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
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PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

In congratulating the school on a splendid year, I find many things, too many to list here, contributing to the high level of achievement. The house system has gained great momentum, and thanks are due to Messrs. Lusby, Finch, Neatherway and Cooper and their teams of student leaders who have set a good example and worked hard for their houses. Next year, it is hoped the houses will compete with each other more often at many levels. Plays, debates and inter-class contests will be possible in a special time allocation once a month in addition to existing form and assembly time.

My congratulations also go to this year's 7th form who have conducted themselves and their studies with commonsense and maturity. know the whole school appreciates the work of Grant O'Donnell, Vivienne Smith, Nigel Purdy and Karen Nicholas our Head Prefects who have, especially, kept a fine balance between their studies and their duties. I use their example as my message for this year's magazine. During your school life, you, as a pupil, have academic learning as your foremost duty. In that area, your teachers are almost exclusively the agents you rely on, and Spotswood College is extremely lucky to have such a fine team of dedicated teachers. A student has very little other contact with purely academic learning, and there is little influence from the media (newspaper, radio or television) to affect him or her.

The second major facet of school life is sport, and here many teachers assist along with parents and friends of the school. The media, especially television, makes a stronger impression on the sporting interests of pupils usually to their benefit.

The third important feature of a pupil's existence at school is what I call here, sociability. The skills of mixing with the opposite sex, with people of different ages, and backgrounds and being able to communicate successfully with them, show understanding of and concern for them, and appreciate them are all practised at school and teachers, senior students and peer-groups influence the thinking and social development of the student during the school years. At home, parents largely reinforce general standards that are met at school, but I am concerned that the media, especially television, is playing too great a part in the waking time of many students. If you watch as much as 20 hours of television per week, you should consider seriously where your priorities lie, and what quality of programme you are spending valuable time watching.

In this connection, I am glad the school has this year purchased further Video equipment, and I urge teachers to make fullest use of it including instruction which will help students discern and evaluate the standards and values in the television they see at home.

This year pupils have shown a very sensible awareness of the employment situation, and the need for as much education as possible. What Spotswood pupils appreciate is not just getting a "meal ticket" in the form of School Certificate or University Entrance but that people today (both employers and those wanting to be employed) are looking for an all-round appreciation of the changing world we are living in. This means using one's talents to the full - in subjects learned in the classroom, in seizing opportunities the school offers in music, sport, drama, crafts and the like, and in sharing with others the lessons of growing up and grappling with life. For many, the wisest course is to stay at school as long as possible and I look forward to seeing a large 7th form next year supported by a very strong 6th

It has been an encouraging fact that pupils who have come back for that extra year, have gained added maturity, and readiness for a career, and in many cases have picked up that first job during the school year. It seems eminently sensible for a young person to be at school advancing his prospects rather than at home drawing the dole; and being at school is becoming a more and more enjoyable experience as pupils become more involved in the way the school works.





When I was a little girl, I would eagerly open my lunch box to see what goodies lay in store for me. If I was lucky, there would be mallowpuffs and chocolate chippie biscuits, or, if I was not so lucky, there would be plain biscuits and butter. And then, after I had greedily devoured my biscuits, I would carefully unwrap my sandwiches in hopeful anticipation.

At weekends, I would join my brother and sister in a cry for fish 'n' chips or Kentucky Fried. We always made sure that we bought too much so then the cat could share in the meal as well. Our cat is overweight.

Birthdays, Easter and Christmas times were the most delightful occasions of all: A nice big fruit cake with lots of icing, jelly and icecream, Easter eggs, Iollies, plum pudding and trifle. All of these things helped my small world to run smoothly and separated the "ordinary" days from special occasions. I never thought what it would be like to be hungry. I never even tried to understand what it would be like to say, "I'm hungry," and mean it.

As I grew older, clothes began to take a precedence over food. It wasn't important anymore to have the nicest sandwiches and the tastiest biscuits, but it was important that I had the nicest clothes and the most fashionable shoes. However, my mother's budget did not cater for the day in - day out fashion changes which took place. Instead, I had to make do with hand-me-downs from my older sister. Birthdays and Christmases became an extremely special event then because they often meant gifts of new clothes. Even so, I still felt that I was hard done by and neglected. It never occurred to me that I should be thankful for what I had, and not to yearn for that which was beyond my reach.

Sometimes I heard people talk about 'third-world' countries where the people were dying from starvation, and lived in little shacks made from cardboard, newspaper, and other remnant materials. But because my parents never gave money to the societies who collected for such countries, and because they said that New Zealand should be given aid before those other countries, I always presumed that they were right. I never questioned them. Never - until I learnt what it was like in those countries, and saw on films the skinny, disease - infected, swollen-bellied children dying from malnutrition while they 'lived' in the squalor of large, magnificent cities. At first, I laughed. They looked funny with their fat bellies and skinny limbs. But I was ignorant.

Now I am thankful to know that when I open my lunch box, there is something inside.

COMPUTER STUDIES THE FIRST YEAR

The sixth formers who took computer studies (comput technology to others) were the first pupils at Spotswood College to benefit from following this exciting and demanding course.

The course became a possibility from mid 1981 onwards when the efforts of fundraising pupils led to the purchase of a TRS-80 micro-computer (16K model). A further TRS-80 with a disk drive was added to supplement the first in July of this year.

Computer studies is a course which has several aims:

(1) To familiarize pupils with computers. (2) To acquaint pupils with programming and analysis of problems (flowcharting).

(3) To study the principles of binary logic which is fundamental to digital computers.

