

OBITUARY - ALEXANDER LACHLAN McPHAIL
Founding Principal - Spotswood College



Mr A.L. McPhail
Spotswood College's First Principal

Teacher, leader, sportsman, servant, whose untimely death took from the community a Christian gentleman and scholar.

Though encouraging traditional academic excellence in all students, he did not support a narrow curriculum. Pupils were to achieve in the field of their choosing and be extended by a wealth of sporting and cultural activities. The balance achieved between sporting contacts and cultural exchanges bears witness.

Innovation, provided that it benefited pupils, saw many firsts for Spotswood College - Remedial Reading, Work Experience - the "school within a school system", which sought to retain that valuable personal contact between staff and students, within one of the larger secondary schools of New Zealand.

At all times the request was for teachers and pupils to give that "little bit extra". The College was indeed fortunate to have enjoyed the leadership of A.L. McPhail 1960-1977; a man who asked of others, but demanded of himself, "HIGH ENDEAVOUR".

Greetings, greetings to you all.

February 28th 1991 saw the school return to its biggest roll in more than 15 years. Even though our 3rd form numbers were at their lowest level in many years, the big increase in retention rates in our senior school kept the roll at a high level.

Actual figures were Form 3 (1st year) 274; (2nd year) 307; (3rd year) 276; (4th year) 270; (5th year) 156; giving a total roll of 1286. With the inclusion of our attached unit off site, our actual roll was therefore approaching 1300 students.

Unquestionably the biggest impact was felt at the senior levels when the consequences of local and national unemployment found many of our students returning to school. Fortunately our curriculum was able to respond well with the only real problem being the provision of physical space in our 7th form Common Room!

I have long been an advocate of increasing the leaving age and indeed for the majority of students staying at school for a 6th or 7th form year. From an educational point of view therefore the increase in the senior roll was extremely positive.

At this early stage, indicators for 1992 are that we will experience a reduction in Form 3 enrolments to around 225 but this will be balanced by an increase in Form 7 numbers to approximately 180.

February also saw the completion of the first elements of our major school upgrade and what a delight it was to open our Maori Studies suite "Whaitata" and for the English and Mathematics Departments to move into their new surroundings in S Block. How nice also for the 6th form students, their common room overnight becoming the envy of the whole school!

Unfortunately the news for 1992 is less encouraging. As a consequence of budget cuts and priorities it would now appear unlikely that Stage II of our redevelopment (A Block) will proceed. What is even more disturbing is the news that Spotswood College, previously recognised as being a priority school for major capital and maintenance works, has now been placed inexplicably at the bottom of the priority list.

I believe that this state of affairs is simply unacceptable and an indictment on a system which was put in place supposedly to target areas of greatest need.

Our school is being disadvantaged by a bureaucratic system that is more autocratic and less accountable than the system it replaced.

There must soon come a time when I believe parents, students, teachers and our Board of Trustees say "enough is enough" and demand of the Ministry of Education and our politicians some measure of equity.

The gap between the schools which have and the have nots is simply too great.

Staffing a school the size of Spotswood College is in itself an extremely demanding task and it was therefore of great relief to be in a fully staffed position at the beginning of the year and for us to remain

virtually stable throughout the year. The major exceptions were of course the departure of Mr & Mrs Haque to Napier where Mr Haque gained promotion and was appointed Principal of Tamatea College. Both were teachers of exceptional abilities and will be missed by students and teachers alike. As Deputy Principal of a school the size of Spotswood College Bali had enormous responsibilities and as befitting a man of his talents these responsibilities were borne with dignity and panache. I pay tribute to my friend and colleague.

In Mrs Goldsworthy we have an able successor and it was with great pleasure that we welcomed her into this important position within our school.

We were pleased to welcome Ms R. Moran midway through term 3 to bring our permanent senior management team back to full strength.

There will be no new staff for Spotswood College in 1992 - changes to the staffing announced recently mean a reduction of approximately 3 full-time teacher equivalents for next year. Fortunately this reduction was managed by retirements and adjustments for our part-time and long-term relief position and therefore no full time positions were lost.

