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## **2017 PRINCIPAL'S PRIZEGIVING ADDRESS**

Madam Chair, Kuia Andrys, Kuia Diane, Kaumatua Uncle Jimmy Pokere and Mr Barry Finch, distinguished guests including Coach McKean & Rachel, Board Members, PTA members, Komiti Maori members, Students, Staff, Parents Family, Whanau and friends of our school a very warm welcome to you all. Your attendance tonight reminds us that our school is a community school and that our community is vitally interested in the success of our young people and the ongoing development of our school. We are very grateful of your support.

As part of our ongoing self-review we have been reflecting on who we are as a school. We have been asking..., is the direction of the school as articulated through our current vision and value statements clear, relevant and understood by all stakeholders?

Working through this question myself and considering that this is my last Senior Prizegiving as Principal I have spent time revisiting key Prizegiving messages over the past 7 Principal's Reports. I wanted to check for consistency of philosophy vision and values over the years and to get a sense of the progress we have made.

Please indulge me as I quote from these previous reports:

#### **IN 2010 I WROTE**

We are a diverse and inclusive school. Our unique student mix helps develop tolerance and recognition of difference.

We are determined to lift levels of student engagement and achievement but to do so we will need to take learning risks, make change and challenge ourselves through rigorous and ongoing self-review.

We are a caring and supportive school, we believe relationships are central to raising levels of achievement. And indeed since 2010 our achievement as measured through NCEA rates have consistently improved.

#### IN 2011 I WROTE

Developing young people of character who are prepared and educated to meet the demands of the 21st Century is a challenge. It requires that as a community we work together in partnership, within a set of shared values and with a willingness to understand our differences but also to celebrate our similarities. As educationalists it challenges us to adapt and develop a curriculum that is rich, relevant and robust.

Since 2011 curriculum review has been a constant part of our work.

#### IN 2012 I WROTE

Education is shifting from a traditional transmission model of learning to a personalized one where individuals co-construct their pathways. Students require the higher order thinking skills of analysis, evaluation and interpretation upon which to base decisions and make judgements. Hand in hand with high level thinking skills is the need for a set of explicitly stated values which are understood and shared by the whole school. Our school-wide ETŪ programme is being developed to meet this need through the defining and understanding of values of respect, co-operation, care for one another, courage, honesty and responsibility.

Currently, in 2017 we are reviewing our ETŪ systems to lift its profile and relevancy helping students to see that a NCEA Certificate is meaningless without the roots of character associated with ETÜ skills which are also employability skills.

#### IN 2013 I WROTE

EPOTSWOOD COLLEGE SCHOOL MARAZINE 2017

When exploring the purpose of education, parents, teachers and the wider community, invariably identify 3 key purposes:

- 1. Growing 'good' people
- 2. Engaging young people to participate and contribute to their community
- 3. Equipping young people with skills, knowledge and attitudes for employment.

We need to live in communities where relationships are strong and communication effective, where right and wrong are not only taught but modelled also.

This partnership is crucial if we are to do the best we can for our young people in New Zealand.

We continue to reach-out to our community through our PTA, Komiti Maori, sport associations, cultural and art experiences, Gateway and Transition programmes.

#### IN 2014 I WROTE

At Spotswood College we embrace the approach of placing each individual student at the centre of our plans, tasks and activities.

During 2014 we have reviewed the curriculum further to ensure that we better meet the diverse strengths, interests and pathway plans of individual students.

Responsive student centred learning programmes have contributed to once again improving our annual school NCEA results. Having worked hard over the past two years on raising levels of achievement in Levels 1 & 2 our attention is now moving toward improving outcomes for Level 3 students. Since 2014 Level 3 results have improved in 2015 and 2016. We are projecting another year of good results coming from 2017.

#### IN 2015 I WROTE

Science and Technology have long been vaunted as the tools for solving the planets challenges. Science will find a solution to the sustainability issues inherent in the use of fossil fuels, Science will provide mechanisms to ensure sufficient food is available for the planets bourgeoning populations, Science will solve the issues of climate change, pollution, aging and so on.

