As a school community we continually stress that students should "seize the opportunity and be involved". Many have done just that and I am proud to celebrate some amazing achievements.


- Kardeze won the Taranaki Regional Young Enterprise Scheme Programme and were rewarded with a National Award for Safety in October.

You have to upload it, the old fashioned way, under the olive tree, with reading, writing and arithmetic, travel, study, reflection, museum visits and human interaction."

Obituary for Miss Alison Simpson, B.Sc

It is with great sorrow that we record the death in Havelock North on the 1st of July 2005 of our very first Senior Mistress, Alison Simpson, at the age of 90.

When Spotswood College opened in 1960, there were 139 third form (Year 9) students - 76 girls and 63 boys. As one of the 12 foundation staff members in 1960, Miss Simpson was Senior Mistress for three years from 1960-1962 before taking early retirement. Miss Simpson had come to Spotswood College from Te Awamutu College and taught Maths and Science. In 1969 Miss Simpson married to become Mrs Hewitt and after her husband's death moved to the Hawkes Bay area in 1989.

In his Principal's report in the 1962 Spotswood College Magazine Mr Alex McPhail wrote " It is fitting that I should pay a very great tribute to the work of Miss Simpson who completes her service at the end of this year. The school has been fortunate to have her wise guidance and leadership in many matters. Her wide experience and sympathetic but firm administration of the girls' side of the school in these our early years have made the task of establishing sound traditions much easier. I am sure that staff and parents besides the students themselves would desire me to extend their very best wishes to Miss Simpson and hope that her retirement may be long and happy."



The International Space Camp will help us to understand the physical, emotional and mental effects astronauts have in space and the preparation before take off.


After:



















Special Needs Unit

The Special Needs Unit is a branch of the Spotswood College Special Education Department and helps to make Spotswood College unique compared to the other colleges throughout Taranaki. Spotswood College is not only coeducational and multi-cultural but it also caters to a diverse range of students, some of who have special needs.

The Special Needs Unit is a very busy place for the 15 students, ranging in ages from 13 to 21, 8 teacher aides and 3 teaching staff. Between 8.30am and 3pm the students carry out their own individual programmes that have been set through consultation with varying therapists, the teacher and parents and caregivers.

Within the day students participate in a range of modified learning experiences such as communication, ASDAN, living skills, transition, work experience, speech, gym, CCS Swimming, physiotherapy, occupational therapy and also the core subjects of English, Mathematics, Reading, Handwriting, Social Studies, Science and Computers.

The students also attend option classes: Art, Craft, Cooking, Drama, Music, Physical Education and Textiles. The students love these classes and along with the help of their very supportive, caring and patient teacher aides and various therapists (physio, speech and occupational) have produced some fantastic pieces of work and put their skills into practice within different learning environments. A huge amount of appreciation and thanks is put aside to the teachers of these classes.

Education outside the classroom also plays an important part in the students learning and it is through these learning experiences that the students are able to further develop and use their social and communication skills. This year we have been on shopping excursions, a mountain trip, visited the Museum and Art Gallery, zoo, circus, various landmarks (beaches and parks), school sports and activity days. A highlight of the year would have to be the fantastic sleepover in the Special Needs Unit complete with tents, a big screen movie, treasure hunt and the student's parents joining us for dinner.

2005 has been a fantastic and rewarding year for all in the Special Needs Unit and we are looking forward to 2006 and its new subjects, teachers, students and challenges.

Music Department News

It has been an enjoyable and busy year in the Music Department this year. In addition to 6 existing instrumental tutors Mr W Orr (Band Director and brass), Mr P Bowering (electric bass/Senior Music Technology), Mrs J Dodd (flute), Mr K Sole (guitar), Ms N Dixon (violin) and Mrs G Riddle (cello), we employed two further tutors this year, namely Mr P Jefferies (drum kit) and Mr P Malcolm (choir) to meet the range of choices Spotswood College students indicated they would like to have the opportunity to be involved with. Over 77 students enjoyed instrumental tuition provided by the school, not counting those in the Concert Band and Hatrix or those who booked the music room at lunchtime for band practices (booked everyday of the week!) to different groups of keen musicians. Phew, earplugs are handy things!