The curriculum at our school continued to expand in 1991 with perhaps the biggest impact being the introduction of a modular system into the Form 3 programme. The 6-month option modules have been most successful in giving students a broader base for specialisation in the senior school and will be continued in 1992.

Unquestionably the recent staff cuts together with a roll reduction will impact directly on our ability to expand the curriculum at the same rate as in previous years. However closer links with our local Polytechnic will I believe more than compensate for this.

There have been many outstanding achievements within our school throughout the year, far too many to record here, achievements that we can all be proud of. I, however, have serious concerns about some trends which have become more obvious over the past 18 months or so.

As a school, parents, students and teachers alike, we have to recognise that in this most competitive economic environment we must place more emphasis on formal academic learning and achievements. Success these days in School Certificate, 6th Form Certificate and the 7th form bursary exams is becoming almost an automatic prerequisite of employment or admission to tertiary study. A sustained effort throughout the year with realistic goals set and achieved are essential if our students are going to compete in a restrictive employment market. The "she'll be right" attitude of years gone by is now simply not good enough.

So too is the attitude of some students and parents to attendance at school. Unexplained absences as well as students being taken out of school by parents with no reasonable cause is making it extremely difficult for some of our students to reach their full potential. This is a problem that must be addressed directly by parents and students.

I would like to acknowledge our Head Girl, Carly Williams, Head Boy, Todd Smythe, their deputies Julie Withers and Matt Crowther for their support and work on behalf of the School. To Rachel Brown, our student Board of Trustees representative, our prefects, council members and team captains - congratulations

on a fine effort. Similarly my congratulations to all those students who simply took the time and effort to participate. What you do throughout the year is important and does make a significant contribution to the success of our school.

My personal thanks are extended to a wonderfully supportive teaching, administrative and services staff and Board of Trustees members, without whom the school could simply not operate. The increasing pressures of a self-managing school impact directly

on you all, yet throughout you remain dedicated to the processes of education and the support of our students.

In conclusion I extend my best wishes to all those leaving. I hope Spotswood College has served you well, and to all parents, students and staff, a most prosperous and happy New Year.





The team played well throughout the whole season and improved personally and as a team with every game. Thanks Mrs Shaw for your time and effort and congratulations team for a great season.



NATIONAL BANK JUNIOR MATHEMATICS COMPETITION

This competition for third, fourth and fifth formers in New Zealand high schools was initiated by Professor Derek Holton of the Otago University Mathematics and Statistics Department in 1985. The National Bank has sponsored the competition from the outset, providing cash prizes for the top students and merit certificates for about fifteen percent of the participants at each level.

Now in its sixth year of operation, the competition currently attracts over 6,500 entries from more than 200 participating high schools. It takes place, at a date late in April and the candidates are given one hour to answer up to five questions and strong emphasis is placed on their ability to write down good mathematical explanations for their answers. These questions are designed to test ability, to analyse a problem and to express a solution clearly and accurately. Perseverance will be one of the keywords to success.

1989 QUESTION

Scrooge McGurk never spends \$1 notes or \$10 notes - he keeps them under his mattress for a rainy day. Every so often he gets lucky at the T.A.B. and pops in a \$50 note. Just before his annual trip to town he clears out his nest-egg and finds \$550 made up of fifty notes of the three kinds. How many notes of each denomination has he saved up? Show that there is only one solution.

Rachel Clareburt (Top 100 Certificate) and Dimetre Triadis (Certificate of Merit) were awarded certificates in the 1991 competition.

It is hoped that in future years more students will attempt these competitions so they can put their mathematical knowledge to use in new and different situations.

AUSTRALIAN MATHEMATICS COMPETITION

This competition is sponsored in both New Zealand and Australia by Westpac Corporation and is open to both senior and juniors. The competition, run in July each year, is a multiple-choice exam which tests both mathematical and problem solving skills.

This year the response to this competition was very good, attracting over 70 entries. The results were also very pleasing with 12 students receiving Certificates of Distinction and another 23 students receiving Merit Awards.