But can Science build unity across diverse populations, assist communities to agree upon universal values, develop mutual respect regardless of ethnic, cultural and religious differences? Can Science assist mankind to address the inequities created by an economic system based on competition?

Students at Spotswood College are creative thinkers and they do recognize the values that underpin successful groups. Our recognition and acceptance of diversity, our willingness to include people who are different from ourselves and our commitment to caring for one another are key skills required more than ever for life.

#### IN 2016 I WROTE

Our school vision statement...." developing young people of good character with the skills and knowledge to contribute to the increasingly complex and connected global society" implies, rather than explicitly stating, that the preparation and development of young people is to enable them to participate and contribute to our community (local or global) primarily through the world of work.

Schools have made significant changes in response to the challenges of youth employment. With

this change, Communities need to understand the challenges and to appreciate that the number of students gaining entrance to University or the number of scholarships attained by academic students can no longer be the only valid measure of an effective school. The work of our Te Waka Huarahi team through Gateway and Transition courses have brought an alignment to learning for earning, contextualising and making learning meaningful for our students.

Finally a quote going back to the 2012 report - ... working in education can seem at times like taking a wild stallion on a walk with a short lead.

In saying that while the stallion gets away on us from time to time our focus remains steadfast on outcomes for students. Effective relationships through our ETŪ work combined with teaching practice development through the Poutamu Pounamu Professional Learning has us moving forward via our constant commitment to reviewing reflecting and acting on data and feedback. The vision and the values are consistent the challenge is, as always, to ensure that they are consistently applied school-wide.

The BOT are currently reviewing our charter and at this point in the process identify Health and Wellness and our Bi-cultural approaches through Poutamu Pounamu as key strategic focus points to work on for 2018.

Along with our teaching and learning efforts we are really encouraged to see significant traction in our property development. The new Learning Support Centre will be open for the beginning of next year, the gym will be completed during Term II and the new Science Block will be ready for the beginning of 2019. We look forward to our students and staff having the quality learning and teaching facilities that they deserve.

Despite property frustrations our students continue to achieve across academic, sporting, cultural and art based activities as demonstrated through this evenings accomplishments and captured on a data show put together by Mr Peters.

Congratulations to all students for your fabulous accomplishments, the contribution you have made to our school, and the growth and development we see in you as good young people ready for your next step challenges.

Teachers at our school continue to give of their best for our rangatahi. Thank you all for the energy commitment and passion you give so willingly.

We appreciate that developing good young people does not occur without huge input from parents, employers, community personnel, outside agencies, clubs, as well as, of course, the students themselves and their peer leaders through the Prefects, Student Council, Peer Supporters, Breakfast Club and so on. Thank you all for your contribution.

A number of staff members have left during the year and several will be leaving us at the end of the year.

Mrs Hodges was farewelled from our school in April of this year after 27 years service as a support staff member. Alison had been the Personal Assistant for 3 Principals. Her hard work, attention to detail and vast knowledge and experience was appreciated and acknowledged by all staff. Reports clearly indicate that her and Neil are making the most of their new found time.

Mr Stanford retired during Term III. He began teaching at our school in 2009 as Assistant HOD Maths and then became Head of the Maths Faculty in 2010. We wish Robin all the best for his retirement.

Jenny Ropitini worked as a Teacher Aide in Piki Te Mana from 2010 until the end of Term 3 this year. Jenny developed positive learning relationships with all of the students she supported with their literacy skills.

Mr Greenfield took leave for 2017 but has recently resigned from his HOD Music role to focus on his own musical development and to work across schools as an itinerant teacher. His contribution to Performing Arts through music over the past 11 years has been greatly appreciated.

Mrs Tran-Lawrence started at our school midway through 2013. During her time with us she has taught in a variety of faculties. Her care and support of students as a Dean and a SAF ensured that students achieved to their potential. After a year away sailing and travelling we may well see Mrs Tran-Lawrence back in the Spotswood College fold.

Mr McFadyen is taking a years leave during 2018. We wish him well as he pursues other interests but we look forward to his return in 2019.