Mr B Bradshaw has also been teaching classes in a part time capacity this year teaching Year 10 Band and Year 13 Music and playing in or guest conducting the Concert Band. Mrs M Howard and Ms J Parkinson have been of invaluable assistance as Arts Coordinators. The Concert Band has rehearsed on a Tuesday and Thursday morning before school and there have been 18 members, many of these players help to make up the jazz band although not everyone is in both. Hatrix had their rehearsal on a Tuesday night. Choir began in term one under my watchful eye on a Wednesday lunchtime but I decided that I would rather hand this task over to a specialist so from the start of term 3 Mr Malcolm has been taking the choir on a Friday morning before school.

So, now you know the background what have the school bands or music department done or been involved with this year?

Term 1 - On February 22nd all music students attended a concert by the Air Force Band at the TSB Showplace. In early March, we hosted Fielding Agricultural Colleges' Celtic Band. They stayed in the Whaitata and held an open workshop for our students on the Saturday morning prior to attending the WOMAD Festival. In late March many students then dedicated themselves to rehearsing and polishing performances for playing in the Spotswood Idol evening. Included in the line up were many new talents and private bands within the school including an ad hoc group of staff "judges" and students called the Push Up Brass. Študents generally offered high standard musical performances constantly supported by the enthusiastic and supportive audience. Rockband WASH came the next day to perform a lunchtime gig. In April band students attended Strike percussion at the neighbouring Woodleigh School.

Term 2 was just as busy. Music mentor Peter Jefferies in association with the New Zealand Music Commission was in the school over this term offering us real music industry contact and some free coaching sessions. He opened the activities for the term by running a workshop on "How to write a composition/an introduction to the Music industry" which was attended by lots of instrumental and band students. Mr Jefferies used his time in school to work with a range of classes and abilities from seniors to Special Needs but mainly worked with the Year 13 Band Rival State. No other school has been offered this free mentoring twice and it is a real credit to the talented Rival State boys that he could visit again.

The main event of the term was the Rockquest Taranaki Finals which saw Rival State go through to the National Finals and Five Point Turn also represent Spotswood College admirably. Many of our students performed in the Gershwin concert of the New Plymouth Orchestra and students took advantage of discounted tickets to schools to see the Rodger Fox Jazz concert at the TSB Showplace. Hatrix performed wonderfully at the inaugural Taranaki Big Sing held at New Plymouth Girls' High School in June and had an open rehearsal at the schools Open Day. The following day the Concert Band and Hatrix took to the minivans and went to Hamilton for the Hamilton Band Festival. Both bands were given the grading of Silver. As well as a high standard of music making, an excellent time was had by all.

In July came the Fish n Chip Band get-together night held in the staffroom. This was organised by Band Boosters and consisted of socialisation of all band members and their families and a DVD. Rock Band A Life with You, supported by Rival State, performed a lunchtime gig and gave a workshop on an Introduction to Bands. This was open to all music students. Rival State also performed an under-age rage gig at The Mill, which involved 3 other bands from around the country and lots of moshing about by the audience. The Year 10 Band performed at the final assembly of term along with a band made up of international students, which made for a fun way to end the term.

Term 3's activities began with Alfonso Rios (Peruvian percussionist) visiting the school and giving an interactive percussion workshop for Spotswood College students and other schools from around the district as part of the Taranaki Festival of the Arts. Many musicians from the bands and the wider school were then involved in the Tsunami Appeal Concert. This was collaboration between Spotswood College, New Plymouth Orchestra, Ars Nova and New Plymouth Youth Orchestra in the hall on the 7th of Åugust,

which raised enough money to buy a new house. via the Red Cross. The Concert Band opened the concert followed by Hatrix. Orchestral musicians then combined in the finale of the concert with the New Plymouth Orchestra for a joint rendition of Lord of the Rings. Later in the term, the Year 9 band played at the Year 9 levels assembly and the finals of the Rockquest were held in Wellington with Rival State representing Spotswood College. Although the boys did not win the highly