(4) To understand the concepts and principles behind the operation of computers (not the actual electronics).

The students are encouraged (and required!) to write programs and time is made available during class and at other times outside classroom hours for their practical experience. The problem is that there are still not enough "keyboards" to meet demand.

An exciting development along these lines is the Poly computer system recently demonstrated in New Plymouth which supports up to 16 keyboards.

These run individual programmes from one disk and printer system. The drawback is the \$40,000 price tag. However, the day of the computer is here, and the Government must accept the need to provide schools with a system such as the one developed by the Poly Corporation.

Computer Awareness:- is the name given to a unit taught in the maths course at a junior level to introduce, familiarize and de-mystify computers. The unit has been developed this year, and will be fully integrated into the maths course from 1982.

COMPUTER STUDIES -A STUDENT'S VIEW

Computer Tech. is a Sixth Certificate subject which began this year. Most of the work that we do is trying to break down simple problems (like how to find the area of triangles or how to play a "guess my number" game) and then write programmes that we can put into the computer so that it can solve these problems.

To do this we had to learn how to "talk" to the computer (our machines use a language called BASIC) so that it can carry out our instructions or commands.

But because most problems - no matter how simple they may seem - become quite complex when we break them down, we had to learn how to "flowchart" our programmes before writing them in BASIC. This is to avoid mistakes and arrive at a logical solution to the problem. Flowcharting is probably the hardest thing we do in Computer Tech, because of the clear, logical thinking required to make one complicated problem into many simple steps which the computer can do.

After going through the initial stages of confusion, frustration and total bewilderment, we found that we could flowchart, write in BASIC and then run a programme just as well as (and even on the odd occasion better than!) Mr Young could.

Overall Computer Tech. is an excellent course for anyone who has an interest in computers and how they work. Our class enjoyed the course and learned a lot from it. Thanks to all those who made it possible to have a Computer Technology class and good luck to next year's class.

SPIRIT OF ADVENTURE

From March 31 to April 10, 24 other trainees and I were aboard the ship 'Spirit of Adventure.'

We sailed from Wellington to Auckland, stopping at Tolaga Bay, Gisborne, Great Barrier Is, and Kawau Island. The object of the voyage was to teach us how to sail the boat and to learn how to get on with each other in a confined space.

The trainees were divided into four groups called watches:

There was a set of competitions between the watches, in dinghy sailing, rowing, knot tying and running. We were taught to sail the dinghies when we were at anchor which took a long while as the boats usually ended by being blown backwards. We had to do all the things that sailors are meant to do: climb the masts, furl the sails, clean the brass and scrub the decks.

On the second to last day of voyage the trainees had control of the ship while the eight crew had a well earned rest. We elected captain and officers, and worked out a course. The day didn't go too badly, we only found ourselves totally stationary once or twice. The first three days were the worst of the trip as everyone was seasick, but overall I really enjoyed the voyage and recommend it to anyone who likes the outdoors.

GUIDANCE DEPT. REPORT

1981 has seen the Guidance Department of Spotswood College a little decimated.

Early in the year, Mr Duerr, the Department's other full time counsellor left the College to take up a position as Principal at Marycrest School, near Wellington.

Mr Lander, one of the Guidance Teachers is leaving us at the end of the year to take up a position as Guidance Counsellor at Melville High School in Hamilton.

Due to the school's falling roll, it will not be possible to replace Mr Duerr, but the Department of Education have given approval to replace Mr Lander.

Added to the problem of being one staff member short for most of the year, has been the fact that Mr Greensill has been seconded to the Department of Education as Guidance Adviser to run an experimental project in Career Education. This project is one that is very close to the College, as it has pioneered and had in practice for many years, the sorts of things which the experiment hoped to build into twelve other schools who really had no organized Career Education programmes operating.

Unfortunately for Spotswood College, the running of the project has meant that Mr Greensill has had to be away from the school a great deal, and this in turn has placed further strains and pressures on the Guidance Department.

However, for all of these problems, the Guidance Department is able to look back with satisfaction at the year's programme. It has been able to successfully complete all of the tasks that it set for the year, both in terms of its classroom programmes, and the individual guidance work undertaken.

One of the major areas in which the Guidance Department is working, is to assist other subject areas build in to their curriculum at various levels, aspects of careers that are related to those subject areas. In other words, while the students are doing Social Studies, English, Economic Studies etc., they are also being exposed, with perhaps not realizing it, to a wide range of careers, skills and information that will assist them in the future.

This curriculum based career education along with the 'special needs' programmes, organized and run specifically by the Guidance Department mean that all of our students are well catered for during their school life.

Times are not easy, for school leavers. Over the last few years, it has been increasingly difficult for our adolescents to leave school, and find work in the areas in which they are interested. Shortage of money, increased technology, married women returning to the work force, and an increase in the school population over the last few years, have all conspired to make things much more difficult for young people wishing to leave school and find employment.

These factors have meant greater competition for the jobs that do become

available, as well as greater competition to get into the various tertiary level training courses.

Being aware of the national trends, has meant that the Guidance Department has had to gear its programmes to meet these problems by helping students look at as wide a range of career choices as possible, and to help students develop all the skills needed to select, find, and win a place for themselves in the work force - a task at which it has been highly successful.




This year, two teams entered in the 3rd form section of the Junior League Basketball Competition. They played against various school teams throughout the New Plymouth and Waitara areas.

CLEANERS' REPORT 1981

Congratulations are also extended to Steven Walker, Mark Schieb, David Greiner and Harvey Mason on beng selected for the Taranaki Under 14 representative team.



8TH GRADE RUGBY






