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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

There will be few staff members, students or Board of Trustee members who will disagree that 1993 has been particularly busy, particularly demanding and sometimes a particularly difficult year.

A raft of curriculum changes, the preparation work for the National Qualifications Framework, the introduction of the National Curriculum Framework, Achievement-Based Assessment modules and the seamless Education System, have all impacted directly on schools throughout New Zealand. Increased social pressures, the lack of employment opportunities and the desperate plight of the unemployed have placed schools in the position of acting not only as places of learning and education but also as agencies of social welfare, of care and protection, of law and order and sometimes as the only consistent and steadying influence in young people's lives.

The consequences of this professional and social upheaval lead me to ask the question "how much longer can the community at large expect our schools to cope with the ever increasing demands placed on them?" I believe we are almost at the limit of our abilities to cope with the demands placed before us, almost to the point where we say "Enough!..."

Funding, support services and staffing have all virtually remained unaltered for the past 3 years and yet the demands go on. It is time for our Government and our country to accept that if it wishes to maintain our quality education service, it will need to provide the schools with the support and resources it needs. There is no longer equity of educational opportunity in New Zealand. Access to quality education, particularly post-compulsory education, is now in almost direct proportion to families' economic status.

To delay is to ignore the enormous social upheaval in our society and also to ignore the responsibility we have to the young people of our country.

Amongst all this turmoil in our society, it is therefore most pleasing to observe the outstanding achievements and quality of work of so many of our students.

Their distinguished academic record continued in 1992/93 with 68% of our School Certificate candidates gaining entry to Form 6, with 73 A level subject passes being awarded, the highest of any school in the province. In addition, at Form 7, just under 60% of our students gained a Bursary and 7 scholarship passes were awarded.

Of course we can do much better but, nevertheless, these are very pleasing results indeed.

In celebrating outstanding achievement, we must accept that academic achievement is but one facet of the overall development of our students.

Other achievements include the initiative taken by a group of senior students in setting up our school radio station, the wonderful performance of the 'Insect Play' by our Drama students, the outstanding national successes of our school volleyball teams, the growth of our Maori Culture group, the performance levels of our school bands and the amazing standard of our Jazz Band, the quality of our school newspaper and the success of our Equestrian team. By no means a definitive list but all outstanding examples of high achievements by our students.

No less impressive was the achievement of the Board of Trustees in finally securing the commitment of the Ministry of Education for Stage II of our upgrading and development programme. I am delighted to report that work has begun on the 13 classroom A Block complex and will be commissioned in time for the start of the 1994 school year. Taken together with the deferred maintenance work on the Library, B Block and B extension, another big step has been taken towards bringing our school buildings and environment up to an acceptable standard.

Negotiations and lobbying for Stage III of this programme have already begun and hopefully the impetus will continue into 1994 and beyond as we plan for the major remodel of the Technical, Art and Home Economics Block.

Achievement of another type was noted with the release of the report by the Education Review Office of our recently completed assurance audit. In his summary Mr Ian Hill, District Manager, writes,

"The Board of Trustees impresses the review team as a confident and dedicated team. The members represent the range of the school community and bring a wide variety of talents and experience to the job. Their operating style is characterised by directness, openness, and a determination to do all they can to improve the educational environment and assist students in achieving their goals. As a consequence the review process was a positive and vigorous exchange.

Good documentation of the school's policies, policy statements and implementation procedures give a clear direction to the intentions of the Board and Principal. The school's strategic development plan is clear and concise and reflects the goals and objectives of the school's charter.

Staff are hard working and conscientious. Many have taken advantage of professional development to anticipate future directions of education regarding issues such as the new curricula in mathematics and science, achievement-based assessment and the move to a modular curriculum in anticipation of the imminent National Framework for education in the senior school.

The school is conscious of the socio-economic profile of its student intake. There is an emphasis on the provision of a caring physical and emotional educational environment. Student support systems are a feature of the school There is a strong guidance network, a personalised approach to enrolment, effective strategies regarding attendance, a broad base to the curriculum, and programmes to assist in the transition to life outside the school. The way in which special needs of some students are catered for is a feature of the school".

In all those achievements we have a school in which I believe we can be justifiably proud.

This year we farewell a number of teachers who have served the school loyally and well over many many years.

They include Mrs Nanette Cooke who leaves her position as Guidance Counsellor to take up new challenges in private practice in New Plymouth, Ms Leisa McCauley to a new position at Freyberg High School in Palmerston North, Mr Alastair Wells to Francis Douglas and Mr Mike Lilly who will be moving to University in Palmerston North to embark on his post-graduate Doctoral studies in Chemistry and Mrs Margaret Williams who is going into a well-earned retirement,

after serving the College for 24 years.