unpredictable competition they came away with substantial credibility for being one of the top 8 bands in the country for the second year in a row and drummer Sylvester Stone was awarded a MAINZ (Music Audio Institute of New Zealand) scholarship for outstanding musicianship valued at \$4,000. On the 6th of September the bands again went out and about, this time on the Around the Mountain annual trip to feeder schools around Taranaki. We visited Opunake High School and Hawera Intermediate. Sam Parkinson got into the National Secondary Schools Brass Band. To end the term on the first day of the holidays Hatrix played in the Registered Music Teachers Institute concert at the Theatre Royal in the TSB Theatre. This was to raise money for the Hospice. They were at their toe tapping best yet again. Logan Squire's very professional quartet were also employed to play at Ms Pattens wedding as well as playing at assembly.

Term 4 involved the following fixtures: the Golden Oldies Concert and the All Bands performance evening and prize giving. Alongside assessments, meetings and HOD administrative commitments I have certainly been kept on my toes.

Many thanks to all students who have performed in any shape or capacity this year at assembly or elsewhere. My deepest gratitude goes to my wonderful colleagues in the music department and throughout the school for your help and support this year.

Gateway

2005 has proved a very successful year for our Gateway students with 70 taking the opportunity to participate in the programme.

Gateway offers a type of learning that students find relevant and encourages them to continue with their school-based learning. It also teaches them a work ethic in a supportive environment and can help them to identify and test future career options. Being given a task for employment can increase their self confidence and motivation and increase their career aspirations. Gateway has also provided opportunities for part-time work and has lead to some apprenticeships and provided students with a work record and reference for a CV.

Penny Reid is just one of the Spotswood College students to take part in the programme, a step which paved the way to a career. "Since a very early age I have wanted to become a hairdresser" she says. "I applied for the Gateway programme and was accepted and placed at Be Ba Bo Hair Salon. "After working there on Fridays from 10am until about 6.30 pm for about a month they offered me weekend work on Saturday's and recommended that I should apply for an apprenticeship. Within a week of handing in my CV I got an interview and had to find a hair model to take in to assess my hairdressing skills. The following night I got a phone call from the owner saying that I had the apprenticeship".

Salvi Stone is another Spotswood College student, in Year 13, who has been able to extend his studies and practical work in music through Gateway. "My job is to visit secondary schools in the Taranaki region and assist New Zealand Music Commission mentor, Peter Jefferies, in encouraging young musicians to write and record original compositions," he explains. "Also Peter and I are both drummers and so we're also able to offer drum tuition to students. I am a member of the band Rival State and my experience in this group allows me to offer mentoring advice. Since my involvement with the programme I have learnt a lot of things from both Peter and the students themselves such as the recording techniques, encouraging both beginners and more advanced students, effective time management and, one of the most important things, networking skills. The Gateway programme has allowed me to combine my activities with the band and my work at school in a way that will prepare me for a career in music. It has motivated me even more to succeed in my chosen field."

Peter Jefferies is full of praise for the Gateway programme, Spotswood College and more particularly, Salvi himself. "He is a real asset to

what I do," he says. "So far he has made over 50 visits to schools. He is very talented and yet very unassuming and is able to get through to the students on their level. That helps me get accepted and endorses what I am doing. As a member of Rival State, about the coolest band in town, he has an instant rapport with students who also respect him because he walks his talk – he is really out there doing it. He certainly makes his school look cool, Spotswood College has become known as the "cool school for music."

Other students who have had success in gaining either apprenticeships or full time employment on the scheme are Bradley Shotter with Street and Cook Builders, Ian Hammond, plumbing, Rebekah Cannell at New Plymouth Vet Group and Stephen Bond who has gained an apprenticeship with Fitzroy Yachts.

We have again been overwhelmed by the generosity of the businesses and industries within the community who have provided workplaces for our students and given of their time sharing their skills.