THE 1991 TECHNICS COMPUTER AWARD

Early Saturday morning, the 28th September 1991, saw a buzz of excited activity as 500 participants from 45 Taranaki schools converged on New Plymouth's West Point Conference Centre for the sixth annual Technics Computer Awards.

This year, students from standard 3 to Form 7 and Polytech, entered projects that emphasised the power and widespread use of computers in our modern society. Prizes of book tokens, totalling \$7000 were awarded in five different age groups. At the end of the day an Apple Macintosh computer and a BBC Archimedes computer were given away to two schools. The happy recipients of these computers were Inglewood High School and Oakura Primary.

Spotswood College had two entries in this year's competition; Daryl Howe in the F3-4 section and Michael Plant in the F5-7 section. Both received Excellence awards and between them returned with \$170 in prizes.

Daryl's entry, using his own computer, demonstrated the ability of computers to use colours, sound and other devices to interact with human beings. Michael put his programming skills to good use and created a program to produce trig graphs on one of the College's new IBM compatible computers.

The competition receives substantial sponsorship from the Technic Group of companies, without whom the competition would not exist. Everyone involved agrees that this competition is an excellent way to encourage the use of computers as the tools they are. No other part of New Zealand has an equivalent competition, which means Taranaki is a leader in this way, and could produce the most computer literate students in the years to come.

THE GOLDEN MASQUE OF AGAMEMNON

This year's school production had quite a different flavour, for several reasons. Firstly, and most importantly, Fleur Gaston, a seventh former, was the producer. It was her task to tell everyone what to do, and she did it so well. Juniors, seniors and staff all jumped to it and did Fleur's bidding because, well, she was the BOSS. She chose a serious drama, THE GOLDEN MASQUE OF AGAMEMNON by John Wiles, just the right sort of challenge for a first time, full time producer.

The cast of about thirty, a mixture of raw, but tasty, beginners and a good number of seasoned troopers were selected carefully. The hall floor was marked out to simulate the State Insurance Theatre where the performances were to be held and the one hundred hours of rehearsal began. Performing a Greek tragedy is not easy: the language, especially words like Ouranos, and Leucippe, and Clytemnestra, actually had a few people visiting the nurse for tongue splints; the subject matter, for goodness sake, a blood curse from the gods where everybody kills everybody else simply to investigate the idea of justice is a pretty heavy scene for audiences more familiar with the Top 40 or the results of a common test; dying on stage is a tricky business, swords daggers and axes have to be dead accurate so as not to really kill people. Anyway, Fleur did it. She put the actors in their place, the costumes on their backs, the make-up on their faces, the set under their feet, and the lights on their artistry.

One of the real features of the whole production was how well everyone worked together, students and staff. Between the hours of work there were plenty of laughs, most of them at rather weak jokes or ridiculous behaviour but sometimes when Boyd Benton deliberately inserted his own words into the script and reduced a moment of high drama to a particularly seedy bog of bawdy humour. Most of the cast fell over laughing.

The audiences were very receptive and were markedly impressed by the level of professionalism in all aspects of this largely student production. The Golden Masque of Agamemnon continued the tradition of highly competent, highly enjoyable theatre at Spotswood. May it long continue. Let's face it, it was a great play - there was a \$142.35 profit!

Since the club started late last year, its membership has grown to over 20 students ranging from third formers to senior students.


Weekly meetings are held at lunchtime on Fridays. The radios and computer are operational and everyone is welcome to visit us to see what goes on.

It is with much pleasure that we can again report on another extremely successful year for all boys' and girls' teams representing Spotswood College. The past 12 months has again been busy with our teams playing in leagues and tournaments both within and outside of Taranaki.

Volleyball has continued to increase in popularity in New Zealand and students involved in the sport at Spotswood have a 12 month activity that offers both hard work at training and many rewarding experiences at tournaments and competitions.

Teams from Spotswood continue to represent the College with pride and have maintained the high-standard name that Spotswood has throughout New Zealand.