To them all I extend sincere thanks for the enormous contribution each and every one of them made to our school.

We also farewell a number of our Long-Term relief teachers - Ms Sonya Barry, Ms Bao-huan Sun and Mr Andreas Ries. To them, my thanks for your support of the school and of its students.

New appointments are pending in Science and Home Economics and I am pleased to announce the appointment of Mrs Sheryl Domney as teacher of Japanese and Mrs Helen Brandon as teacher in our 2nd Special Needs Unit.

1993 was an extremely busy year for the teaching staff of the school. During the year we prepared a lengthy analysis of school technology needs and directions and applied unsuccessfully to become a Technology Lighthouse school.

The school curriculum was modularised in preparation for 1994 and a series of options handbooks prepared.

Extensive staff training in Achievement-Based Assessment was undertaken. An application lodged with the New Zealand Qualifications Authority to become a provider of vocational units of the National Qualifications Framework and training was undertaken in the processes associated with total quality management and quality assurance. All these tasks, and many more, are over and above normal school expectations.

This is an enormous workload and my admiration and thanks go to the staff for their support of these projects, and their dedication to the students of Spotswood College.

The move to the National Curriculum Qualifications framework in 1994 will start a process of reform which I believe will have a significant impact on our school's ability to provide a more appropriate and meaningful curriculum. The concept of our senior students being able to access units on this framework and to achieve national recognition for their efforts , will add another dimension to our ability to provide an appropriate and meaningful education.

Spotswood College is nationally recognised as being at the forefront of this development and at this stage is literally one of a handful of schools to have achieved full accreditation as a national provider of framework units. A remarkable achievement.

In conclusion my personal thanks are extended to our wonderful supportive and hardworking teaching staff, administration staff, services staff, who together with our Board of Trustees, make a formidable team, all working together to make Spotswood College a first-rate educational establishment

To our school prefects and in particularly Trina, Anna, Regan and John, it has been a pleasure to have worked so closely with you.

To all who are leaving, may I extend best wishes for a happy and productive life as you move on from our school. To those returning, we can look forward with anticipation to exciting times ahead.

My best wishes to you all for a very Merry Christmas and an exhilarating and prosperous New Year.

- * The Board of Trustees impressed the review officers as being a confident and dedicated board which represents the range of the school community and who bring a wide variety of talents and experience to the job;
- * The college staff are hard-working and conscientious. Many have taken advantage of professional development to anticipate future directions of education regarding issues such as new curricula, achievement-based assessment and the move to the new National Framework;
- * There is an emphasis in the school on the provision of a caring physical and emotional educational environment;
- * The way in which the special needs of students are catered for is a feature of the school;
- * The Board of Trustees is taking all reasonable steps to

- provide a balanced curriculum which in turn will foster student achievement;
- * Most subject areas recognise the Board's policy direction to value Maori culture through the implementation of Maori perspective in the curriculum areas;
- The extent of outstanding deferred maintenance and improvements for which the Ministry of Education has accepted financial responsibility is immense.

Since the introduction of Tomorrow's Schools the backlog in maintenance and improvements to the buildings have always been a frustration to the Board of Trustees in its efforts to maintain an environment conducive to effective student education.

All in all, the report was pleasing and positive. I would therefore like to take this opportunity to thank my colleagues on the Board for their hard work and dedication during the year and invite any caregiver or parent to attend a Board of Trustees meeting. Remember, we are representing your interest in the school.

SPOTSWOOD COLLEGE FAREWELLS MRS WILLIAMS

Spotswood College and the English Department sadly bid farewell to one of the College's longest-serving teachers, Mrs Margaret Williams, who is embarking on a well-earned rest from teaching. It is only fitting that Mrs Williams should tell us a little about her experiences.

"I wouldn't dare talk about some of the experiences I have had at Spotswood. I can only say that some of my more memorable experiences have involved teachers - one in particular who, because I am small, delighted in carrying me, fireman fashion, from B.Block to the staffroom. No matter how often I tried to avoid him he would swoop me up, much to the delight of the pupils. I didn't plan a revenge but when the opportunity presented itself I took it. I was passing his room, and he was teaching senior students. I quietly went up to him and whispered, "Did you know your fly is open?" His embarrassment and confusion was a joy to behold!

The early years of my twenty-five were wonderful years. The staff became the family I had left behind in Scotland. We respected each other and took care of each other, we danced together and sang together, and no one danced better than one male who shall remain nameless but who now occupies a large office in the corridor. The staffroom was a place of good fun but changes came as changes are wont to do. Too many, too fast and in the changes something was lost, and though we are still a friendly staff the family atmosphere is gone.

I taught the seniors ballroom dancing for many years, always on a Wednesday night, in preparation for their yearly ball. The dance lessons became a social night for past pupils as well as the pupils at the school. It was interesting to see all the blossoming romances, some which have remained and have now produced offspring who now attend Spotswood College. The one thing I didn't like was being left in the dark hall all by myself, usually about $10~\mathrm{p.m.}$

I was part of the school when it was separated into East and West School. It was an interesting time and a time when pupils were more competitive, sporting and cultural activities seemed to thrive. I eventually became Senior Mistress of East School.

Under the leadership of Mr Thomas, the school became as one, and I became Dean of all Third Forms, boys and girls. There were usually 320 plus each year. As we had no Guidance Counsellors then, as Dean, I was disciplinarian, guidance teacher, mother confessor, I put them into classes, or out of classes as was necessary. I even hugged (we were allowed to hug then) when the occasion needed a hug. Boys, of course, had to be patted on the head and occasionally patted on the other end, something I did not do. I only patted the heads.

I've been very fortunate to have met and taught some really wonderful pupils, many who have become fine members of society. I love meeting them and to hear of their progress and feel that in some minute way I have contributed to their ongoing love of learning.

What will I do in my retirement? The word "retire" conjures up a time to lie down and fade away. I like to think, that for me, it will mean a time to 'wake up'. After so many

years of giving all I possess, mentally, to the pupils in my care, I have lost sight of who "I" really am. I need to discover "ME" and like all explorers, I will have a great time. Where shall I start? By giving my brain and my emotions time to quieten down. Then I will do as all explorers do, gather all the equipment I need for my journey. Beautiful music, meditation, yoga, writing equipment, some paint brushes (fence) a good art tutor, nothing to do with fence, a discussion group, friends, peace, and above all, for real survival, to find the dignity I feel has been slowly drained from me over the past few years. I'm looking forward to my journey and though I feel I still have hundreds of years teaching left in me, it is time to go.

Many thanks to all the pupils who have made my twenty-five years, at times, a joyous time, and thanks to my colleagues who have been there when I needed them."

FROM THE DIARY OF A YOUNG ENGLISHMAN

Late last summer, holidaying in France I had the good fortune to visit an exhibition completely refreshing in its uniqueness. Entitled 'BIRTHRITES', it took me on a journey through the history of mankind which quite startled my former perception of it. In fact I must correct myself - for it specifically sought to illustrate an historical glimpse of Womankind; the 'Other History' somehow overlooked, which when rediscovered, enthuses one's awareness of Humanity and its past.

As I walked through great corridors of cave art I saw emerging from the generous strokes and energy-driven forms a vision of fertility worship, a people who recognised the growth and birth of all things in nature as a part of the feminine principle. This was the expression of a strong reverence for women, who were inherent life-keepers and nourishers because they possessed wombs and mysterious menstrual blood; they were precious.

Stunningly, this concept of feminine sacredness was universal to hundreds, maybe thousands of diverse primitive peoples. I saw the creations of the world's ancestors; venus figures without number in their various manifestations; fat and heavy-breasted, beneficent, beautiful to innocent minds. Crudely shaped or artfully depicted, these deities were one in essence. Tokens of their powers abounded in indigenous art and worship. Representatives of moon goddesses appeared in the lore of East and West, in Indian arcana and Welsh poetry, from Indonesian legend and Chinese tradition. I viewed the fertility symbols in the dances of the African and in the harvest festivals of the Greek. I saw the women revered as storehouses of knowledge in Arabian Africa, admired for their mastery of wortcunning in England, cherished as wisewomen in South America . . . I watched fine tenacious women leading armies for their clans and countries, and others feeding villages with their enterprise. The emblems of

primal admiration were precious; on them depended the flourishing crops, the healthy babies, and the strength of the menfolk.

Yet through the centuries I sensed the unvoiced jealousy of a man and the tragedy of power-perverted leadership. Through religious excuses I saw a woman who could not speak out and another who was killed for witch-craft. I saw faces subdued behind protective black veiling and others bruised by misdirected anger. I saw cities of women who washed and cooked and bore children for love or obedience and nations who gave their women to men as possessions.

I trembled for these multitudes and marvelled at their dignity as they carried water and sacrificed lifetimes and rejoiced when a girl-child learned to write her name and read. I pitied the patriarchs who legislated frantically to tie up women's freedom and felt the awe of victory when a daughter stood to take her place as a world citizen. I sighed to realise the one-sided documentation of my own contemporary culture, and settled my hope on the few isolated tribes who still uphold Woman as likened to God, the Life-Giver.

At that moment I understood the passion of the despised suffragists and their indignation at the libraries of men's stories and perpetual celebration of distinguished men. For here in front of me lay thousands of years of heroic lives deemed by male historians unworthy of recount. The feminine principle, glorified and degraded while constantly fuelling the earth's motion . . . I wanted every one to know that this age is for achieving wholeness and justice; and for the fertility dances to be revived.

I departed from those museum-halls through a pavilion of French flowers and to the rhythm of peasant music. In my heart I stored each tender image, which seemed to me like the missing pages of a very ancieint book.

Shows like 'Beverly Hills 90210' commercialise serious teenage themes. Problems such as drug abuse, alcohol and teenage sex are dealt with on a regular basis. It seems everything happens to the cast. To hear one night Dylan coping with alcohol addiction and then Steve cheating the school, leaves parents wondering " Just what do my teenagers do?" and teenagers wondering "Where do I get a life like that?". To add insult to injury, every member of the cast fits into the beautiful starlet - mould which very few teenagers fit into. Surely, if this is what we do to our knowledge, would not the time, money and effort be better spent on guidance counsellors, drug and alcohol rehabilitation, better teaching facilities and, dare anyone advise it, family communication.

Not even current affairs is immune. It, too, has been commercially adapted with euphemisms. When a soldier is shot by him own army, it is called 'friendly fire'; oil leakages are sometimes referred to as 'mousse', and what the common people would call a depression is called a 'necessary economic downturn'. Competition for having the largest viewing audience has created the battle for showing the harder hitting and socially aware documentary. Australia's 'Sex' programme, despite having serious discussions on issues such as gay rights and abortions, also continues to screen material on 'sexier dressing' and 'amateur pornography stars' which seems to have little to do with the important debates on sex.

Let us not forget the violence screened on television. Not only in cartoons where a cat happily belts his friend about the head to the cry of 'happy, happy, joy, joy'; not only in action movies where Rambo successfully manages to cleanse a wound by burning it with gunpowder, but also in our news coverage of wars. It is estimated that by the time a child reaches the age of 17, the child would have witnessed over

10,000 murders or acts of violence.

Knowledge is not only science but economics is also a part of that knowledge. It, too, is being wasted in one of America's current problems, drugs. Some of the greatest moneymakers would have to be those dealing in the millions of dirty dollars that circulate in the American drug scene, and in a land where Donald Trump is an idol, imagine what heroes could be made by diverting criminals into legal paths. This is not forgetting the chemistry involved with the manufacturing of these drugs, skills that could easily fit into the socially acceptable oil and pharmaceutical industries.

Some would immediately key into a problem with this, the money incentive. But look at it like this. Donald Trump did not become famous for being poor, and the pay packet of a chemical engineer would far exceed that of a cocaine technician. More possibly is the education of minority groups, those who need the education are not getting it. Instead of spending millions on another blockbuster movie or the arms war, perhaps money could be spent on the education of the poor and the re-education of those who offend.

Above all else, though, the biggest waste in our society is the waste of ourselves. We have segregated ourselves into colour, race, sex, religion, age, social standing and cashflow. We wage wars and kill large numbers of the population for what would amount to less than the bit of land between two blades of grass in comparison to the galaxy. Prostitution, drugs, alcohol, rape, violence, war, unemployment are large wastes of what I am reluctant to call resources, reluctant because we are far more important.

In the words of William Shakespeare

"Far the sweetest things turn sourest by their deeds Lilies that fester smell far worse than weeds."

We who are the future cannot let ourselves, or our knowledge, become the sewage of a system that only perpetuates this waste, for the waste of ourselves is tenfold the waste of our knowledge. We can correct the misuse of our knowledge. It is much harder to correct the misuse of ourselves

In conclusion, a friend said to me.

"When weak, act strong, when strong, act weak."

I would like to adjust this to

"When weak, be strong,

when strong, be stronger."

With so much waste in our history and so much waste in our present, the future depends on our strength to change. We must not let ourselves become waste.


BIRTH OF CLARITY

"The Insect Play" by the Brothers Capek

1993 gave Spotswood theatre buffs a treat. For all sorts of reasons it was decided to present the major production in the Opera House. Next year the West End and/or Broadway!

Over eighty students auditioned for the forty-five parts; the sixth form communications class prepared the set and some of the costumes; large numbers of staff helped out in many, many ways; parents chipped in their usual wonderful support; the community at large supported the production too. And. Because of the very high quality of the show everyone was a winner.

The characters in the play were almost all insects sounds a bit like a kids show - but no, each of the four scenes examined some deep and meaningful aspect of life just like one would expect from a school play, being an educational institution, and all. In fact, there were some murmurings that the play, and its venue, might be more than the college could manage. We should not fail to mention the one metre high dung ball which with its attendant dung beetles was an audience favourite.

Very impressive was the acting of the students. People who know about these things said that this was not a kids show, that it was a professional production, that the actors used their voices professionally, that the actors moved beautifully, that the whole play worked together, that you don't see better theatre from adults, that this was 'Theatre' (said with a capital T). One prominent New Plymouth producer who saw the show said that 'The Insect Play' was "the best student repoduction I have seen in my life!"

All credit must go to the student actors who performed with a maturity well beyond their years. No-one in the very large cast stood out as not belonging to this high quality production. The show was a wonderful evidence of what happens when lovely people pool their talents and commitment to a project. The result is success on success.

This show was a complete theatre experience for all those involved. 



Group One also had a great week (so we've heardalthough we don't know how!) working well together and achieving all the tasks set.










It is the game bird season and they are a sought after prize. In almost every part of the woods a hunter is hiding, in huge nests made from branches and leaves waiting for just such birds as themselves.

Sure enough, a hunter is waiting nearby. He has built his hide about 80 yards away on a ridge, under a willow tree. He is cunningly hidden and he remains perfectly still. The birds step further into the open, their confidence building. They are within the huntsman's range now, but still on the ground. Malcolm Mayflower is a star, a celebrity, although if you were to see him now you would never have guessed it. Dressed in a pair of patched up corduroys, a thick woollen jersey and a pair of scuffed but sturdy tramping boots, one could be forgiven for mistaking him as an everyday recreational game hunter - just the impression that Malcolm was aiming for. His sudden rush to stardom as the leading actor in a surprisingly successful British mini-series was enough to make even the most level head spin. The birds move further into view. Malcolm waits. Throughout the series and for weeks after it had finished he had been hounded by the media. At first it had been flattering - interviews, articles, features about his career. Then the tabloid press joined the game. Since then he had had more publicity than he could ever have coped with, and mostly bad. The retriever sitting quietly by his side begins to whine with impatience. Malcolm waits. One reporter, a young man with no respect for the truth, had followed him constantly, trying to record his conversations, begging for any information that was " previously unknown" and harassing his friends and family for any childhood secrets that could be exploited. Once there was even an article that implied he had once had an incestuous relationship with his aunt. There were no facts in the story, of course, as it was absolute rubbish, but the implications had caused a lot of stress for himself and his family. Malcolm had developed an intense dislike for the man. The birds look up nervously towards the hide and halt in their tracks. Malcolm chooses to wait.

The hunting trip was a secret. Malcolm had told only two people - his father and the old groundsman. He knew that his father would be faithful to the end, never leak the

whereabouts of his trip. The old groundsman, Malcolm didn't know very well, but he had to tell someone else other than his father so he told the old groundsman. Malcolm smiles to himself. He knows that the young reporter will conduct a thorough search, do anything to find his hideaway. The birds move into the centre of the clearing. The dog whines. Still, Malcolm waits. On the other side of the ridge, about 70 yards away and through the trees is his cabin. He chose this spot for his hide as he knew the clearing to be a popular feeding ground for grouse, and 70 yards from the cabin is "roughing it" enough for Malcolm. The birds seem quite content now, peeking around in the clearing. Malcolm waits. Ten minutes become twenty. Still the birds remain in the clearing. Still Malcolm waits. Suddenly, out of the corner of his eye he catches a glimpse of movement through the trees. The birds begin to move out of the clearing. Malcolm raises the loaded 12 gauge shotgun to his shoulder and turns towards his target in one fluid movement. Gently he squeezes the slack out of his trigger and centres his sights on his prey. At only 60 yards he can be sure of this shot. He squeezes the trigger just a fraction more and the forest explodes in a crash of sound.

The clearing is empty. The whole forest is alarmingly still. Malcolm crawls out of the hide and stretches his legs. A quick scan of the surrounding forest confirms to him that his aim had been sure. He slowly approaches the body of the young reporter, stretched limply on the forest floor. Staring down into that familiar and well hated face, now peppered with shot, Malcolm waits for the guilt to come, come quickly so that he can deal with it quickly. Those staring, sightless eyes give him no such regrets. However, Malcolm smiles to himself. It had been worth the wait.




They were then allocated to Form 3 form teachers who were then trained and allocated to the new students.

Conclusion:


