Preparations for the 60th Jubilee had been ongoing since the highly successful 50th celebration in 2010. The organising committee got into full swing in late-2018 and a 3-day event was planned for 10th-12th April, 2020 (Easter weekend).

Registrations opened in July 2019 and were slightly ahead of the 2010 event until earlier this year when in late January the term "Covid-19 virus" became familiar. On Friday 13th March, the World Health Organisation declared the virus a pandemic and the world started to close down.

Numbers for gatherings were gradually decreasing and at its meeting on Monday. On March 16th the Jubilee organising committee voted to cancel the event due to the NZ government restricting events to a maximum of 100 people indoors and 500 people outdoors. The committee was bitterly disappointed to have to cancel the Jubilee but had no option due to the government regulations. This then created a problem for the committee to make refunds to the registrants.

2021 REUNION 1960–1979 (CELEBRATING THE MCPHAIL ERA):

Due to numerous requests to hold an alternative event, the organising committee agreed to host a "Reunion 2021" for the ex-students and ex-staff from the first two decades 1960–1979.

This coincides wth the period in which the

founding principal, Mr McPhail led Spotswood College (1960-1977).

Arnie passed away suddenly after a short illness in New Plymouth on Wednesday 10th

June, 2020, aged 72.

Arnie was a teacher in the Technology Faculty at Spotswood College for 4 years, from 2004-2007.

Harold (Harry) Rilkoff: B.Ed, Dip.Ed, Dip Tchg. Harold Rilkoff passed away in New Plymouth on Sunday 13th September, 2020, aged 77. His funeral was held at Eagars Te Henui Chapel on Thursday 17th September.

He was a well respected teacher in the Science Faculty at Spotswood College for 23 years(1977-1979, 1989-1992, and 1994-2010). Harold was responsible for introducing the Year 10 Chemistry course with classes held at 7.30am three mornings a week.

Harold was of Russian descent and his family were Doukhobors. The Doukhobors are a sect of Russian dissenters, many of whom now live in western Canada. Today, their descendants in Canada number approximately 20,000, with one third still active in their culture.

Competitive swimmers toiled hard in between and staff and students alike enjoyed being able to get in the pool and take a break from the heat.



To finish the day off, the staff continued a trend of 2020 where they dealt to the students 100m relay team, avenging their loss from 2019.



As a department we are very proud of the innovation, adaptability and flexibility we were able to utilise in providing opportunities for our students to meet their goals and aspirations. These were within real world, engaging and contextualised work experience and skill development programs such as Gateway, Industry Training programs, STAR and Trades Academy courses.

These placements are valuable to our student's development and on the back of our strong relationships held in the community we offered work experience in a range of industry sectors. Industry Training Organisations visited Spotswood College to run interactive and practical courses for us in both the Gateway and STAR (Secondary Tertiary Alignment Resource). These courses were often group

- Fencing has been ongoing with student help




Chaniqua's poi can be purchased from The Collaboration on Devon street or from Spotswood College's The Designery.

 - Dani Dragon's is a range of Gourmet Spice Rubs for seasoning. Dani Drag-



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CULINARY ARTS HE PÜKENGA RINGAWERA

he Culinary Arts Hub has had plenty of engagement this year considering a large part of our learning time was done via distance learning. A lot of our work is delivered via portfolios, and half of this is based around practical lessons. Lock down certainly impacted on this aspect of our work yet students remained engaged and keen as they focused more on their design work from home.

The uniqueness of our curriculum and the delivery of it this year has allowed these students to complete the practical work when they returned to school. The Junior curriculum this year has seen students working on projects ranging from food photography, cultural food, designing a special diet and creating a high-tea event through to a plant based burger competition along with Junior Literacy creating their own recipe book and webpage.

The Seniors have had plenty to chew on as well! Year 11 students have experienced a good amount of integration with Food and PE joining forces again this year with the Great Outdoors class who managed to complete all their practical assessments out in the field at TOPEC.

Our Food-tastic and Lunchbox classes integrated with our Experience Unit students to work through a selection of unit standards ranging from baking and sandwiches through to hot finger food.

Year 12 Café Kai students continued to develop their hospitality interest, skills and knowledge with Mr Houghton as they tackled standards on food safety through to knife skills, grilling and salads.

Year 13 students were given the task of setting up a mini café and creating a menu to challenge a nutrition issue in Kura Kitchen while some opted to step into the world of food design as they investigated a chosen foodie and then designed a meal which reflected both of their food philosophies. One of our highlights this year was implementing team Honohono or team Connection. A group of keen foodies and ambassadors has made connections with local primary schools by providing cooking classes and play based activities, either at the primary school or at the college. The rational is to tighten the relationship between our college and local primary schools, provide support with the transition to high school and strengthen our community partnerships.

The Culinary Arts Hub is looking forward to further integration next year when we will work for the first time with Psychology, Art, Social Sciences, History, Geography and Horticulture.

JNRE AND SNRE

Active Whanau JNRE and SNRE students have participated in a range of activities to engage in their community and volunteer for the Student Volunteer Army. This group was also fortunate to be included in the TOPEC week with a challenging and productive day climbing, balancing, swinging and bush walking.

SNRE students have honed their baking and finger food cooking skills while gaining achievement standards.