Mrs Kim Walker has supported our Learning Support Centre students over the past two years. Her unconditional care and hard work was appreciated by students staff and parents.

The Technology Faculty gained much from having resident Maintenance Engineer John West to keep tools and machines running smoothly. During his two years with us his expertise was seen across our property as well as within the workshops.

Ms Willy left us in June on maternity leave, we look forward to her return midway through next year. Mr Oldfield has fitted into Ms Willy's role really well, we have appreciated his seamless transition into our school.

Leanne Stowers joined our Finance team in March, we have enjoyed her bright and cheerful approach to everybody she deals with.

Three teachers joined us at the beginning of the year, each one has made wonderful contributions. Mr James has been acting HOD Music and has recently been appointed permanently to take over from Mr Greenfield. Ms Brodie has taught Art and supported our Te Waka Awhina students. Mrs Gunn has been establishing our new student support programme Te Waka Awhina as well as teaching English. Her students and staff appreciate her positivity and commitment.

Mrs FitzPatrick is retiring after 20 years at our school. Her passion and expertise as a language teacher is revered across the province. Learning another language has not just been an academic exercise for students under Mrs Fitz's care but it has been a cultural, social, gastronomic and travel adventure. Trips to Spain, Argentina, Greece and New Caledonia have ensured that students have experienced their Spanish French and Classical Studies in context. Deaning, Peer Support, Sheilah Winn Shakespeare Festivals, Lingofest experience have all gained from her enthusiasm and leadership. We will miss Mrs Fitz and wish her and Gavin a wonderful retirement.

## MR HILL LEAVING

It is with both sadness and excitement that I am leaving Spotswood College. I have been here eleven years... wow! Time files. I have really learnt a lot and accomplished things I am really proud of. I really appreciate all of the opportunities Spotswood has given me and all of the people I have met along the way. However, I am going to improve my own acting skills at a school called the Actors' Program and hopefully start a career in acting. This has been a long-term dream for me and it has been quite a journey getting to this place.

I never actually wanted to be a teacher - Haha! - but life is funny that way. Music and drama was all I ever wanted to do with my life. However, discovering a passion for literature and philosophy led me to university and to teaching.

I started at Spotswood under sad circumstances as I was employed to relieve for Kyle Gilmore who was on sick-leave because of cancer. Sadly, Mr Gilmore passed away and I was made a permanent teacher in the English department. I will always be grateful to Marni Stevenson for giving me my first break and being a great supporter of me. I think I got the job because when I was just a teacher-in-training here at Spotswood on placement, Marni's wedding singer cancelled at the last moment and I offered to do it. It was a lovely wedding and it was a privilege to be able to sing for the happy couple.

In the English department I got to teach all levels, year 13, scholarship, and I got to be the assistant HOD for a couple of years. I was also in a number of departments, when the roll was bigger, teaching English, drama, classics, and music at one point.

Gaenor Stoate gave me my second break, involving me in the drama department early on by performing in senior productions and teaching some junior and senior classes. She was a great mentor. It was an honour to be able to replace her as the HOD Drama when she left in 2014.

There are a number of things I am proud of I have to say.

- 1. Spotty Idol; I didn't start it but I grew it to what it became and I am so happy that it has helped so many talented Spotswood students develop their performance skills.
- **2. Footloose;** It is the only musical Spotswood has done since I've been here but it was cool to be a part of.

- 3. Senior productions; Our Country's Good, Frogs, Woyzech, Children of the Poor, The Crucible, Revenge of the Amazons, Ophilia Thinks Harder, King Lear, and Antigone. They weren't perfect, they didn't always have the biggest audiences but I'm proud of my students who engaged with this difficult and important material and always did it justice.
- 4. Classical Studies; not my field but because of my knowledge of Greek philosophy, classics was given to me. I learnt heaps, especially about art and architecture, and grew the subject to be quite a large senior option. I have such a love for the subject now that the recent trip to Greece and Italy was like a homecoming.
- 5. All of the assembly performances with Greenie; Mr Greenfield and I always loved performing at assemblies with students. There have been some memorable ones by my fave has to be when we did Carry On My Wayward Son.
- 6. Sheilah Winn Shakespeare; 2009 winning Most Thought Provoking Performance for our Merchant of Venice at nationals, helping a number of student directors get to nationals, Baylee O'Donnell-Martin winning Best Student Director at nationals, and just consistently trying to have a creative approach to Shakespeare.
- 7. Being a teacher at all; I was a crap high school student, dyslexic, really bad speller (my students know what I'm talking about), a bit anti-authority and restless but I overcame a lot of that to get my degree and my passion for learning motivated me to get in front of a classroom. It has been more than I thought I could ever do.

