PRODUCTION



2023 has been another year of our rangatahi showing real grit and determination with continued interruptions in their education. Despite contending with covid, strikes and some nasty flu, I can genuinely say I am amazed by their talent and achievements.

The first thing on everyone's mind was auditions for our planned production of 'The Addams Family'. We were overwhelmed by the confidence and bravery of those who auditioned and had some difficult choices to make, however, we ended up with an extraordinary cast who 'hit it out of the park' come August. As always, our first event was the Otago university SGCNZ Sheilah Winn Regional in Stratford. We had 3 groups from the 'Page to Stage' class perform and despite not making it through to the nationals with their Macbeth scenes, they did the school and themselves proud.

We welcomed Lahleina Feunati as a student teacher in term 2 and she was able to support the 'Theatre Studies' class in their study of 'The Pohutukawa Tree' by Bruce Mason. This was studied, alongside a devising project based on the history of Parihaka, where students took a theme or concept from their learning and created original scenes exploring the effect of colonisation on Aotearoa.

In Semester 2 the focus was on 'The Crucible' by Arthur Miller, which enabled rangatahi to utilise their historical knowledge from studying Macbeth and apply it in a contemporary context in relation to Mccarthyism. The 'Page to Stage' class looked at another iconic New Zealand Play 'Daughters of Heaven' by Michelanne Forster, which dealt with a completely different historical incident, the murder of a mother by her daughter and best friend, Parker and Hulme. Delving into the world of 1950's Christchurch, themes of psychological trauma, homosexuality, attachment syndrome and folie a deux were explored in trying to understand the circumstances of the murder.

Over all, senior Drama students have studied a wide range of local and international text from various historical periods and cultures, producing some stunning performances, many original.

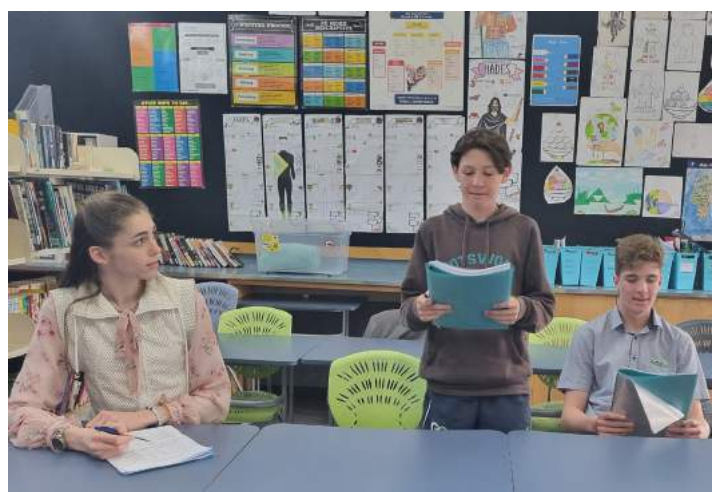
Debate at Spotswood College

The Spotswood College Debate Team has had a successful year competing in Regional and Inter School Competitions. We have a one hour debate skills lesson every week in Widening of the Mind, and then a practice debate after-school once a week. This means we have plenty of time to practise and to get one on one help from our debate teacher.

Our students started with no previous experience in the sport and have quickly developed a toolkit of debating skills. These skills are relevant to all parts of our lives and include: how to look at the bigger picture, how to work as a team, organise our ideas under pressure and to speak logically. Over the year we have explored different topics and how the opposing perspectives on them can benefit or harm individuals, groups and society. Some of the topics we made arguments for and against are: violence in video games, organ donation, face recognition technology, and cellphones in schools.

Students from Year 9 to 13 went along to the Central North Island Regionals in Whanganui. This was an exciting trip as we got to debate against teams and students we wouldn't otherwise meet and to see what the best debating in our region looks like. The judges were incredibly nice and helpful, they offered us lots of advice and feedback for our future competitions. Two of our students were selected for a regional development programme aimed at promising debaters who weren't selected for the regional team. They got tailored extension coaching every week from the New Zealand Debate Society and shared this knowledge with the rest of our debate club.

We hope to see some new faces next year and are excited to continue building our skills and reputation as effective debaters across the region.



The Spelling bee Competition

Spelling Bee is a Community Connect class. This class allows students to develop their spelling skills with the goal of winning a \$5000 prize, a trophy and having the honour of being named the best junior speller in New Zealand.

The competition was sectioned into 3 parts; round one, semi-finals, and the finals.

Round one allowed the school to develop a group of the best spelling students, who then practised for the semi-finals. We learned about the origin of words and root words. We also had to practise, practise, practise our spelling skills.

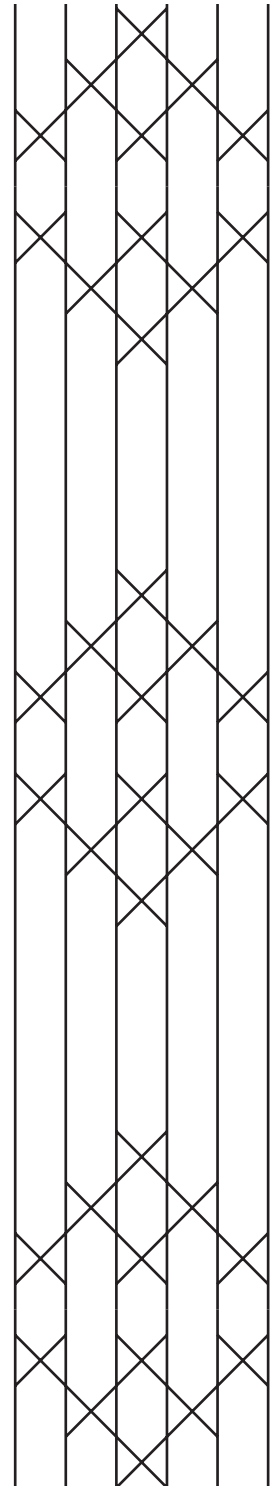
We had 10 students make it to the semi-finals round. The semi-finals was everyone for themselves as only 4 people would then move on to the finals held in Wellington. Our semi-final was held in Hamilton and had multiple schools from central New Zealand. Alex Harris was skillful enough to make it into the top 4 and confirm a place for themselves in the finals.