There have been numerous highlights during the last twelve months so before reviewing some of these, we will summarize the main highlights:

- In October 1990, both the juniors boys' and girls' teams won the respective Taranaki Secondary schools championships (both undefeated).
- The same squads also won the Taranaki regional junior qualifying series (both undefeated) and represented the province at the New Zealand Secondary Schools championships in Palmerston North. The boys' team was placed 9th, while the two girls' teams were placed 10th and 11th.
- The senior boys' and senior girls' teams both won the 1991 Taranaki Secondary Schools' Championships undefeated.
- Bevan Erueti and Paula Koot were both chosen in the North Island Under 17 Volleyball teams plus the Central New Zealand Zone Under 19 teams.
- Spotswood College assisted in the hosting of three overseas teams in New Plymouth. In July, the Daito Bunka University Mens' team - with Bevan Erueti and Matthew Low selected in the Spotswood

Invitation team, the Saginaw region Under 20 womens' team from Michigan, USA visited us in August, while the 4th Mens' Volleyball test between New Zealand and Australia, was played in New Plymouth on 3rd October.

- In October, 1991, both the junior boys' and junior girls' teams won the Taranaki Secondary Schools Volleyball championships (both undefeated) to give Spotswood all four provincial titles in the same year.
- The junior teams maintained our current unbeaten record in Taranaki, and at the time of writing this report our record of consecutive wins had been increased to 102 (55 for the boys and 47 for the girls).

The following report contains more detail of the various competitions entered by our teams during 1991.

1. TARANAKI SECONDARY SCHOOLS JUNIOR BOYS' CHAMPIONSHIPS - 1990

The 1990 Taranaki Secondary Schools Junior Boys' Championships were played at New Plymouth Boys High School on Thursday 18th October. Six schools entered the championships with Spotswood fielding two teams. The 'A' team of - Michael McLorinan, Brennan Rigby, Stephen Gill, Wade Robinson, James Beggs, Daryl Egarr, Nigel Thomson and Mark Oulaghan played through the championships winning all five games played. The 'B' team with one win from four games finished sixth.

The win in the final gave Spotswood the junior boys' title for the fourth consecutive year.

2. TARANAKI SECONDARY SCHOOLS JUNIOR GIRLS' CHAMPIONSHIPS - 1990

The 1990 Taranaki Secondary Schools Junior Girls' Championships were played at Stratford High School

on Thursday 25th October. Nine schools entered the championships with Spotswood also entering a 'B' team to make-up two equal pools for section play. The 3rd form girls teams of Teri-anne Sole, Dianne Avery, Hayley Cunningham, Kristie Boyd, Alena Sofeni and Louisa Sofeni repeated the boys' performance from the previous week in winning all six games played by the same 2-0 margin. This included a comfortable win over NPGHS to retain the title Spotswood had won in 1989. The 4th form team with two wins finished fifth.

3. 1990 JUNIOR REGIONAL QUALIFYING COMPETITION:

Three boys' and two girls' teams were entered into the four tournament Taranaki regional qualifying series to decide which school would represent Taranaki at the New Zealand Secondary Schools Championships (North Island section) at Palmerston North.

At the North Taranaki district tournament all three boys' teams and the two girls' teams qualified to go to the Taranaki regional day one tournament. The boys 'A' team recorded two wins to finish first while the third form girls' team with four straight wins were placed first and the 4th form team with two wins were third.

The Taranaki day one tournament played at Stratford saw the 4th form boys win all four games to finish first, the two 3rd form teams finishing fourth and fifth. Both the 3rd and 4th form girls' teams recorded three wins to finish first in their two respective pools. All five teams qualified for the final regional tournament thus avoiding having to play in the B-grade tournament.

The Taranaki day two tournament was also played at Stratford and this was the decider as to who would go on to the Nationals. With only five teams entered in the boys' grade our 4th form team played through undefeated winning all four games 2-0.

The B team were placed fourth and the C team fifth. The two girls' teams dominated play in this grade

winning their first three games before playing against each other in the final. The 3rd form team continued on their winning way in taking the final from the 4ths and had also qualified to play in Palmerston North.

4. NEW ZEALAND SECONDARY SCHOOLS JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 1990 New Zealand Secondary Schools Junior Championships were played at the Pascal Street stadium in Palmerston North during 22-24 November. With the late withdrawal by a Wellington high school the organisers asked Spotswood to enter a second girls' team giving us two girls' and one boys' team at the championships. The squads travelled to Palmerston North via Pahiatua playing the Taranaki College teams as pre-tournament preparation.