There are so many teachers and students that have made my time at Spotswood really rewarding. I couldn't possibly name them all. All I can say is thanks for memories. Spotswood has had an indelible impact on me; I hope I've made a difference here too.

Having worked as a teacher aide at Spotswood College for 18 months I gained the position of library manager towards the end of 2016.

2017 has been my first full year and I have enjoyed every minute of it. As an avid reader I have enjoyed sharing my love of books with the students, particularly when helping students select books for their reading logs. With the aim to making reading more accessible I have invested in an eBook platform which allows students & staff to have access to over 1500 books on any device, at any time, using their normal school Id's.

In the last few years ESOL students have been able to obtain NCEA credits by sitting papers in writing and reading comprehension. This enables them to progress academically at level 1 and level 2.

The classes take place with differentiation in mind so students individual needs are the main focus. This differentiation was assisted this year by Sabine De Crevoiser who was able to teach and support small groups of foundation and beginner students. Janet Wrightson-Lean assists with the pastoral care and

administration for both resident and international students.

There have also been two short stay groups who were integrated into the ESOL class this year. Ten Chinese students came for four weeks from Dongguan, and nine Japanese students for one week from Hatsukaichi.





We have had a very busy and active year. In March and August, we had two groups from Japan visiting our school. One group was from Kyotango city and Kyoto for the first time. Eight girls and one boy whom had passed an essay and an interview came to Spotswood College. The city is focussing on teaching its students the concept of being an international globalised student for the youth group to develop their English skills as well as understanding cultural differences between Japan and New Zealand.



All the students were only 14 years old and were amazingly good at understanding English. Everyone was so surprised by this since they had only been studying English for 2 years. We enjoyed having them in class and interacted with them in both English & Japanese. It was very successful and they really loved Spotswood College therefore they will return with fifteen students to our school next March. The second group Hatsukaichi High School as our sister school, paid us an official visit with ten students and senior management support Masaki Matsumoto who is a physics teacher.

Our Japanese class billeted them often with combined classes to improve both groups language and cultural understanding. We will use the services of this school relationship when we visit them next April as part of our fourthcoming Japan trip. As has been done in the last five years during the garden festival, I took our Year 10 students to Mr Iwata's tea house to take part in a tea ceremony event. This is a real treat for these students with an authentic tea ceremony within a traditional Japanese tea house imported from Mishima, Japan. Ngā mihi ki a tātou katoa

Kaupapa Māori has made significant progress in all areas at Spotswood College. There has been an increase in overall involvement and activity. Staff and students are becoming more culturally aware of the activities that are taking place in and out of Spotswood College grounds. We have become more actively involved with the community, providing cultural support for whanau as a way of building strong relationships between them and our kura. We are making steps towards improving our tikanga in accordance with Ngati Te Whiti.

Student retention rates have increased since 2014. With the introduction of JCEA into our kura, students are attaining experience towards NCEA, giving them a better understanding of how the system works and increasing their chances to succeed. Achievement and Unit standards are being taught in kaupapa Māori subjects to provide a differentiated programme for students. This enables us to create a programme that best meets the needs of all students in Kaupapa Māori.

This year we have re-instated core Māori at year 9. This is a part of demonstrating our commitment towards Te Reo Māori me ōna Tikanga. This year's programme has been successful in meeting all of the set outcomes. With support from our Senior Leadership Team, we will be introducing core Te Reo Māori at year 10 in 2018.