The whole spelling bee semi-final experience was a positive time for everyone. We learned many new words such as vociferous, succumb and meritocracy and it also offered us much more than just testing our knowledge and learning the way English words are put together. It allowed us to practise our resilience and maturity by going on a school trip, and improving our bravery as we got up there and tried our best.

We are so proud of ourselves, and spelling mates, who had the courage to try it out! Any Year 9 or 10 that's keen to join in can try for the first time next year. We recommend just giving it a go, and giving it your personal best!

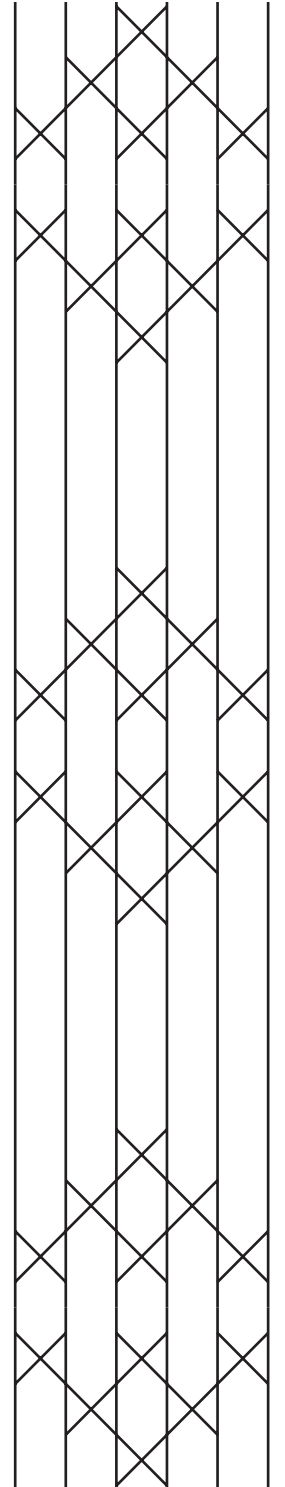


AKORANGA KARETAO HORTICULTURE SUSTAINABILITY

While horticulture students are still learning the core activities of propagation and plant care sustainability has become the main focus. Students have grown native trees and shrubs from seed with the support of enviroschools. The top field has been planted along its boundaries to protect from the predominant winds. Our wetlands have been planted out and fenced to provide riparian protection. This also reduces an invasive fish called gumbusa and increases populations of our native trout, Kokopu, and native crayfish, Koura.

These activities are a part of Primary Industry Training Standards as well as Sustainability Achievement Standards. Classes include junior Inquiry, senior Flower Power and senior Sustainability.





THE PAKIREHUA WHAKAAWEAWE INQUIRY

The 26th of October this year saw our annual Inquiry showcase come to life.

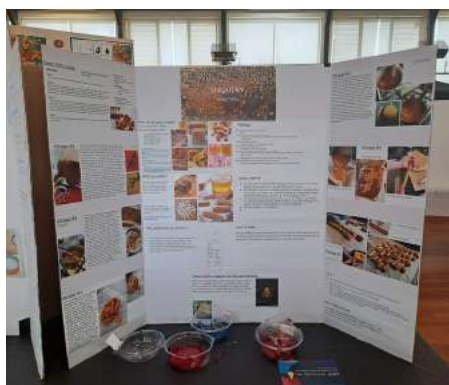
The showcase is a large project fair where all our Yr 9 and 10 students submit their inquiry projects that they have been working on in their impact inquiry classes over the year.

Students select one of the following bubbles to work with a like minded mentor that helps to facilitate the student's individual learning around a topic that is important to them.

- Sport management, sport science and Hauora.**
- Creative industries**
- Science and Technology**
- Primary Industries**
- The Performing Arts**
- Business and Enterprise**

The range and depth of the projects was outstanding this year. The evidence was clear that learners were truly invested in their projects. Some of the highlights include Devils Ball which are natural firestarters created out of the beeswax from our school apiary and Mr Oldfield's old shirts!

Our Dance inquiry students who incorporated elements of play and fighting into their choreography. Awhi, a beautiful kawakawa soap, a bike repair service, shoe and merch design for sports clubs, Scooter wax; for generating a nice slidy surface to go scooter tricks on. Kai Now is an initiative to create events to teach teenagers to cook and Mother Eaten which is a conceptual design and animation for a digital wardrobe app and plants an upcycling project that has turned into a fantastic authentic enterprise! And as usual our junior robotics teams compete in the kiwibots competition in Palmerston North and so far are upholding very high standards.