The boys' squad of Michael McLorinan, Brennan Rigby, Nigel Thomson, Mark Oulaghan, Stephen Gill, Wade Robinson, James Beggs, Daryl Eagarr, Ross Goldfinch and Damian Johnson were placed in Pool B for section play. They won 4 of their 8 games. This placed our boys in ninth position, one below that achieved in Whangarei the previous year.

The girls' squad of twelve was divided into an A and B team for the nationals with the A team in section A and the B team section C.

The teams and results were:

A team: Rachel Clareburt, Kristie Blong, Kelly Austin, Tanya Bayliss, Terri-anne Sole, Alena Sofeni. (4 wins out of 8 games).

B team: Debbie Kidd, Katrina Eales, Nichola Young, Louisa Sofeni, Kristie Boyd, Hayley Cunningham. (2 wins out of 8 games).

These results gave the A team a final placing of tenth, the same position as that gained at Whangarei in 1989, while our B team were placed eleventh in the sixteen team competition.

The major highlight of the tournament for our teams was the honour of being chosen as the MOST SPORTSMANLIKE TEAM in both the boys and girls sections, a credit to the players involved and an honour for the school.

5. 1990/91 NEW PLYMOUTH SUMMER LEAGUE

Eight teams represented Spotswood College in the 1990/91 New Plymouth summer league competition that was played between November 1990 and April 1991. Teams and placings were:

6. TAURANGA BEACH VOLLEYBALL CLASSIC

7. 1991 SENIOR REGIONAL QUALIFYING COMPETITION

This year with larger numbers of senior boys and girls' players, Spotswood entered three teams in each grade for the regional qualifying series to decide the Taranaki representative to play at the nationals at Rotorua.

Only girls' teams competed at the North Taranaki series with our A team recording four wins, the B team two wins and two losses, and the C team four losses. For the final two tournaments only two girls' teams were entered.

At the Taranaki regional day one tournament played at Stratford, our two girls' teams were drawn in the same pool with the A team winning all three games to be placed first and the B team with two wins second. The final qualifying tournament was played at Stratford on the weekend of 23/24 March with both of our A teams expected to go close to qualifying having won all previous matches in the series. Matches in this last tournament were played on a best of five sets as would be the case at nationals.

"A Hawera man died early yesterday morning as the result of a two-car collision on State Highway 2. The man was taken to Taranaki Base Hospital but was pronounced dead on arrival. Eight other people were seriously injured in the crash, two critically and another seriously. The accident was thought to be alcohol-related. The deceased man was married with three children".

"Mummy, when's Daddy coming home?"

Road deaths for the first three months of this year showed a dramatic decrease according to the Ministry of Transport - only 156 people died on our roads. Only 156? ONLY 156 people? That's roughly 13 people dying on our roads per week. The majority of these accidents are alcohol and speed-related. Thirteen people per week. Thirteen.

One. . .two. . .three. . .4,5,6,7,8,9. . .ten,11,12. . .thirteen. . . per week. One of those faceless people, those MOT statistics, could have been someone you knew; could have been a friend, a brother, a sister, could've been a parent, a boyfriend or girlfriend. One of those faceless people could've been the person standing next to you. . .or. . .it could've been you.

A lot of New Zealanders are becoming sick and tired of accepting drunk driving on our roads. When people drive drunk, they're not just stupid; they're deadly. To themselves. To their families. To people they don't even know.

Drinking and driving is one of the biggest killers of New Zealand teenagers. It doesn't have to be. If you're concerned about drunk driving, it's time to stand up and say so - you can make a difference. You could save the life of a friend - you could save your own life.

I am SADD - a student against drunk driving. It doesn't take much to say those words but it takes a lot more to believe them. It takes respect. Respect for your loved ones. Respect for other people. Respect for yourself. After all, aren't you worth it. . .? "I've only had a couple . . . let's have one for the road". Your last for the road may be someone else's last for life.