#### NOHO MARAE TERM 1

In term one this year, we held a noho for our students at Muru Raupatu Marae. Our kaupapa focus was on Tātai Whakapapa. Our students participated in marae based practices relevant to atua Māori.



This was an opportunity for our students to connect with our kōmiti Māori and representatives of Ngati Te Whiti.





They had listened to stories, helped out with marae duties, cooked a hangi, performed a powhiri for our principal, and took part in various art and sporting activities.

#### MĀORI PERFORMING ARTS

In Māori Performing Arts our students were engaged in practical activities. They were taught mau rakau, tī rakau, tititōrea, mahi whai (string games) as well as waiata, haka, poi and karakia.

This class consisted of mixed ability students, which included a number of students from our experienced unit. This is our example of diversity, inclusiveness and care within our kura. Our aim this year was to keep writing to a minimal and use a kinaesthetic approach towards learning.







#### **COMMUNITY BASED ACTIVITIES**

In term 3 we had a number of year 10's represent Spotswood College at a tangi held in our community. They stood alongside Te Pi'ipi'inga Kākano Mai I Rangiātea and Te Wānanga O Aotearoa to host and support the mourning family. Students were able to experience tikanga at the highest degree and how it applies to Māoridom. Spotswood College also help provide the facilities for the whanau to be able to cook the hangi for all who attended the tangi. The feedback from the community about the support from Spotswood College was outstanding, and this was a positive way to help build our networks and our mana.







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To further our involvement in the community, we supported Te Kōpae Tamariki Kia  $\bar{\mathbb{U}}$  Te Reo with their hāngi fundraiser. A group of senior boys from MOI101 and 10MOI spent the night in Whaitata. They were up early the following morning to put the hangi down. The quality of the hangi was excellent and customers were happy. Many thanks went to all who took part in this hangi fundraiser and made it a huge success.

#### MANU KÕRERO NATIONALS 2017








This year a group of students represented Spotswood College at Ngā Manu Kōrero 2017 held here in Taranaki.

#### **TIKANGA-A-IWI**



This year our department has been focusing on our lessons, topics and assessments. The aim being to create subjects which are interesting, contemporary and student focused. We have also increased student voice through an increased number of class surveys.

There have been several staff changes during the year in our department. Gavin Parr took over as Head of Social Science after Miss Willy's resignation. He also taught Geography. Lewis Whyte has continued to teach History, Tourism and Social Studies and was appointed Assistant Head of Social Science. Ben Chapman was Teacher in Charge of Commerce in 2017. He taught Business Studies, Accounting, Economics and Personal Financial Management. In Social Studies Scott Johnson taught the most classes in this subject as well as Personal Financial Management. We also welcomed Roan Oldfield to the department this year while Miss Willy is on maternity leave. Roan taught Geography, History and Social Studies in 2017.

During the year Social Science staff have been assessing topics which have been taught and have gained feedback from students through surveys and questionnaires. Feedback from students has helped

shape one of our aims in Social Science for 2017 and 2018 which is to introduce more topics and new assessments in an attempt to keep pace with the dynamic nature of our subjects. On that note Year 11 and Year 12 Psychology will be taught in 2018. We are excited to be offering this subject and initial subject selections have indicated that it will be a popular subject in 2018. Year 13 Psychology will be introduced in 2019.

There have been other activities of note in Social Science this year. Belinda Tran-Lawrence who is no longer teaching in our department ran the Forty Hour Famine Program again this year. Our school did very well. Thank you Belinda for your work. The Geography Department initiated a new topic with year 13 Geography students studying Mt Taranaki. A field trip is planned for next year. Our job was to defend a fictional family in a fictional case against the New Zealand Police involving the illegal sale of alcohol at a school ball. We could very much see this scenario occurring in real life. Moot Court has the same foundations and etiquette rules as the real court system in New Zealand, but it is designed to

prepare secondary school and university students for interacting with real courts and perhaps even becoming lawyers.

Certainly, after making it to the Semifinals I see becoming a lawyer as a more viable option. It is my love of English and public speaking that drew me to Mooting, but our team became much stronger Mooters in the intense preparation required for the Semifinals. We got a taste of Waikato University, a university which I hope to attend in 2019, and were able to make use of a state-of-the-art Moot Court. Our friends and family rallied around us as we were positively grilled by the "good cop bad cop" judges. The Moot Court, in those moments, felt very real. We had already faced the New Plymouth District Court, but had to defend the New Zealand Police in a new argument.

We came out unscathed, even with positive feedback from the judges that buoyed us into feeling like we could compete next year too. I was already working on my "formidable death stare". Unfortunately, we did not make it further than the Semifinals, but it's always good to have a goal for next year. We got to meet driven, like-minded students and spend time with them, with insight into how the court system works, and that I think is the most important thing you can take away from a rewarding extracurricular activity such as Mooting.

## **MATHEMATICS** DEPARTMENT 2017

2017 has been an exciting year in the Mathematics Department. The Department has embraced the advancements of technology and the challenges of teaching future-oriented Mathematics in an innovative and stimulating learning environment. We have recognized that in addition to being a source of knowledge for our students we now must also empower our students with the ability to enhance and foster their own learning by providing them access to the large amount of interactive and technologically based learning platforms. Mrs. Knapton and Mr. McFadyen have both developed their own "Blogsites" for their classes. These sites have given the students the ability to access resources, links to web-based resources, learning videos and interactive applications.

These resources are available to the students in the classroom during lessons and are also available to the students when they are at home studying. The Department is currently developing a Mathsite which will combine all of our resources and be used by all of the teachers within the department.

In 2017 we upgraded and added more laptops to the Department. Every classroom has a class set of laptops for the students to use during class. We are currently in the second year of using Mathletics. Mathletics is an online based learning space which allows the students to complete interactive mathematical activities which are aligned with the New Zealand curriculum. Mathletics has allowed the teachers to differentiate their teaching within

the classroom by setting activities to meet the needs of each individual students. We have been able to monitor and track the gains made by each student and adjust future assignments to benefit the student. Mathletics was used by all teachers in the Junior school this year and we look forward to using Mathletics in the Senior school in 2018.

In August, Spotswood competed in the annual Taranaki Methanex Mathematics Spectacular. The main attraction of the Spectacular is the Quiz Competition. The competition consists of a range of challenging mathematical questions covered in the New Zealand curriculum. The students have 30 minutes to answer 20 questions and are awarded points for correct answers. Spotswood entered two Year 9 teams and Year 10 teams. All four teams practiced during lunchtimes twice a week in preparation for the Quiz Competition. Spotswood is always a strong contender in the Year 9 and Year 10 quizzes with multiple championships in recent years. Unfortunately, in 2017 we were unable to win the Competition in either age group. All four teams competed well and had fun on the night. The Year 10 team had a consistent performance finishing 5th and 6th in the Competition.

# HEALTH & PHYSICAL EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

What's the goal? Physical Education encourages students to engage in movement experiences that promote and support the development of physical and social skills.

What's the challenge? Encouraging students to be active in a society that increasingly focuses on technology and social media as its method of social connection.

What makes that challenge harder? Not having the facilities to provide students a programme that is consistent, and has continuity, routine and flexibility.

Planning is underway for a new Physical Education facility, however it is looking likely that we will go into a fifth winter without a practical indoor space. Hopefully next year's article will have pictures of a really exciting and future focused teaching facility. In the meantime, staff and students will continue to do our best. A big thanks to the PE teachers who have managed to stay positive, look for solutions and be creative in their teaching. Thanks also to the students, who for the most part have been patient and cooperative when plans have changed at short notice and have been resilient when needed.

What's the result? While our results are not rocketing ahead like we might hope, we have been able to maintain consistent NCEA results, with no decline in achievement over the last few years. This year's focus has been on increasing both overall pass rates and increasing the number of subject endorsements. Year 10 students again have the opportunity to gain 5 Level 1 NCEA credits as part of their programme and it is really pleasing to see the large number of students who maximise the chance to both gain a head start and to earn merit and excellence credits to contribute to their overall NCEA endorsement.

What else? As part of the senior PE programme students were able to be part of the New Plymouth leg of the Weet-bix Triathlon series, working as volunteers for the event. It's always an early start at the event and the students showed excellent work ethic and initiative throughout the day. The majority of students worked to register the athletes and get them set up in the transition area, while others manned the finish area or helped sponsors run their information booths. A great insight for students into the organisation required for a large sports event.

Year 12 students completed a mini-mods (Rugby League) unit where they planned and implemented a teaching programme with students at Spotswood Primary School. This enabled the students to test and implement their leadership skills, giving them an authentic learning experience.

The Year 9 and 10 Sports Excellence programme has been running for several years. Students in these classes have the opportunity to test their fitness, challenge their skills and develop their understanding of the theory behind being a successful sports person. Thanks to Mr Joe and Mr Scott who have run these very large, popular classes this year.

What about our Health programme? With recent research suggesting parents and caregivers would like schools to spend more time teaching their children life skills, Health is a subject continually under construction. Hopefully students are gaining the skills and knowledge to maintain well-being for themselves, their friends and the wider community. Whanau input and ideas about our Health programme are always welcome.

## **CAMBRIDGE SCHOOL CROSS COUNTRY**

What is cross-country racing? "Racing dirt bikes through tight bush trails and fast open tracks. The course should be flowing and limited bottle necks. There should be no need to get off the bike and push. It's a case of rider and bike versus the elements. The bikes are very similar to the motocross bikes in looks, but have a few differing parts like the gear box and suspension can be different. Although you can race cross-country on a motocross bike (and many do), the main difference is that the track is longer from 8k to 20ks but that all depends on the course setter. The time you race is longer and all in one go, whereas motocross you will race several races with breaks in-between each race. Juniors generally race for one and half hours.

The seed was laid at one of the Dirt Guide Cross Country events held in Tokoroa. I was talking to another competitor's father, who recommended the Cambridge Schools Cross-Country. So when I got back I looked it up and saw it had been postponed from earlier in the year. I saw this as a chance to see if there were any budding trail riders or moto crossers in the school that would like to have a go at cross country racing.

With that the first Spotswood College Cross-Country Team was born, with representation from Years 9, 10 and 11. Chase Astwood, Ned Crawshaw, Callum Astwood and Ryan Clough. We also had a Year 7 guest rider from Coastal Taranaki School – Josh Houghton.

The EOTC forms were filled out, the board accepted the application, riders' entries in and school gazebo booked.

The team stayed at the Cambridge Motor Camp as this was close to the venue. There was excited chatter and stories told over our various pasta and rice dishes, about the various bikes and rides we had all been on in the past.

An early rise, a good slow-releasing energy breakfast was had and it was off to the races we went.

There were 163 entrants with 131 racers finishing the race, from 50 schools. The riders were in different classes depending on age and the bike they were riding. After the extensive riders briefing there was a 'look lap', just as it started to rain. The riders went down to the start line and blasted off.

When all the riders had come back and refuelled and had a drink it was time for the real race. The team were lined up on the start line and with the engine off, hands on their head listening for the shot gun to go off.

BANG! It was all go - the riders were off, across the paddock, around two barrels and then through a super-small gate and up the slippery hill. The Spotswood boys did well and got a clean get-away up the hill.

The pits were a hive of activity as the pit crews got ready for the first pit stop. Fuel cans opened, drinks ready, lollies opened, fresh goggles, tools out in case something needs adjusting or fixing.

The first of our riders to come through was Josh: three laps down and time to fuel, fresh goggles and off again. Followed by Callum, then the rest of the boys.

After an hour and a half the chequered flag was out; one by one the boys came home, rather dirtier than when they left and feeling tired, but looking stoked.

"My favourite parts of the ride were all the bog holes, wide open straights and the roost that was flying off everyone's back wheels. During the ride my back guard broke off which caused all the roost to land back on top of me and I broke my bark buster after falling off. I loved all of the sweeping corners because you can drift them. It isn't so great when someone passes you, as almost every time you get blasted with mud which sometimes hurt. When someone fell off in the challenging places it held up everyone so people were pushing everyone out of the way, to try and get through. I enjoyed every moment of it and will definitely be keen to go next year."

"The ride for me was awesome and enjoyed every part of it, especially the large straights and muddy corners in which roost was flying everywhere. During the ride I crashed bending my triple clamps slightly which made my bars out of alignment to my wheel. Most of the ride was crazy muddy, so lots of bog holes and knee deep ruts had formed as the day went by which added another challenge to the ride. This event was my first ever cross country race type event, so it was awesome to go along and see what they're all about. I will definitely be taking part in this event next year if it's an option."

It was great to take a team to this event and see them experience the rush of racing off-road. 

The team gradually improved throughout the year picking up valuable experience from each game. The



We did the play in the Epic style the script suggests with song, chorus, multiple roles, varied narrative techniques, and a stark set. These challenges were met head-on by the cast who came together in the end to put on a heart-felt and thought provoking performance. Needless to say, I was very proud of them

Other events were of course the Sheilah Winn Shakespeare festival, which I have written about in another article, and our field-trip to see *Hamlet: The Video Game* at the Taranaki Festival of the Arts. This version of Hamlet was a hilarious and accessible



romp through the Bard's most existential play. It was a beautiful irony to have the inactive and indecisive Prince of Denmark depicted as a video game hero who has to complete tasks and collect points to go to the next level. There was plenty of audience interaction, because we had to make some of the decisions for poor Hamlet after all, and our very own 'Sweet Cascade' featured in a pivotal scene. It was an awesome play and it should give the drama students plenty to write about in the exam.


Our Halloween Party, the Craft Fair and the annual Dance Party conclude our activities for the year.


Finally, the new building is almost complete and ready for action in 2018 for many staff and students.

## **ART CLASSES**

The diversity and engagement, that's what strikes you when you enter a Spotswood College Art class. You look around at the willingness to explore, you experience the sound of creative thinking, you ask guestions and you hear the confidence of the students own curious thoughts. Generating, modifying, evolving, visualising, trialling. The students are all focussed on the sound of their own ideas and individualised inquiries that they are trying to push around and develop. It is the sound of inventors in a workshop, learning from one's own mistakes, strengthening their focus and developing strategic thinking. Spotswood College Art students are taught that predetermining outcomes can be uncreative and that experimenting with new combinations and being open to other possibilities is where much more learning takes place.

As you continue to scan the Art class environment you notice the reminders of diversity of individual outcomes and the focus each student had to build up. You notice the diversity of materials used: sculpture assemblage of everyday objects, photographs, paint, pastel, pencil, prints and photo-shop design printouts.

You learn that in 2017 that 100% of the Year 11 Art students achieved their external folio, that 67 per cent of the Year 12 painting students gained Excellence in their External 12 credit folio and that there were 18 entries for Scholarship in the visual Arts. You find out that contemporary art-sculpture has 20 students in Year 13, each creating a very diverse mix of cool stuff. You learn that one student for the first time at Spotswood, Reihana Conaglen, completed four different Visual Art subjects (Sculpture, Photography, Painting and Design) to a Scholarship level.

You talk with an art teacher, Aly Scott, about how the Year 10 art extension programme has taken 20 students outside of the classroom on trips to the art gallery, museum, and tertiary art school skills workshops and worked with artists in the community. And that they collaborated together on a giant sculptural installation inspired by one of their trips.

You leave the Art classes feeling energised by the creative flurry, focus and passion. You realise it's not just a hotbed for budding art students but a place open to all students wanting to learn lifelong creative and innovative thinking for our future technological culture.

You decide to continue your journey and experience the passion, drive and national successes in the Performing Arts and Music Departments. You find that the Arts at Spotswood use the language of life: Imagination, relate, combine, evolve, develop, persist, time manage, choose, questioning, decide, feel, the senses, expression, connection, teamwork, self-esteem, turning points, surprise, personal and fun. You realise that the basic elements of the Arts are those of everyday existence. And that art fuels the imagination and supports the bigger picture view of life. Art keeps the magic alive.