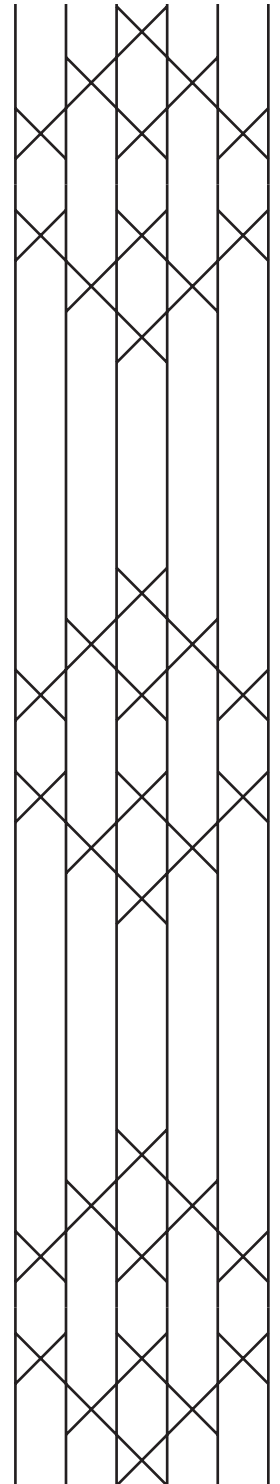

KORU

KORU PROGRAMME

The Koru Programme is a student support, extension and enrichment programme, and 2023 has been an exciting year for all those involved in this. We've had a number of off-site and on-site events that students have been able to get involved in.

Our Junior students have been following the Koru Programme curriculum during Learning Advisory time. This has included learning about New Zealand History and opportunities to complete a Level One NCEA assessment, and/or a 'Science Origins' project, and/or undertake an individual project of student choice. We teamed up with Puke Ariki who have been awesome in arranging inspiring learning sessions for our junior students. Students explored the Taranaki Research Centre, had a tour of the library, and had an informative session with Chanelle Carrick, curator of the State of Nature exhibit where they learnt about the skills and processes involved in curating an exhibition. Our students also had sessions about the history of our region, the national park and pest control, different forms of ocean protection - including how the oceans are currently being damaged rapidly by changing climate, and about the arrival of the East Polynesian people to Taranaki.

Koru Programme students have been able to get involved in other off-site trips this year. Senior students attended a 'More Able and Ambitious' conference in Wellington, which challenged students to think about certain things in different ways. For example, students learnt about making yourself stand out above others by showing creative problem solving skills. As a way to do this, students were asked to think about how they could answer certain questions such as 'how many animals were in Noah's ark?' On the surface, this might seem like an odd question; however the conference showed us ways we could approach or answer such a question and others like it from a variety of different angles. Students also visited the Supreme Court, toured parliament and Te Papa museum.

Lake Rotokare was another trip offered to students. Lake Rotokare is Taranaki's only pest free sanctuary; students on this trip learnt all about pest control and the flora and fauna of this stunning 230ha forested hill-country catchment, with extensive wetlands and a 17.8ha natural lake.

It was a privilege for Koru Programme students to have guest speakers Caleb Haapu (former lead singer and guitarist for Sons of Zion) and Sophie Pascoe (Paralympic swimming champion) come chat to them this year.

Individual students have been out and about in 2023 too! Catherine Rielly-Leadbetter went on the Spirit of Adventure; James Chapman and Diamoni Lieng attended the Wellington Model United Nations; Caila Eager attended the Ngāmotu Model United Nations; Xavier Leach, Bodhi Danenhauer, Tate Upson and August Webb-Sagarin attended the Model European Union event.

Congratulations to all Koru Programme students who have worked hard and achieved their goals this year, including subject endorsement, and/or Merit and Excellence endorsements. We look forward to offering another exciting programme in 2024!



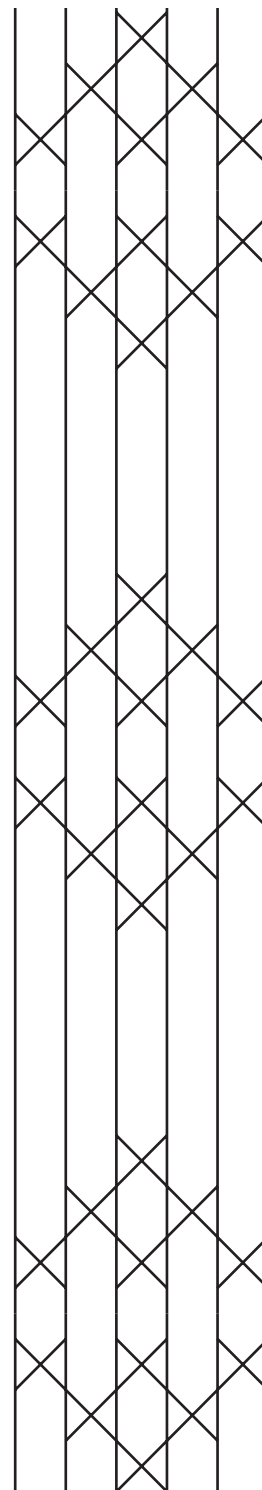
THE SPIRIT OF ADVENTURE - by Catherine Rielly-Leadbetter



The Spirit of Adventure ship left Auckland on the 27th of May and I'm genuinely so grateful to have been on it for voyage 868. Right from the beginning I got to know the 39 other teenagers on board and they were all really nice and friendly. I was new to sailing so it was extremely helpful that in the first few days, alongside team building exercises, we got to know the different sail stations and what ropes corresponded to each sail, eventually building up to the trainees being able to sail the boat all by ourselves. The skills I learnt relating to sailing were all new and exciting and when I began to understand what was happening when everyone worked together it was really rewarding.

I felt possibly I was a little bit physically challenged on the boat in comparison to others but the people I was surrounded by were patient and helped me to recognise my strengths. I learnt to simply give every challenge a go and try my hardest even when I was struggling physically in situations where I lacked strength or mentally when we were asked to do things out of my comfort zone such as climbing the mast to release the sails. Even when I found things difficult, I was able to say every day "I am proud of myself." Having a team was everything because we all supported each other and were able to get things done. We all found ways to have fun and mess about with each other in the evenings and during group activities.

In addition, the voyage helped me gain new skills in making relationships and leadership. I learnt some important things about listening to the person leading and that when you are leading it's necessary to let other people do things even if it isn't done exactly the way you want. Leading is knowing the strengths and weaknesses of your team and being able to connect with, teach and supervise them and this all comes together with someone who is good at planning ahead. The weather was often very wet and this was a test of morale but the relationships I made on the voyage will be ones I remember. We all went through the ten days together and while it was nice to be home and have a shower, I'll miss everyone I met while I was away. On the Spirit of Adventure there was a place for everyone and I was really fortunate to meet such a wide variety of wonderful people.

I wish everyone continued success with their studies. I am very proud of what we have achieved and it has been a pleasure to teach you all this year.

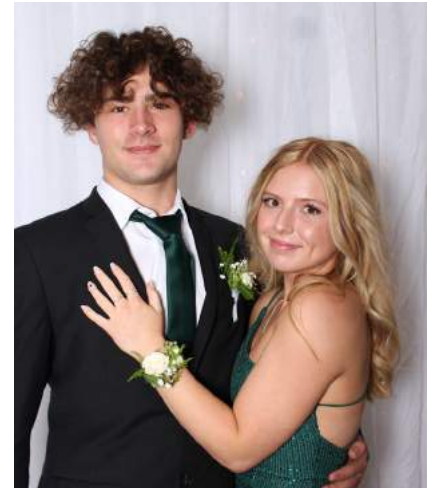

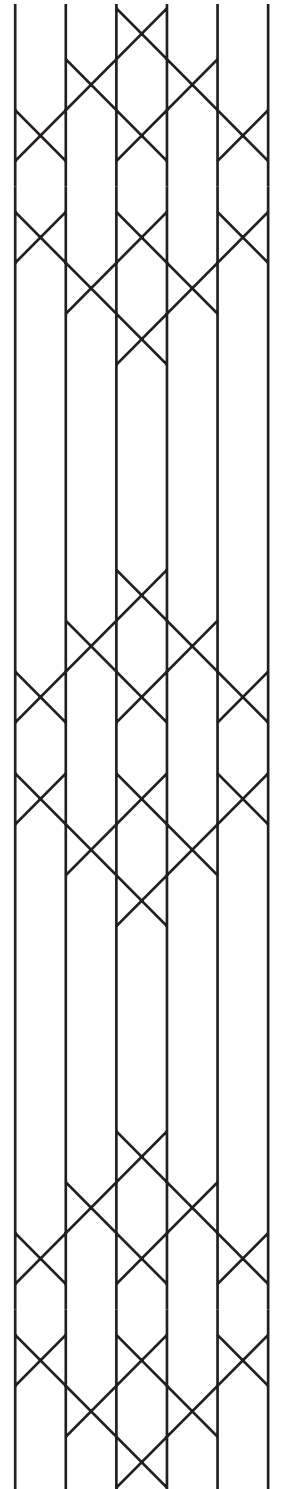
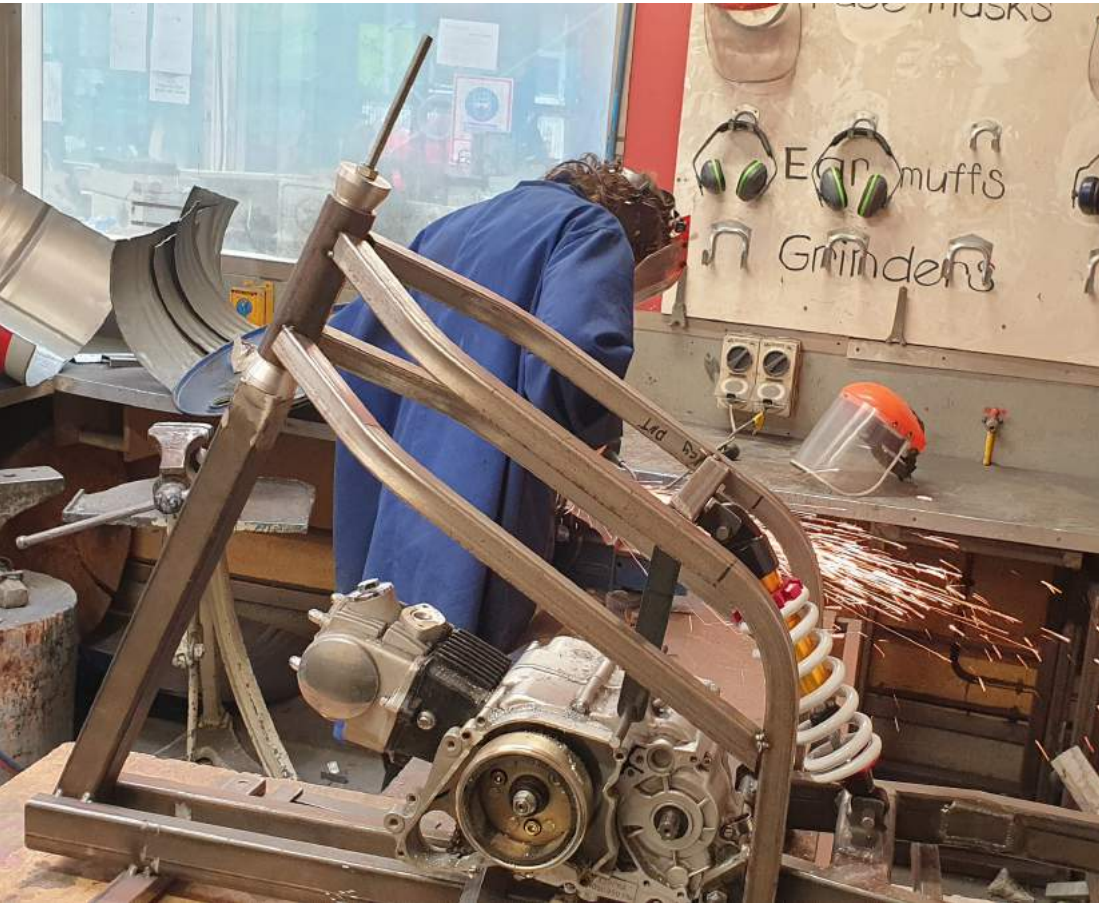
WHAKAREWA MAHI METAL WORK

We replaced a worn-out lathe, a mig welder and the band saw. To add to this we have also bought an Arcdroid, which is a robotic arm that uses a plasma cutter to cut out metal. This is great for making brackets and cutting shapes out of metal.

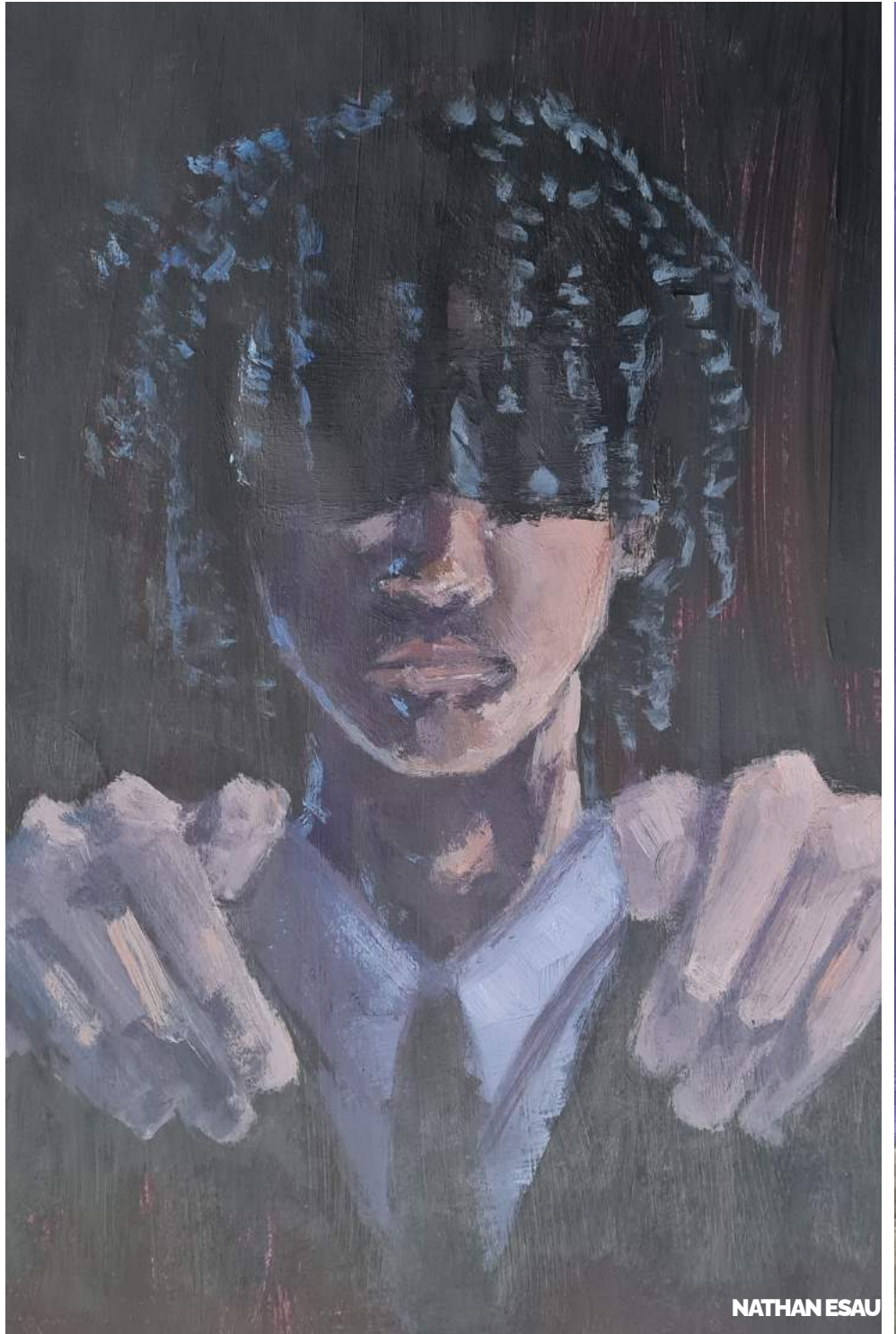

TAONGA TĀKARO A PHYSICAL EDUCATION

A strong theme for many of the courses in the Physical Education department for 2023 was EOTC or Education Outside the Classroom. We know that experiences outside the classroom reinforce learning by enabling students to make connections between what they have learnt in the classroom and the world beyond the classroom. EOTC experiences also give students the opportunities to demonstrate the key competencies identified in The New Zealand Curriculum; particularly managing self, relating to others and participating and contributing.

Students in the Taranaki Active class were able to complete a River Safety Training course with OTNZ (Outdoor Training New Zealand) Taranaki Branch. The experienced instructors were able to share their knowledge for students to develop river safety skills including hazard assessment and river crossings techniques. Floating down rapids with a full tramping pack and getting themselves to the river

bank, was a great challenge to end the course with. Students also had the opportunity to explore the Lake Mangamahoe trails and use their navigational skills.

With large classes for this subject, we can't always travel outside the school grounds, however we do make the most of our on site outside spaces. Practicing water survival techniques, lighting fires, rogaining and completing crazy group challenges is an awesome way for students to develop and build their interpersonal skills.

To conclude this course, senior students led their peers on a day trip. The students walked from Corbett Park to Weld Road, including crossing the Oakura River. A highlight of the day was an unplanned encounter with a seal south of Weld Road.

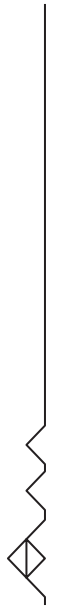
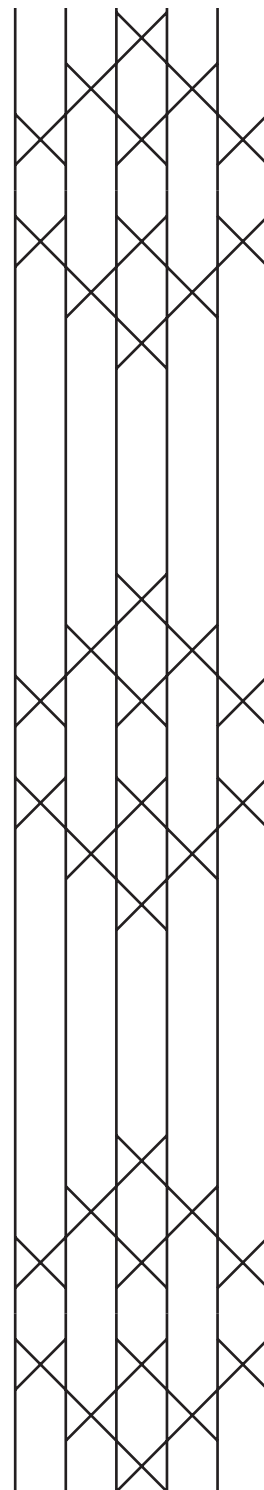
Semester 1's Outdoors class improved their walking

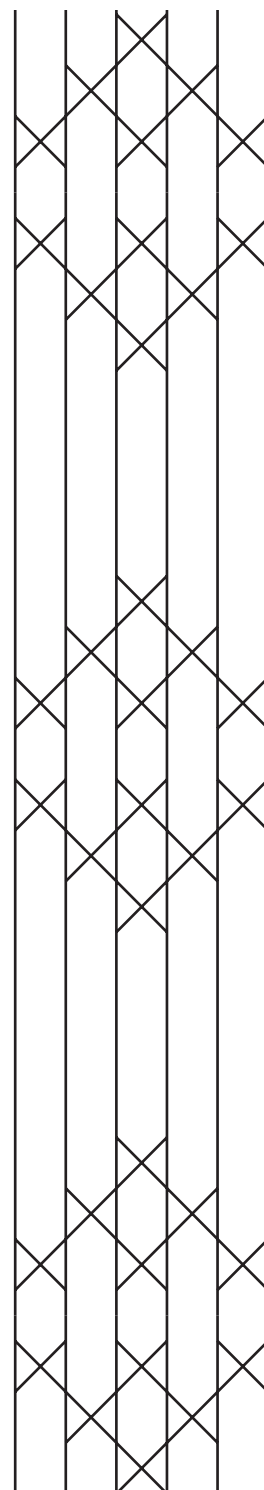

In commerce popular courses include OWN BOSS for year 11 accounting students and THE CRITICAL THINKER for economics students. A season of scientific development and genuine passion for all things inventive comes to a close. From agriculture to physics, the science department has had a wonderfully exciting year filled with hands-on activities and intelligence in the classroom.

The agriculture class has had an exciting farming course in which they have been busy for a large portion of the year. One or two times a week the team heads out to learn important farming skills and it has been non-stop. Across the year they've covered calving, lambing, fencing, shearing, drenching, dehorning, milking, fertilising, mowing and bailing, learning such a wide range of skills while getting to be hands-on, outside of the classroom doing something they are passionate about. It has been an opportunity for them to connect with local farmers who have been kind enough to share their knowledge and expertise. Likewise, the horticulture department has been equally busy moving and nursing plants due to that latest construction taking place on Spotswood College grounds; when the scaffolding is taken down, they will be ready to be moved back. They have also been learning other skills such as trapping, working with chainsaws and

mulching and finishing the landscaping around the gym and to provide new seating areas.

Our year 10 students also competed in the Science Fair Quiz, a Taranaki-wide competition hosted at Spotswood College this year, where our tight knit team got to show off their talents and knowledge in a cleverly assembled series of questions, experiments and finally a flag building technology challenge. 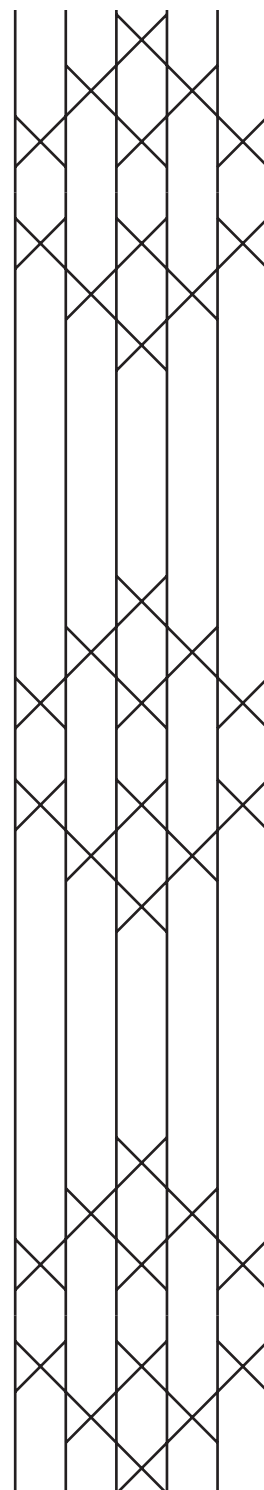
2023 SENIOR GIRLS' BASKETBALL:

The team played well throughout the season and saved their best for last. They are looking forward to improving over the summer and having another successful year in 2024.

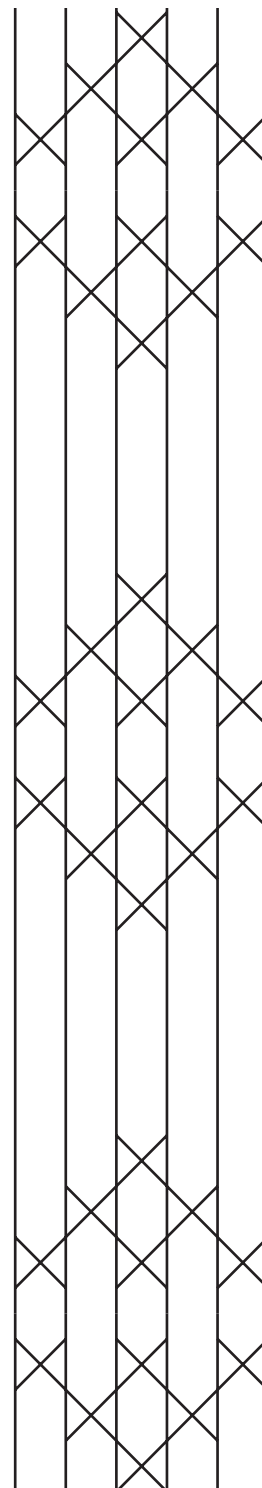

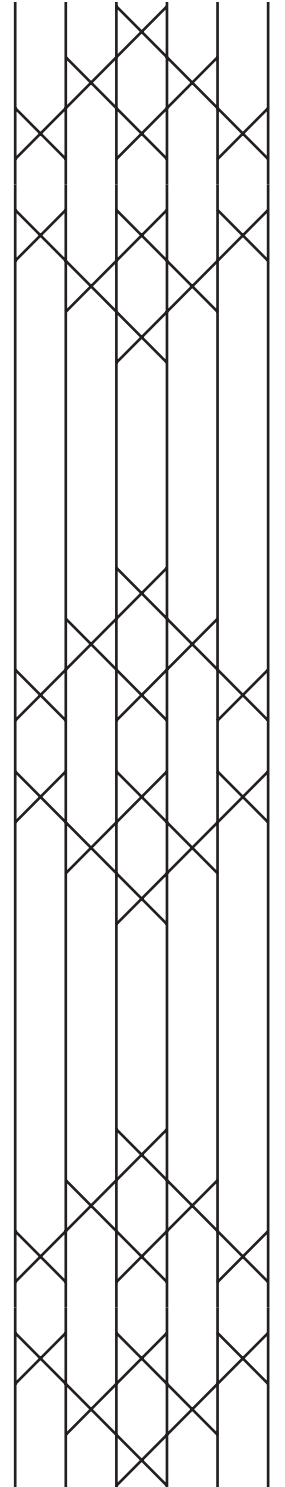

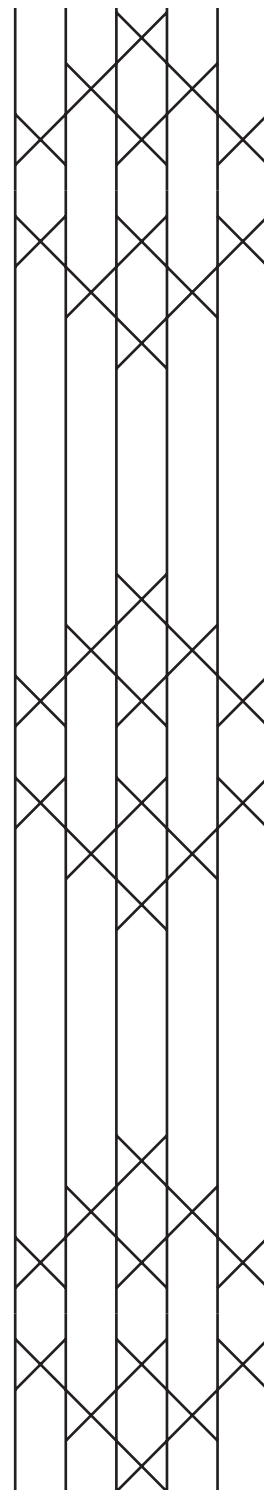

There was no TSSSA MX this year, which was a shame as we have a few who are keen to put their skills to the test.

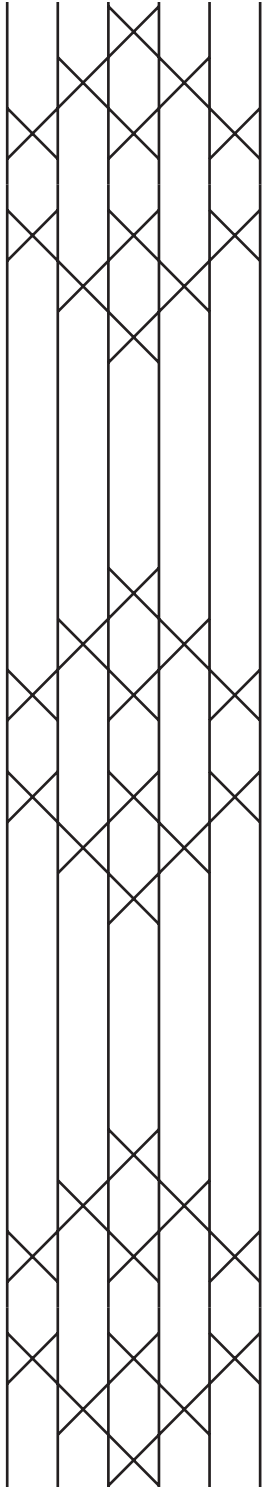

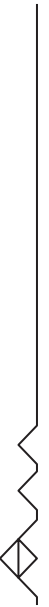

- ▶ Participating in the Manawatu Regional tournament pre-Nationals with some excellent results for the team


JUNIOR VOLLEYBALL:

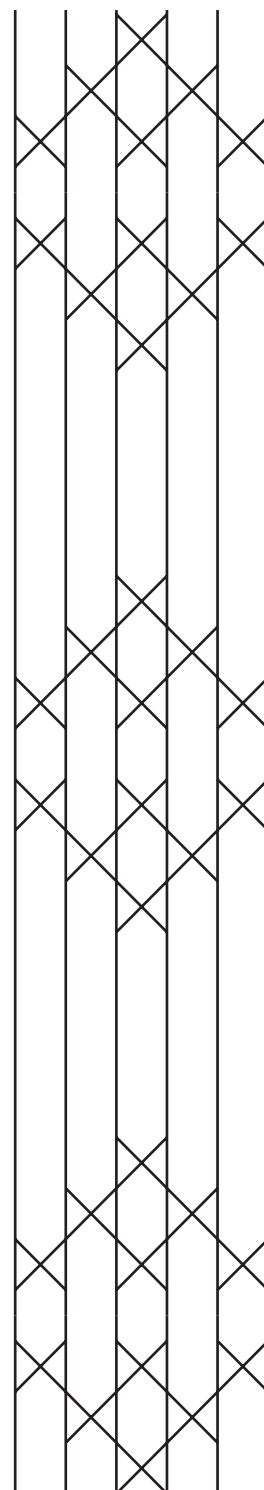
This year's TSSSA Beach Volleyball championships were played on Ngamotu Beach in perfect conditions. Our five teams and final placings were:

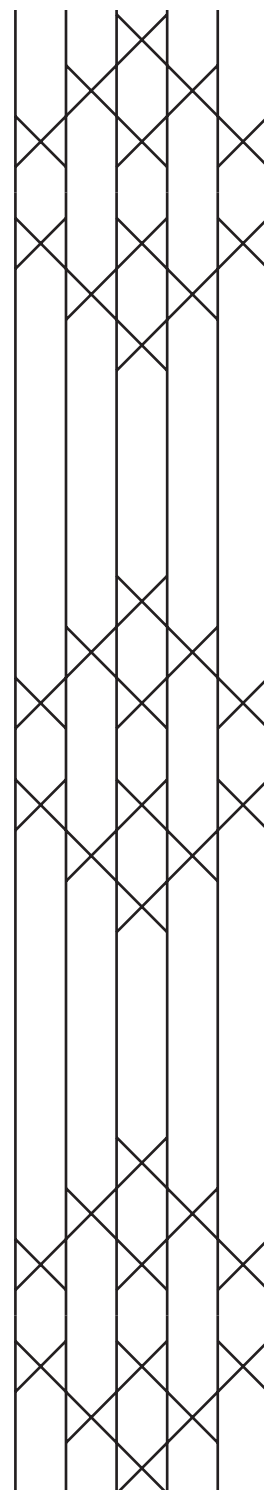

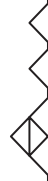

Spotswood College opened in 1960, and currently there are nearly 20,000 ex-Spotswoodians(Alumni).

The word Alumni is used to refer to a group of people who have graduated from a school or university. Males are referred to alumnus and females as alumna. Your almamater is your old school, college or university. It's generally used as a positive term, implying reverence and loyalty for the nurturing qualities of the institution. Alma mater comes from two Latin words meaning "nourishing or bountiful mother."

In 2008, a group of ex-Spotswoodians formed the Spotswood College Alumni Trust in order to keep the alumni up to date with the news and successes of other alumni, and to support the College, its staff and students in the future. The Trust is a fully registered Charitable Trust (CC24439).

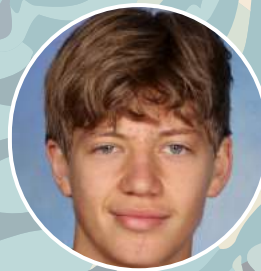