We look forward to another successful Gateway year in 2006.

WITT Hospitality Star Course



40-Hour Famine Training Camp

Earlier this year the option came up for Michael Riley, Daniel Ferguson and myself to travel down to Wellington for the 40 Hour Famine Training Camp. We would leave on the Friday morning and return on Sunday. Who wouldn't like the idea of a day off school and a trip to Wellington that school pays for? We all jumped at the chance with a nudging from last years Head Boy, Nic George, who told us that the food was great!

Friday morning, no clue as to what the boys were doing, I skipped school and went shopping for those last minute necessities. We turned up at Boys' High at 12 to find groups from Girls' High, Boys' High, Waitara High and Costal Taranaki School waiting for the bus. It arrives and we pile on and our trip begins.

We arrive around 6pm at El Rancho Waikanae. find our cabins and then have tea. We were not really that hungry as we stopped at McDonalds and had something to eat there. This was kindly paid for by Hanna McKee, one of the leaders who traveled down with us. The owner of those chicken nuggets, fries and chocolate thick shake never did show up! More for me!

Well that's beside the point, I'm meant to be talking about the famine and here I am discussing food! So anyway, we end up with hundreds of other students from all over the North Island sitting in a hall with handbooks on our knees and the first thing they do is make us take one shoe off. The next thing we know our shoes are in a pile up the front and we are fishing out some total strangers shoe and walking around trying to find them while at the same time keeping an eye out for our own shoe. I must have walked past mine so many times ... it was good for a laugh.

The first night was a "get to know each other" night. We soon made friends. But it wasn't all fun and games. We discussed what World Vision and the 40 Hour Famine is about. We learnt about AIDS and the impact it is having on 4.4 billion people who live in the Third World. And we learnt how we could help by spreading the word. We learnt that just \$1 can provide an appointment for a sick child at a hospital in Papua New Guinea and that \$3 will provide a meal for a family of four. Imagine what could be done with \$150? \$150 could free a child from bonded labour in India. Your spare coins may be worthless to you but can mean everything to a child who is growing up with nothing.

In the morning, during our meeting in the hall, we were told to greet three people we didn't know

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with a handshake. Then we greeted three more. Those who had been greeted by the leaders were told they had contracted AIDS and those of us who had shaken their hands had contracted the HIV virus off them. This was the setting for the whole day. We were sorted into families and with these families we had to do certain tasks that are everyday activities to people living in third world countries. But (there's always a catch!) those who had AIDS had to be carried everywhere.

So we headed off to do our daily activities and we already knew that if you contracted AIDS in a third world country it was believed a witch doctor had put a curse on you. My family was lucky because although we had superstitions about AIDS we decided we would risk going to the medical centre to get tested and a miracle happened, we were all cured! This helped, as we didn't have to carry anyone anymore. I won't go into depth about the other activities but they included filtering muddy water, which ended up still being disgusting and someone had to drink it; making a toy out of a cardboard box, a plastic bag, string, sticks, a plastic milk bottle, newspaper and stones; ride a tandem bike carrying a container of pinecones; chase sheep around a paddock and get them to a trough then calm them down and visit a witch doctor, which was cool. I got pushed up a hill in a wheelbarrow but the witchdoctor wasn't much help.

So we learnt a thing or two about what we were to do and how to get about doing it. Then it was time to go home and put it all into practice. So after a few heart rendering goodbyes from the boys to the girls they had met, we returned home with many ideas and plans to put into action.

Back home, we recruited Chloe Hook and Jessica Kilpatrick and set about organizing the famine. One mufti day and a black and white social later, we were tired out but happy. We hadn't raised as much money as we hoped to but we had done our part. So I will leave you with some thoughts: "You've got to do your own growing, no matter how tall your grandfather is!" and "Be the change you want to see in the world" (Mahatma Gandhi)


The concert raised over a thousand dollars for relief towards the Tsunami disaster. I enjoyed playing in this worthwhile event.

