At Spotswood College we are encouraging greater community participation in our school. During 2012 we have begun this through the development of our E TŪ programme, holding our first PTA School Gala in many years, growing the level of participation in sport through the Sports Council and having the Maori Graduation Ceremony run by our Komiti Maori. These initiatives along with a huge level of support and assistance we were given at the time of the Paritutu tragedy clearly demonstrates to us that we are indeed a community school. These occasions and events have certainly worked to meaningfully fulfil the intent of the saying that 'it takes a whole village to raise a child'.

Education is shifting from a traditional transmission model of learning to a personalized one where individuals co-construct their pathways. To achieve

the 21st Century model requires the creation of new flexible structures and processes. Students require the higher order thinking skills of analysis, evaluation and interpretation upon which to base decisions and make judgments. Hand in hand with high level thinking skills is the need for a set of explicitly stated values which are understood and shared by the whole school. Our school-wide E TŪ programme is being developed to meet this need through the defining and understanding of the values of respect, co-operation, care for one another, courage, honesty and responsibility.

Schools in the 21st Century require a strong shared values base upon which to develop and maintain effective learning relationships. Values upon which corporate or whole school decisions as well as individual decisions can be made. With the ease of accessibility to information through the internet and the sharing of news and views via social media, higher order thinking skills, as well as co-constructed values, must be explicitly taught, rather than assumed.

Our E TŪ team has worked hard during 2012. The key work has been to identify what respectful behaviours look like in all the different contexts of our school – from the classroom to the canteen, from the playground to the hall. Students within the team have been fantastic. They have shared their ideas, discussed philosophies and approaches and promoted these through school assemblies, level and hapu assemblies as well as whole school end of term assemblies. During 2013 we will be seeking to work with our contributing schools so that the E TŪ approach is linked from Primary to Intermediate then on to High School.

> The night markets and the interactions we had with the local vendors were truly unique. One of our students needed the assistance of our translator as one vendor tried to rip her off of \$400,000 Dong (about \$20 New Zealand dollars!!). Luckily I was there to get the whole debacle on film.

> We detoured to Ha Long Bay for a night on board a boat. We kayaked through caves, hiked up into a Pagoda with

an amazing view of the bay, hiked into one of the most spectacular caves in the world and swam and jumped off the boat in the ridiculously warm waters of Vietnam. The stay was incredible and the food was great.

After Hanoi we took a titillating overnight ride on a local train. The event was interesting, to say the least, and makes one appreciate what colonial experiences must have been like when travelling abroad.

We visited the old Imperial Capital of Vietnam in Hue situated along the Perfume River. This was the site of one of the longest battles of the 1968 TET Offensive and much of the palace grounds were destroyed as the Viet Kong battled US Marines for 25 days, becoming one of the longest and bloodiest battles of the Vietnam War.

We were able to crawl through VC tunnels built at Cu Chi, some as deep as 25 metres under ground so as to be safe from B-52 Bomber strikes. Many locals would live in these tunnels for as long as a year. There were spaces for people to live as well as a little maternity cave to give birth. Even though the caves had been expanded for tourists, they were still seriously small and personally, I experienced quite a few scraps from the walls being so tight.

We spent one of the last nights at a home stay on the Mekong River Delta. This was very unique. The beds were under a roof with no walls and only mosquito netting to protect you from the elements. We then journeyed to Saigon for the last few days before setting off for the return trip home to Auckland and New Plymouth via Hong Kong.

Our experiences were rich, our adventures were exciting and our memories are the better for this amazing trip. We will be looking to repeat this adventure in a couple of years with another group of adventure seeking students.

Miss Willy became the Assistant HOD replacing Mr Parr who took more whole school responsibilities for timetabling and being the Principal's Nominee. Mr Whyte and Mr Johnson became Hapu leaders for Richmond and Darnell, with Mr Whyte taking a really active role in leading the schools Positive Behaviour for Learning Initiative (ETU).

We also had some really positive NCEA results to celebrate from the 2011 examinations. Most areas saw further improvements in the numbers of students attaining credits, gaining endorsement and getting Merits and Excellences. In nearly all subject areas students achieve at or above similar decile rated school in New Zealand. This has much to do with the efforts of the students and teachers who work tirelessly to think of better ways to improve teaching and learning programmes, great work folks!

In 2012 we introduced Tourism as a year 12 subject and saw the numbers taking it grow substantially from our initial forecasts, we anticipated 20 but ended up with 60 in level 2! The course offers an insight into the wide roles, responsibilities and destinations in the tourism industry at a national and global scale. The students have found the independent research and variety of Unit Standards enjoyable and achieveable. Such was the demand to get the National Certificate in Tourism, which is only attainable having completed the level two and three course, that we are running the level three course for 18 students this year. The course is meeting the aspirations of students and we have two students attending the Sir George Seymour College in Wellington and Dunedin next year.

A real highlight for the faculty was the Vietnam trip organised by Miss Willy and Mr Johnson this year. It has been an aspiration for the teachers to do such a trip for some time and thankfully all the fundraising and hard work paid off with a successful and eye-opening trip for our students and teachers alike. Other trips like the year 13 Mount Maunganui trip organised by Mr Parr, really supports learning by bringing the learning to life. We hope to develop more opportunities like this next year.

The faculty has worked hard in its endeavours to gain scholarships in partnership with the students by developing successful enrichment programmes.

Also one of our Year 13 Sculpture Folios that gained a Scholarship award toured New Zealand in the 'Top Art' show and was used as an example of a good Scholarship folio on the NZQA

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website. Our 'Outstanding' Sculpture Scholarship folio, produced by Emma Glucina, who is now at Elam Art School at the University of Auckland, was one mark away from a perfect score, from being 'Top Scholar' in Sculpture in New Zealand.

Our two classes of Year 11 Art students produced the most diverse folios this year, due to more independent programmes catering for student's voice and interests.