020 saw a continuation of Spotswood College putting literacy at the forefront of our teaching and learning by supporting students to build literacy strategies across a range of subject areas. All students, junior and senior, study literacy, but the area which they gain their literacy through is dependent on the choices of the student. We were thrilled to see our early e-asTTletestingforourjuniorstudentsshowa marked increase in reading comprehension, however we are most pleased to see our students gaining real world skills and experience whilst building these skills. From using planting diaries in our Green Fingers class, to writing fantasy fiction in one of our English classes, to creating personal fitness plans in our PE based literacy, to writing and designing graphic novels, our students are finding innovative ways to embed these crucial, lifelong skills.

Media Studies

This year our Media Studies students studied a broad range of media concepts and forms. From creating their own mini-mockumentaries in Media Mastery to producing a visual representation of a biographical dramatisation in Biopics to finding out how Social Issue Documentaries have evolved to becoming one of the most popular genres of our time, our students have analysed every element of the power and influence of all types of media. Next year we're looking forward to revisiting our most popular genre study – psychological thrillers – in our Psycho Villains course along with a variety of other media-related issues.

ENGLISH/LITERACY

This year we were thrilled to welcome Rebecca McKerchar to our team. Rebecca brings a wealth of teaching experience and a true dedication to the subject. We were also very pleased that English teacher Rachel Smith took over Ms Gunn's Year 11 English class. Rowan Oldfield has also picked up our Fantastic Fantasy course, bringing his famous enthusiasm and spirit to our side of the school - much to the delight of his students. We were all saddened when Sue Gunn stepped down from her full-time teaching role. We have, however managed to keep her on as a relief teacher meaning that both our teachers and our tauira get the benefit of her vast knowledge and strong relationship with Spotswood College.

In 2020, our English classes have continued to put a focus on learning to analyse all sorts of written, visual and spoken texts, as well as creating some very high standard pieces of creative, formal and poetic writing and some excellent (and often highly entertaining) speeches. This year many of our students entered local and national writing competitions and took part in workshops with highly successful poets, writers and filmmakers. Although lockdown meant that we couldn't run debating, mooting or the speech competition, we found that many of our students took this more quiet time to work on their own personal writing; the results of which were amazing.

WOTM - PAPERCRAFT

Paper craft is an easy hobby for all and can be used to make personal gifts for family and friends as well as a creative outlet for students.

In Papercraft class, students make a number of projects of increasing complexity, starting with a paper bag album that they can use to remember a time, event or something special to themselves.

Papercraft classes have been a popular choice in school with many students returning each module to create new projects.

This year we saw an increase in students wishing to learn knitting with every module having a full intake.





We managed to get a couple of trips with the Off Road Team this year.

DIRT BIKES

The first trip we took the dirt bikes down to Taikorea MX Park, Glen Oroua, Manawatu.

This off-road riding facility is excellent for both training and racing: Moto-X and X-Country, which is brilliant for developing skills and fitness. The track is sand-based and can be ridden in all weather conditions. We had a good turn-out with fantastic support from parents also.

Each week I arranged for the boys to take advantage of the offer by Taranaki Motorcycle Club to join NPBHS to ride at Barrett Road Moto-X track in New Plymouth. Lunch, 5th period and after school saw several of our students get some MX training in. This plays a large part in getting time on the bike, as winter time is hard to get enough training time. This was a great opportunity which we will pursue next year in Terms two and three.

The grand finale for the dirt bikes is a trip which we do every year, racing the school Cross Country in Cambridge, then a trip to Mount Maunganui for a day's free riding. Unfortunately the race was cancelled, but the trip went ahead, with an awesome day riding at Burt's Farm Trail Ride.

Looking forward to next year when we can get to a few more races with the boys, strengthening our relationship with other schools and, with the training getting safer, fitter and stronger riders.

MOUNTAIN BIKES

We had a great start to the year with some new riders joining the team riding after school on Wednesdays, but unfortunately daylight saving came to an end and it just got too dark to ride.

At the end of last year we took a trip to Rotorua for three days. The trip consisted of camping (yes in a tent!) which saved the students enough money to be able to buy a lift pass at Skyline, which gave them enough lifts to the top to fill a day's riding and to have some spare lifts for a return journey whenever they can get there again. We will be doing the same kind of trip at the end of this year.

This year we entered the School National Mountain Bike Championships, which was held in the middle weekend of the Term three holidays down in Wainuiomata, Lower Hutt. This is a great event and we will be encouraging more of our riders to attend next year. Stan Crawshaw and Josh Houghton entered this year and had a blast. The terrain is different to here in Taranaki, as there are a lot more rocks and gravel to contend with. This saw a few riders getting punctures and having to carry their bikes down. We also had a mechanical malfunction when Josh's chain jumped off half way down the last stage, so he was just free-wheeling, until his rear gears locked up the back wheel and he had to carry his bike over the line. Good on the boys for entering this event and we will be back to race it again next year. I have been told it moves to a different venue each year.









2020 GIRLS' VOLLEYBALL REPORT

It is again with great pleasure that we can report on another very successful year for the various junior and senior girls' players and teams that have represented Spotswood College at Indoor and Beach Volleyball during the past twelve months.

The main highlights during the past year (since October, 2019) were:



The girls are very excited to continue to work on their skills and look forward to improving on the court next year.




