Tuatara Visit

Half way through Term 2, Year 12 Biology had a very special visitor - a tuatara. The visit was part of a nationwide road show. Around 30-40 students got a hands-on approach to the ecology of this endangered native New Zealand icon. All students got to handle the tuatara, who was extremely cold and almost lifeless.

Tuatara is a Maori word meaning "peaks on the back." The tuatara is famous because it is a very



ancient - it is the only survivor of a large group of reptiles that roamed the earth at the same time as the dinosaurs. It

hasn't changed its form much in over 225 million years! The relatives of tuatara died out about 60 million years ago, which is why the tuatara is sometimes called a 'living fossil' - cool.

The tuatara cannot be found on the mainland any longer, but is restricted to a few "predator free" offshore islands, the main one being Stevens Island in the Cook Straight. Here there are about 50,000 adults.

Some interesting facts:

- They are capable of holding their breath for nearly an hour
- Male tuatara can weigh up to 1500grams

- A tuatara's average life span is about 60 years but they can live to be over 100 years old

- Young tuatara usually hunt for food during the day - to avoid being eaten by adult tuatara at night! - Át 18° C all tuatara hatched are female - what a cool discovery for the breeding programme needed to keep the population thriving.

We were very privileged in seeing the tuatara so close up and we will remember this visit as a highlight of our schooling year.

Year 12 Social Science Trip to Auckland







We explored the visual and expressive potential of the photographic medium using a 35mm camera!


We learnt so many new techniques and styles of photography such as night time photography, photo construction, double exposure and more.

Australian Youth Olympics Festival 2005

Earlier this year I went to the Australian Youth Olympic Festival in Sydney from 18th to the 24th of January. This was the third time this event had been run. It is held every two years at Olympic venues from the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney.

Te Kura Tuarua o Ngamotu

This year there were 1400 male and female athletes, aged between 14 and 19, from around 25 countries around the world. They would compete in 14 different sports: Archery, Athletics, Basketball, Canoe/Kayak Flat-water and Slalom, Cycling Track and Road, Diving, Equestrian Dressage and Showjumping, Gymnastics Artistic, Trampoline and Rhythmic, Judo, Rowing, Shooting, Swimming, Volleyball and Weightlifting.

I competed in Archery which was held at the Sydney Olympic Park Archery Centre. There were two events in archery; the men's and women's individual match play was held over the first two days of competing, and then the teams' match play held on the third and last day.

On the 21st of January all competitors shot 72 arrows at 70 metres for the ranking round. After the ranking round I was placed 17th. This meant I had to shoot-off to see who stays in for the 1/16round. I beat Luke Coleman from Australian to stay in and advance to the 1/8 (quarterfinals) round. It was here that I got beaten going up against You-Shiuan Lin from Chinese Taipei, the top ranked archer.

It was in this same round that my two team mates were also beaten. James Nightingale lost to Rommel Ceguerra and Logan Cooke lost to Ricci Cheah. The individual results for the men ended up with Chris Medely (Australia) Winning gold, You-Shiuan Lin (Chinese Taipei) winning Silver and Jesse McDonald (Australia) winning Bronze.

The individual results for the women ended up with a clean sweep for Chinese Taipei. With Juihsien Tai winning gold, Li-wen Tseng winning silver and Yen-Ling Chen winning bronze. All of these were from Chinese Taipei.

Then the next event was the team's match play on the 23rd of January. Team New Zealand consisting of Logan, James and myself went up against Australia 2 in the ¼ Finals. We lost 217 to 174.

The Men's Teams Medals went to Chinese Taipei (Gold), Australia 1 (Silver) and Australia 3 (Bronze). The Woman's team's results weren't much different with Chinese Taipei getting gold, Australia 1 Silver and Australia 2 Bronze.

I had a great experience in Sydney one that I will never forget and one that our team will never forget. I look forward to the next one in 2007 and would love to go again!

It is again with great pleasure that we can report on another very successful year for the various junior and senior girls' teams that have represented Spotswood College at Indoor and Beach Volleyball during the last twelve months.

The major highlights during the past year were:
